A Bill to eliminate sodium nitrate from marketed foods

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. It will be illegal to use sodium nitrate in any marketed food items.
- 3 **SECTION 2.** Sodium nitrate is a harmful chemical in many processed foods that cause heart disease.
- 5 **SECTION 3.** The Food Safety and Inspection Service will oversee the enforcement of this bill.
- 1. Any company found breaking this law will be fined with 150% of their profit from the product.
- 9 **SECTION 4**. This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2024. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Repeal the Jones Act

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. The Merchant Marine Act of 1920, Public Law 66-261, known as the
- 3 "Jones Act" is hereby repealed.
- 4 **SECTION 2**. This legislation will take effect on October 1, 2023. All laws in conflict
- 5 with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to allow an increased appropriation of funds to heighten and innovate border security to stop the transport of Fentanyl across the United States and Mexico border

1	WHEREAS,	in 2021, 11,000 pounds of fentanyl arrived in the United States; and
2	WHEREAS,	more than half of this fentanyl came through Mexico; and
3	WHEREAS,	the leading exporter of fentanyl is China, a major economic competitor
4		with the United States; and
5	WHEREAS,	the CDC cited that drug overdose related deaths increased fifteen
6		percent from 2020 to 2021 and thirty percent from 2019 to 2020; and
7	WHEREAS,	deaths from fentanyl rose to 71,238 in 2021 from 57,834 in 2020; and
8	WHEREAS,	death from fentanyl ranks in the top ten causes of death in the United
9		States and is the leading cause of death for persons ages 18-45; and
10	WHEREAS,	a range of other deadly narcotics such as cocaine, methamphetamine,
11		and heroin enter America through its southern border with Mexico; now,
12		therefore, be it
13	RESOLVED,	That the Congress here assembled increase funding for border security to
14		prevent the transport of fentanyl and other deadly narcotics into the
15		United States.

A Resolution to Pressure Israel to End its Human Rights Abuses

1	WHEREAS,	The United States provides military aid and financial support to the state
2		of Israel; and
3	WHEREAS,	Israel violates the sovereignty of Palestine and purposely endangers
4		Palestinian citizens, leading to about 5,590 Palestinian deaths from 2008
5		to 2020 and injuring many more; and
6	WHEREAS,	through the contribution of \$30 billion in military aid to Israel during the
7		same period, and a further commitment of \$38 billion until FY2028, the
8		U.S. supports these abuses; and
9	WHEREAS,	the U.S., as a nation that prides itself as a beacon of democracy, freedom,
10		equality, and fair treatment, cannot, in good faith, actively support a
11		government that takes these human rights away from others; now,
12		therefore, be it
13	RESOLVED,	by the Congress here assembled will limit Israel's encroachment into
14		Palestine and commit to the two-state solution outlined in the 1947
15		United Nations Partition Plan for Palestine by leveraging U.S. financial
16		and military support to the State of Israel.

A Bill to Restore the Right to Repair

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. A. All owners of a technological product shall have the right to make
- physical repairs on their devices without losing licensure to the software.
- B. All equipment manufacturers of technological products shall provide
- 5 consumers and independent repair businesses equal access to repair
- documentation, diagnostics, tools, service parts, and firmware as their
- 7 direct or authorized repair providers.
- 8 **SECTION 2**. A. Technological product shall be defined as a physical unit of equipment
- 9 that contains a computer or microcontroller worth over \$100 USD
- according to the manufacturer's suggested retail price.
- B. Equipment manufacturers shall be defined as companies that produce
- parts and equipment used to construct technological products.
- 13 C. Physical repairs shall be defined as maintenance performed on the
- material components of a technological device.
- SECTION 3. A. The Federal Trade Commission shall be charged with the
- implementation 14 and enforcement of this bill.
- B. Companies found in violation with this bill shall be fined 25% of all
- revenue accumulated from sales of any technological products not in
- accordance.
- 20 **SECTION 4.** This bill shall take effect on all technological products manufactured after
- 21 January 1, 2023.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

The Women's Health Protection Act of 2022

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The full text of the Women's Health Protection Act of 2021 (HR. 3755) is
3		hereby enacted. The WHPA achieves these purposes:
4		A. "To permit health care providers to provide abortion services without
5		limitations or requirements that single out the provision of abortion
6		services for restrictions that are more burdensome than those
7		restrictions imposed on medically comparable procedures, do not
8		significantly advance reproductive health or the safety of abortion
9		services, and make abortion services more difficult to access."
10		B. "To promote access to abortion services and women's ability to
11		participate equally in the economic and social life of the United
12		States."
13	SECTION 2.	"Medically comparable procedures" are defined as "medical procedures
14		that are similar in terms of health and safety risks to the patient,
15		complexity, or the clinical setting that is indicated."
16	SECTION 3.	The Department of Justice shall oversee implementation.
17	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall take effect immediately upon passage
18	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Recognize Taiwan's Independence

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. The United States is hereby committed to defending Taiwan's security.
- A. The United States shall end its policy of strategic ambiguity by committing to defend Taiwan in the event of a Chinese attack.
 - B. The United States shall end its recognition of the "One China Policy".
- C. The Department of Defense shall build a military base in Taiwan and rebuild its presence in the South China Sea. Additional funding shall be appropriated at the recommendation of the Senate Committee on Armed Services.

10 **SECTION 2**.

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- A. "Strategic ambiguity" is hereby defined as "being intentionally ambiguous about foreign policy decisions".
- B. "One China Policy" is hereby defined as "The United States' recognition of Taiwan as part of China".
- SECTION 3. The Department of Defense shall oversee the implementation of this legislation, with assistance from the Department of State.
- A. Oversight and funding shall be provided by the Senate Committee on Armed Services.
- 19 **SECTION 4.** This bill shall go into effect immediately upon passage.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

3		shall be changed to be the same as the current requirements for
4		Canadian citizens. The list of occupations those claiming TN
5		Nonimmigrant Status are allowed to work in shall be updated to include
6		any occupation for a small business.
7	SECTION 2.	Small business shall be defined according to the U.S. Small Business
8		Administration size standards.
9	SECTION 3.	The Department of Homeland Security shall oversee the enforcement of
10		this legislation.
11	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2023. All laws in conflict with
12		this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Provide Universal School Lunch to Combat Hunger

2	SECTION 1.	The National School Lunch Program shall fully subsidize school meals.
3	SECTION 2.	The National School Lunch Program is the current federal program under
4		the US Department of Agriculture formed by the 1946 National School
5		Lunch Act which partially subsidizes school meals. School meals shall be
6		defined as breakfast and lunch provided on the property of public and
7		public-charter K-12 schools during the school year.
8	SECTION 3.	The US Departments of Agriculture and Education shall oversee the
9		implementation of this legislation.
10		A. All additional funding used to implement this legislation shall be

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A Bill to Limit the Amount of Nutrient Pollution Contaminating Water

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: 1 SECTION 1. The amount of nutrient pollution released into water shall be limited and 2 lowered by instituting farm and field catchment management. 3 Nutrient pollution shall be defined as contamination of sources such as SECTION 2. 4 water sources due to chemicals such as nitrate and harmful chemicals in 5 common fertilizers. Catchment management shall be defined as a 6 7 system-based approach to use more sustainable practices in which water is held in a drainage basin. 8

SECTION 3. The United States Environmental Protection Agency shall oversee and 9 enforce this bill along with the United States Department of Agriculture. 10 A. Both agencies shall make sure that the use of chemicals causing water 11 contamination and pollution is limited/lowered by implementing 12 more sustainable processes such as the catchment management 13 system.

- This bill shall go into effect as of January 2023 and shall be reviewed SECTION 4. 15 annually. 16
- All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void. SECTION 5. 17

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A Bill to Raise Workers' Wages to Counteract Inflation

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. All wages are mandated to increase at the same rate as inflation. The minimum wage shall also increase with the rate of inflation.
- SECTION 2. Wages are defined as fixed regular payments made by an employer to an employee. The rate of inflation is defined as the rate of the increase in prices over a given period of time.
- 7 **SECTION 3.** The U.S. Department of Labor shall implement this legislation.
- A. Wages shall increase monthly in accordance to the rate of inflation the Consumer Price Index reports.
 - B. If the minimum wage or employees' wages increase more than the rate of inflation, then all succeeding months' increases shall be based on the new wage.
 - C. If wages stagnate or are increased below the rate of inflation, it shall be considered a cut in pay and the employers must information their employees of the change.
 - D. If companies do not conform, they will pay a fine equal to the amount they did not pay their employees.
- **SECTION 4.** This bill shall be implemented beginning fiscal year 2024.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

- BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: 1
- The United States will repeal the Uniting and Strengthening America by SECTION 1. 2
- Providing Appropriate Tools Required to Intercept and Obstruct 3
- Terrorism Act. 4
- This act will be implemented and administered by the Department of SECTION 2. 5
- Justice. 6

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- A. All individuals detained under the USA Patriot Act must be given a fair
- and speedy trial in a United Stated Federal Court. 8
- B. Investigations must establish probable cause before anti-terrorism surveillance can occur. 10
- C. An independent audit to establish any abuses or improper uses of the 11 USA Patriot Act powers. 12
- This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2024 SECTION 3. 13
- **SECTION 4.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void. 14 Introduced for Congressional Debate by Neil Sash.

A Resolution to Halt Human Trafficking in the Sinai Peninsula

1	WHEREAS,	The Eritrean government has subjected its citizens to widespread forced
2		labor and conscription, prompting waves of refugees to seek asylum in
3		Israel through the Sinai Peninsula; and
4	WHEREAS,	Sudan has been plagued by food insecurity, political instability, and
5		currency depreciation, motivating thousands of refugees to use the same
6		route; and
7	WHEREAS,	Eritrean and Sudanese refuges passing through Sinai face violence, sexual
8		exploitation, forced servitude, extortion, and involuntary organ removal
9		at the hands of human traffickers; and
10	WHEREAS,	Israel has violated international law by punishing, detaining, and
11		deporting asylum seekers who have successfully crossed its border; now,
12		therefore, be it
13	RESOLVED,	That the Congress here assembled pledges \$20 million to fund NGOs in
14		Egypt that combat trafficking and provide rehabilitation services to
15		survivors; and
16	FURTHER RES	SOLVED, That the United States embassy in Jerusalem shall work with
17		Israeli authorities to resettle 500 refugees per month beginning January
18		31, 2023; if Israel refuses to cooperate, the US shall decrease military aid
19		by 2% monthly until they comply.

A Resolution to Restore Democracy in Myanmar

1	WHEREAS,	The Myanmar military, or Tatmadaw, staged a coup on February 1, 2021,
2		seizing control of Myanmar following a general election won by
3		Myanmar's ruling party, the National League for Democracy; and
4	WHEREAS,	The Myanmar military has maintained control of Myanmar through
5		violence and imprisonment, resulting in the death or displacement of
6		several hundred thousand citizens; and
7	WHEREAS,	The United States has repeatedly condemned the military's oppression of
8		Myanmar's people and democracy; now, therefore, be it
9	RESOLVED,	That the Congress here assembled demand that full control of Myanmar
10		be returned to the democratically elected National League for
11		Democracy; and
12	FURTHER RES	SOLVED, That upon passage of a global arms embargo, the U.S. shall levy a
13		20% tariff on imports from any country that provides military aid to the
14		Tatmadaw.

A Resolution to Revive African Agriculture

1	WHEREAS,	Over a quarter of Africa's total population is currently facing severe food
2		insecurity, specifically concentrated in the Horn of Africa, despite
3		donations totaling several billions of dollars in foreign food aid; and
4	WHEREAS,	Ineffective and unsustainable donation practices have contributed to
5		both reliance on foreign aid and widespread food inaccessibility; and
6	WHEREAS,	Prolonged drought within the Horn of Africa, ongoing warfare in Ukraine,
7		and rising grain prices across the globe have exacerbated this problem;
8		now, therefore, be it
9	RESOLVED,	By the Congress here assembled to provide \$500 million in agricultural
10		aid to NGOs such as SOS Sahel, the Nippon Foundation, and Farm Africa
11		to be used in support of grassroots initiatives to farm indigenous crops,
12		which include but are not limited to fonio, teff, millet, and cassava; and
13	FURTHER RES	GOLVED, That the Congress hereby recommends that fellow G7 countries
14		pledge to create a reserve fund for global food security totaling at least
15		\$100 million to disperse when the United Nations declares that the third

The Haiti and Armenia Reforestation Act of 2022

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. The full text of the Haiti and Armenia Reforestation Act of 2018 is hereby enacted.
- 4 **SECTION 2.** Under the H.A.R.A. the U.S. shall provide grants to programs working in
- Haiti and Armenia sufficient to restore forest cover to at least 7% of
- 6 Haiti's landmass and at least 12% of Armenia's total landmass.
- 7 **SECTION 3.** USAID shall oversee implementation of this legislation.
- 8 **SECTION 4**. This legislation will take effect one year after passage.

A Bill to Save Our Mother Truckers

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	A 40-hour work week will be mandated for all truck drivers. Truck drivers
3		will have the legal right to become, or remain, owner-operators. Owner-
4		operators are responsible for managing time and loads. The minimum
5		age for truck drivers who cross state lines will be 18 years of age.
6	SECTION 2.	"Unregulated" and "non unionized firms" shall be defined as
7		organizations/companies offering the lowest rates to their customers at
8		the cost of trucker's paychecks. "Owner-operators" is to be defined as
9		truck drivers who do not operate under their own DOT authority but
10		instead, unionized common carriers.
11	SECTION 3.	The U.S. Department of Transportation will enforce the mandates of this
12		legislation and oversee the dismissal of unregulated, non unionized firms
13		within the trucking industry.
14	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2024. All laws in conflict with

this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

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A Resolution to Deny Diplomatic Immunity in the U.S.

1	WHEREAS,	Article 31 of Vienna Convention on Diplomatic Relations states that
2		diplomats are immune to civil and criminal prosecution by the host
3		country, and defines the principles of diplomatic immunity, and
4	WHEREAS,	22 U.S. Code § 254d states that Any action or proceeding brought against
5		an individual who is entitled to immunity with respect to such action or
6		proceeding [] shall be dismissed; and
7	WHEREAS,	Diplomats living and/or visiting the U.S. have abused their privileges of
8		diplomatic immunity and, in some cases, have committed serious acts
9		that are in violation of U.S. law, now, therefore, be it
10	RESOLVED,	by the Congress here assembled that Article 31 shall no longer be
11		recognized by the United States and any U.S. law granting diplomatic
12		immunity are hereby null and void.

A Bill to Implement an Annual Wealth Tax to Combat Economic Inequality

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2	SECTION 1.	A 2% annual wealth tax shall be levied on individuals with \$40 million to
3		\$1 billion in assets and a 6% annual wealth tax for individuals with \$1
4		billion or more in assets. Any revenue generated by this bill will be used
5		to fund education, infrastructure, and social programs.
6		A. A 30% exit tax will be imposed on any U.S. resident with a net worth
7		of \$40 million or more who renounces their U.S. citizenship.
8	SECTION 2.	Annual wealth tax shall be defined as a tax placed on the net wealth an
9		individual possesses, including, but not limited to personal assets, real
10		estate, and trusts. Exit tax shall be defined as a tax imposed on all assets
11		of an individual who renounces their U.S. citizenship.
12	SECTION 3.	The IRS shall oversee the implementation of this legislation.
13		A. A \$500 million annual fund shall be allocated to the IRS to process
14		taxes more efficiently and hire new workers.
15	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2023. All laws in conflict with this
16		legislation are hereby declared null and void.

The Fair Minimum Wage Act of 2022

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. The federal minimum wage will be increased to \$15 for all covered non-2 exempt employees working in the United States. It will then henceforth
- be indexed to inflation using the Consumer Price Index.
- 5 **SECTION 2**. The federal minimum wage will be increased steadily every year, starting
- at a \$0.75 increase the first fiscal year followed by a \$1 increase every
- subsequent fiscal year until a \$15 minimum wage is reached.
- 8 **SECTION 3.** The United States Department of Labor shall be in charge of
- 9 implementing this legislation.
- A. The Bureau of Labor Statistics shall be responsible for determining
- the Consumer Price Index used for indexing the minimum wage to
- inflation.
- SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect at the start of FY 2023. All laws in conflict
- with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Repeal the Hyde Amendment

- BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. The Hyde Amendment shall no longer be implemented in future Federal budget proposals.
- The Hyde Amendment shall be defined as the legislative provision that bars federal funds from being used for abortion except to save the life of the woman, or if the pregnancy arises from incest or rape.
- 7 **SECTION 3.** The Office of Management and Budget and the Congressional Budget 8 Office will oversee the implementation of this legislation.
- 9 **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect immediately after passage. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Offer NATO Membership to Asian Countries at risk of Chinese Encroachment and Interference

1	WHEREAS,	China is actively encroaching on the territory of countries bordering it
2		within areas such as the South China Sea and the Himalayas; and
3	WHEREAS,	Using their military and economic powers, China puts other countries in a
4		position where they either submit to having their land taken over or risk
5		fighting and territory being used either way because China is much more
6		powerful than smaller countries; and
7	WHEREAS,	This hurts the sovereignty of these countries, many of which are allied
8		with the United States and present military and economic advantages
9		due to their positioning around China; now, therefore, be it
10	RESOLVED,	That the Congress here assembled recommend that NATO offers
11		membership to Asian countries at risk of Chinese encroachment and
12		interference.
13	FURTHER RES	SOLVED, Involvement in programs that help meet requirements for
14		membership will also be extended to countries interested in joining.

A Resolution to Back and Fund the Merida Initiative

1	WHEREAS,	currently, drug cartels have unmatched influence in Mexico, and
2	WHEREAS,	throughout the counternarcotics trade, members of cartels commit
3		heinous crimes and take deadly actions, and
4	WHEREAS,	the drug trade has given cartels a deadly grip on Mexico, and
5	WHEREAS,	previous attempts at solving the issue have come up short due to
6		ineffective strategies and underfunding, and
7	WHEREAS,	the Merida Initiative is a unique collaborative effort between the
8		American and Mexican governments; now, therefore, be it
9	RESOLVED,	that the Congress here assembled shall fully support the Merida
10		Initiative; and, be it
11	FURTHER RES	SOLVED, that Congress shall support the Merida Initiative with an amount
12		of funding that is deemed necessary.

A Bill to End Meat Subsidies

- out each year for ten years and redirected to the fruit and vegetable
- industry.
- SECTION 5 All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States will open diplomatic negotiations with North Korea.
3		C. The Countering America's Adversaries Through Sanctions Act
4		(CAATSA) is hereby repealed.
5		D. The United States will open talks with the government regarding free
6		trade agreements.
7	SECTION 2.	The United States will remove the sanctions in Section 1A and negotiate
8		trade agreements in Section 1B if and only if North Korea
9		A. Ends production of fissile materials, nuclear weapons, and nuclear
10		weapons' technologies, and
11		B. Implements greater transparency by allowing the United States
12		supervised visitation of nuclear facilities.

A Bill to Supply Universal Support for American Families (SUS AF)

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	A. Universal child care shall be provided to all American citizens.
3		B. Federal funding shall be provided to establish and support a network
