

A Bill to Establish an Opioid Crisis Prevention Task Force

Article 1: This bill establishes a task force that would work alongside the FDA to focus on providing preventative and treatment plans for opioid addiction and overdose.

Medication such as methadone, buprenorphine, and Naloxone will be distributed in states based on needs and urgency. Therefore, each state will have one representative chosen by the state's governor.

Article 2: The group's title is the National Opioid Crisis Counteraction Force.

Article 3: This bill will take effect upon passage.

Article 4: This commission will operate under all U.S Food and Drug Administration requirements.

Article 5: All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

This bill establishes a bipartisan task force dedicated to 4. wielding that authority in order to halt the swearing in of representatives 5. who come from excessively gerrymandered districts.
- 6.The DNC and The RNC may both choose two members of the task force. A 5.fifth member and chairmen will be chosen by The Parliamentarian of The 6.House. No members of the committee can be active or former members 7.of the house or senate.
- 8.If a district is found to have excessive political gerrymandering, the 9.perceived winner of that districts house seat will be refused a seat in 10.congress.
- 11.Until an election can be held with fair congressional district lines, the 12.current house member would maintain their position.
- 13. Article 2: The term excessively gerrymandered will be further defined by 14. the committee.
- 15. Article 3: This bill will take effect upon passage.
- 16. Article 4: This commission will operate using all Federal Advisory 17. Committee Act requirements.

8.	to the discretion of each tribe.		
9. Article III:	This legislation will take effect on November 1, 2022.		
10. Article IV:	The Clerk of the House and the Federal Election Commission and Bureau of		
11.	Indian Affairs will oversee the enforcement of this legislation.

9	Article IV:	This Bill shall be implemented on June 8th, 2022.
10	Article V:	The enforcement of this Bill shall be overseen by the Department of
11		Health and Human Services.
12	Article VI:	All laws in conflict with this Bill shall hereby be declared null and
13		void.

A Bill to Provide Stimulus to Companies to Reduce Supply Chain Issues BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	ARTICLE I.	Due to the lasting effects of supply chain issues, Congress shall provide
2		stimulus checks to companies in the United States to fund production and
3		reliable shipping of materials, as well as partially compensate for any
4		financial troubles of companies harmed by supply chain issues.
5		A. Larger companies may not be included as their prioritization in the
6		global supply chain negates the need for additional income, and will
7		be reviewed on a case by case basis.
8		B. The dollar amount shall be determined by total net profits of
9		companies in the years of 2019, 2020, and 2021, before supply chain
10		issues began, during the climax of their effects, and as companies
11		have started to rebuild.
12	ARTICLE II.	Supply chain issues refer to the problems in manufacturing, shipping, and
13		other production aspects caused partly by the recent COVID-19 pandemic.
14		Because the production of one product often affects the production of
15		another, difficulties in this "chain" have destructive global consequences.
16	ARTICLE III.	This legislation will be implemented immediately upon its passage.
17	ARTICLE IV.	This bill will be overseen by the United States Bureau of Economic Analysis
18		under the United States Department of Commerce in conjunction with the
19		Bureau of Economic and Business Affairs under the United States
20		Department of State.
21		A. This legislation shall be reviewed again upon the end of this fiscal
22		year, and revised and possibly enacted again if supply chain issues
23		continue to persist.
24	ARTICLE V.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Reform the Current Policing System by Defunding and Reallocating Funds

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	ARTICLE I.	The United States Federal Government shall reduce police department
2		budgets and distribute funds towards essential social services such as
3		housing, education, employment, mental health care, and youth services. To
4		be carried out, this will include cutting a certain percentage of the funds of
5		Community oriented Policing Services grant and the Byrne Justice
6		Assistance Grants.
7	ARTICLE II.	The Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) was originally used to
8		combat a rise in violent crimes during the 90s, but crime rates have since
9		decreased yet funding still factored in at \$304 million in 2019. The Byrne
10		Justice Assistance Grants (Byrne JAG) began as a part of the anti-Drug
11		Abuse Act of 1988 designed to award funding to a wide variety of initiatives,
12		but more than half of the grants are awarded to support law enforcement,
13		averaging around \$435 million each year. Reallocation of funds to social
14		services will be calculated based on the entirety of 2020's police department
15		budget.
16	ARTICLE III.	This legislation will be implemented immediately upon its passage.
17	ARTICLE IV.	The Department of Justice will oversee the distribution of funding to state,
18		local, and tribal jurisdictions.
19	ARTICLE V.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

1	ARTICLE I.	This legislation shall ensure that presidents, vice presidents, and other White
2		House press officials will be investigated for misinformation. This allows the
3		individuals mentioned to be prosecuted for false claims in the form of public
4		statements in order to limit influence over the general public.
5	ARTICLE II.	"Misinformation" refers to false or inaccurate information that is meant to
6		deceive the public.
7	ARTICLE III.	This legislation will take effect on January 1st, 2025, and shall be fully
8		implemented over four years.
9	ARTICLE IV.	This legislation will be overseen by the US Department of Justice.
10	ARTICLE V.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Implement Contractionary Monetary Policies to Decrease Gas Prices

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	ARTICLE I.	Contractionary monetary policies will be implemented, which will decrease
2		gas prices. These prices are high due to the inflation rates COVID has
3		brought; further, these rates have been increasing monthly. The increasing
4		inflation rate has caused high gas prices, which impacts the poor more than
5		the wealthy.
5	ARTICLE II.	Contractionary monetary policies are defined as any type of monetary policy
7		that is intended to reduce the rate of monetary expansion to fight inflation;
3		such as increasing the interest rate and raising reserve requirements. They

A Bill to Increase the Federal Minimum Wage to Alleviate Systemic Poverty

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	ARTICLE I.	The Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938, which established an hourly
2		minimum wage, will be amended to raise the federal minimum wage from
3		\$7.25 to \$15 an hour.
4	ARTICLE II.	This bill will aid the economic inequity for the lower and lower-middle
5		class. Minimum wage is defined as the required minimum pay workers can
6		receive for a given time (usually hourly).
7	ARTICLE III.	This legislation will take effect on January 1st, 2024.
8	ARTICLE IV.	This legislation will be overseen by the U.S Department of Labor's Wage
9		and Hour Division.
10		A. This bill is subject to review by the U.S. Department of Labor,
11		specifically the Department's Wage and Hour Division in conjunction
12		with the U.S. Government Accountability Office every fiscal year.
13	ARTICLE V.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Recognize the Republic of China

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	ARTICLE I.	This bill will officially recognize the Republic of China, or Taiwan, as an
2		independent, fully functional democracy in Asia.
3	ARTICLE II.	Recognition of the independence of the Republic of China will involve
4		delegitimization of the People's Republic of China's claim over islands
5		under Taiwanese rule as a socialist Chinese province and transferring
6		sovereignty of said islands currently under ROC control to Taiwan.
7	ARTICLE III.	This legislation will take effect immediately upon passage.
8	ARTICLE IV.	The Department of State, as our nation's highest office of foreign affairs,
9		shall oversee the diplomatic and legal implementation of this bill by working
10		with Taiwan, China, and the United Nations to make the transition of
11		recognition smooth and without conflict.
12	ARTICLE V.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Legalize Regulated Recreational Marijuana

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	ARTICLE I.	The Boggs Act of 1952 and The Narcotics Control Act of 1956 shall be
2		amended to reverse criminalization of marijuana. Regulated cannabis
3		products shall be legalized in all states and overseas territories for those 21
4		and older. Previous marijuana-specific convictions shall be expunged. Taxes
5		collected through cannabis sales will be allocated to reinvest in
6		communities most harmed by the drug war.
7	ARTICLE II.	A. The term "Regulated" refers to the oversight of pure and labeled
8		cannabis.
9		B. The term "Cannabis Products" refers to any goods containing marijuana
10		or its chemical properties, such as THC and CBD.
11	ARTICLE III.	This law shall go into effect during the next three fiscal years, and shall be
12		fully enacted by 2025.
13	ARTICLE IV.	This legislation shall be overseen by the FDA.
14	ARTICLE V.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Reform the Electoral Count Act to Decrease the Frequency of Objections to Certified Electoral Votes

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	ARTICLE I.	To prevent the mass disenfranchisement of votes and discordance that is the
2		Constitutionally mandated Congressional Certification of electoral votes, the
3		vote to sustain an objection to counting electors will require a discharge
4		position. If the requirement of such a petition is not met, a vote will not be
5		held to sustain the objection. Further, if an objection is sustained by these
6		processes, states will be given an opportunity to re-certify.
7	ARTICLE II.	A discharge petition is defined as a petition to force a vote on a particular
8		piece of legislation (or in this case, a motion) and requires the signatures of a
9		majority of members in the governing body (seeing that the counting of
10		electors is a joint session, it would require a majority of both chambers).
11	ARTICLE III.	This will be implemented on January 1, 2023, and will be practiced for the
12		Presidential Election Certification in January, 2025.
13	ARTICLE IV.	Congress shall self govern this law as it pertains to their proceedings.
14	ARTICLE V.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

1	Article I:	The federal minimum wage will increase every year until it reaches
2		\$15.00 dollars an hour.
3	Article II:	The current minimum wage, \$9.50, will be raised to \$11.00 a year after
4		this bill takes effect. It will increase to \$12.50 two years after this bill

Bill #1404 A Bill to Restrict Opioid Access

1	Article I:	The United States government will set a seven-day limit on opioid
2		prescriptions for acute pain and a 30-day limit on opioid prescriptions for
3		chronic pain. Patient doses cannot exceed 100 MME per day.
4	Article II:	Opioids will be defined as a class of drugs that include the illegal drug
5		heroin, synthetic opioids, and pain relievers available legally by
6		prescription. MME will be defined as morphine milligram equivalents, or
7		an opioid dosage's equivalent to morphine.
8	Article III:	This bill will take effect six months after its passage.
9	Article IV:	The Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) will oversee the
10		enforcement of this legislation.
11		A. Penalties for prescribers refusing to comply with the terms of this
12		legislation include confinement in jail for up to 30 days and a fine of up
13		to \$500, either or both. Any further violations will result in
14		confinement in jail for up to one year and a fine of up to \$2,500, either
15		or both.
16	Article V:	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

5		like-effects. They can be highly addictive and lead to slowed breathing,
