A Resolution to Ban Chocolate

RESOLVED, That the Congress here assembled ban the import of any cocoa beans, powder, or other cocoa product from African countries that continue to utilize child labor in the production of cocoa; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the United States will restrict the sale of all commercial chocolate candies, cocoa drinks, and all products made with cocoa produced from child labor. Upon passage this resolution will go into immediate effect.

A Resolution to Ban Plastic Bags

BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	A task force will be created to increase efforts to clean the	
2	Great Pacific Garbage Patch (GPGP). This task force shall be referred to as		
3	the Pacific Cleanup Crew (PCC).		
4	SECTION 2.	A task force shall be defined as a crew consisting of	
5	members from multiple different agencies as listed in Section 2A. The		
6	Great Pacific Garbage Patch (GPGP) shall be defined as a debris patch		
7	spanning 1.6 million square kilometers (approximately 620,000 square		
8	miles) located within the central Pacific Ocean.		
9	A. This task f	orce will consist of 250 members in its first year from	
10	agencies including but not limited to: The United States Navy, the		
11	Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), the Fish and Wildlife Services		
12	(FWS), the United States Geological Survey (USGS), and the National		
13	Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA).		
14	SECTION 3.	\$1 billion will be reallocated from the budget of the Nationa	
15	Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) to fund the PCC on the first		
16	year of this bill's passage.		
17	A. \$9	75 million will be used for the purchase of necessary	
18	eq	uipment (as determined by the PCC) to help cleanse the

20	B. Th	e remaining \$25 million will be used to pay all individual	
21	me	embers of the task force.	
22	C. Eve	ery year after the first year, \$100 million dollars will be	
23	rea	allocated from the budget of NASA to fund the PCC.	
24	D. Fu	nding shall be provided to the PCC every year for 10 years.	
25	SECTION 4.	This legislation will go into effect in the next fiscal year.	
26	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared
