A Bill to Grant Statehood to the Territory of Puerto Rico

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2. **SECTION 1.** The Federal Government grants statehood to the territory of Puerto Rico
- 3. and the accompanying rights to its citizens.
- 4. **SECTION 2.** A state shall be defined as a territory subservient to the U.S. government in
- 5. Washington, D.C. that enjoys self-government via a governor, a state legislature, a state
- 6. court system, and federal government representatives.
- 7. **SECTION 3.** The Federal Government will oversee Puerto Rico's transition to
- 8. statehood.
- 9. **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect in January, 2025, after the 2024
- 10. presidential elections are complete.
- 11. **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Create a Tax on the Meat Industry

- 1 BE IN ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 SECTION 1. The United States Department of Agriculture shall implement a tax
- 3 of 30 percent of the price per pound, on each pound of all meat products sold to
- 4 consumers by retail or wholesale food establishments in an act to curb the
- 5 consumption of meat.
- 6 SECTION 2. The United States Department of Agriculture shall be defined as the
- 7 federal executive department responsible for farm policy, food safety, natural
- 8 resources management, federal nutrition programs, and economic growth.
- 9 SECTION 3. Any and all tax money gained from this bill shall be invested in
- 10 environmental growth and the reduction of climate change.
- 11 A. More specifically, this money shall go evenly towards the
- 12 Reducetarian Foundation and the Environmental Protection Agency.
- 13 SECTION 4. This bill shall be implemented in the fiscal tax year of 2024-2025.
- 14 SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and 15 void.

Round 2

A Bill to Forbid the Use of Credit Scores in Lending

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
- 2. SECTION 1. No lender may base a decision to approve or deny a loan on an individual's
- 3. credit score or credit report, nor may lenders use credit scores and reports to determine
- 4. interest rates or set credit limits.
- 5. SECTION 2. A credit report is defined as an account of an individual's history of
- 6. repaying debts. A credit
- 7. score is defined as a statistical representation of a credit report.
- 8. SECTION 3. Any lender found to be in violation of this legislation shall be banned from
- 9. engaging in lending for a period of 5 years and shall be liable for civil action from the
- 10. affected individual. If a lender again violates this legislation following the first 5-year
- 11. ban, the ban shall be reinstated permanently.
- 12. SECTION 4. This legislation shall be overseen by the Consumer Financial Protection
- 13. Bureau.
- 14. SECTION 5. This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2024.
- 15. SECTION 6. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Lower the National Voting Age to 16

- 1. **RESOLVED**, By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the
- 2. following article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the
- 3. United States,
- 4. Which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution
- 5. when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states
- 6. within seven years
- 7. from the date of its submission by the Congress:
- 8.ARTICLE -
- 9. **SECTION 1**: The Federal Government grants all citizens of at least 16
- 10. years the ability to vote in all local, state, and federal elections.
- 11. **SECTION 2**: Citizens shall be defined as any and all persons born
- 12. or naturalized in the United States who are subject to its
- 13. jurisdiction.
- 14. **SECTION 3**: The Congress shall have power to enforce this
- 15. article by appropriate legislation.

A Bill to Protect Access to Reproductive Healthcare

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2. Section 1: The protections for access to abortions from the 1973 Supreme Court decision Roe
- 3. vs. Wade shall be codified into federal law.
- 4. Section 2: The U.S. Treasury shall provide full funding to all those seeking an abortion.
- 5. Section 3: Peoples' bodily autonomy shall not be regulated in any way by the government on
- 6. the local, state or federal level.
- 7. Section 4: The U.S. Department of Justice will oversee the implementation and oversight of
- 8. this bill.
- 9. Section 5: This law will take effect immediately upon passage.
- 10. Section 6: All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void Submitted by Canyon Crest Academy

A Resolution to Join the CPTPP

- 1. WHEREAS, The United States left the TPP (Trans-Pacific Partnership) in 2017; and
- 2. WHEREAS, China has increased its dominance in trade across Asia with Regional
- 3. Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP) and other trade initiatives;
- 4. and
- 5. WHEREAS, Rising Chinese dominance has resulted into Debt-Trap Diplomacy and
- 6. coerces nations to be reliant on China; and
- 7. WHEREAS, The US no longer competes en masse with this growing political and
- 8. economic threat; and
- 9. WHEREAS, The TPP provided for trading partners and opportunities across the globe
- 10. for the US; and
- 11. WHEREAS, The newly-formed Comprehensive and Progressive Agreement for
- 12. Trans-Pacific Partnership (CPTPP) the TPP's replacement is now
- 13. ineffective without the United States' presence; now, therefore, be it
- 14. RESOLVED, By the Congress here assembled that the US begins to engage in
- 15. diplomatic negotiations with members of the CPTPP for the US to
- 16. renegotiate and sign the multilateral trade agreement.

A Bill to Ban Hydraulic Fracturing

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2. **SECTION 1**. Federal agencies will be prohibited from issuing permits for the expansion
- 3. of fracking or fracked oil and natural gas infrastructure, including infrastructure intended
- 4. to extract, transport, or burn natural gas or oil. By 2030 all fracking permits will be
- 5. revoked. By 2030 the United States will be free of fracking.
- 6. **SECTION 2**. Hydraulic fracturing or fracking is a process to extract underground
- 7. resources such as oil or gas from a geologic formation by injecting water, a propping
- 8. agent (e.g., sand), and chemical additives into a well under enough pressure to fracture
- 9. the geological formation.
- 10. **SECTION 3.** The Department of Energy and Environmental Protection Agency shall be
- 11. deemed responsible for implementing this bill
- 12. **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2024.
- 13. **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Ban "Best Before" Labels

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
- 2. SECTION 1. The printing or affixing of "best before" labels on food is henceforth
- 3. prohibited, as is any other indication that food should be consumed by a certain date
- 4. unless
- 5. consumption after that date would pose a verifiable health risk, as determined by the
- 6. Food and Drug Administration (FDA).
- 7. SECTION 2. The printing or affixing of expiration date labels and of "use by" labels on
- 8. foods that do pose a health risk when consumed after a certain point will may continue.
- 9. SECTION 3. This legislation shall be overseen by the FDA.
- 10. SECTION 4. This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2024.
- 11. SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Restructure The Mérida Initiative

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2. SECTION 1. The United States will allocate one billion dollars every year for the next
- 3. decade to counter-narcotics and development within Mexico.
- 4. SECTION 2. Counter-narcotics will be spearheaded by drug interdiction through greater
- 5. collaboration between the US Coast Guard and Mexican Navy with
- 6. increased targeting for smuggling networks. Economic development will
- 7. be defined as aid packages to develop agricultural industries and business
- 8. development for cartel-ridden areas.
- 9. SECTION 3. The Department of State, in collaboration with the Department of Defense
- 10. and USAID, will enforce this legislation.
- 11. A. Congress will receive annual updates regarding the status of each policy
- 12. annually and its totality biannually
- 13. SECTION 4. This legislation will go into effect in FY 2024
- 14. SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
