The Free Green Market Act

- **SECTION 1.** The Federal Government shall end all subsidies to nonrenewable energy sources over a ten year period.
- SECTION 2. A. Nonrenewable energy sources within this legislation are defined as entities operating in the procurement, refinement, and combustion process of fossil fuels such as coal, oil, and natural gas to generate energy.
 - B. Subsidies within this legislation are defined as federal assistance and support through tax credits, waivers, exemptions, grants, and other such programs to artificially lower the cost of production for the benefit of the recipient.
- SECTION 3. The Department of Energy and the Environmental Protection Agency, in coordination with all other necessary departments and agencies, shall begin the implementation of this bill upon passage.
 - A. Immediately upon passage, no new subsides shall be allowed nor provided to nonrenewable energy sources.
 - B. Existing subsides shall be diminished by 10% each year, starting from a 2021 baseline.

A Bill to Impose a Value Added Tax
