A Bill to Stop Student Surveillance

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	The United States of America will outlaw the usage of student surveillance
3		technology.
4	SECTION 2.	Student surveillance technology is defined as software that may track location,
5		record screens, and/or otherwise monitor, store, and/or record activities on
6		school-issued hardware.
7	SECTION 3.	All usage of student surveillance technology within the United States will be
8		banned. If student surveillance technology is discovered to be used, the school
9		district responsible shall be fined \$2,000. The Department of Education shall
10		oversee the implementation of this legislation.
11	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect June 30, 2023. All laws in conflict with this
12		legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Regard the Death Penalty as Cruel and Unusual Punishment

1	RESOLVED,	By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled that the following article is proposed as
2		an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which shall be valid to all
3		intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of
4		three-fourths of the several states within seven years from the date of its submission by
5		the Congress:
6		ARTICLE –
7	SECTION 1.	The death penalty, defined as the killing of a person by law enforcement as a
8		punishment for a given crime, shall be banned. Violation of this amendment shall be
9		considered "cruel and unusual punishment," as prohibited by the 8th Amendment of
10		the United States Constitution.
11	SECTION 2.	The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

A Resolution to Reduce Conspiracy Rhetoric

1	WHEREAS,	Current members of Congress and those running for Congressional seats have embraced
2		conspiracy theories that have repeatedly been debunked; and
3	WHEREAS,	Conspiracy theorists share this information widely on social media networks which are
4		then further shared and "liked" among Congressional networks; and
5	WHEREAS,	Conspiracy theories have produced genuine threats to factual debates within our
6		Congressional assemblies; and
7	WHEREAS,	Attempts to fact-check and curb the spread of conspiracy theories have resulted in
8		claims of being silenced by "Big Tech"; now, therefore, be it
9	RESOLVED,	That the Congress here assembled agree to eliminate the spread of conspiracy rhetoric
10		in all public forms, including on the Congressional debate floor, through social media
11		reactions, and in public appearances.

A Bill to Protect the Patient's Right to Interstate Telehealth

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2 **SECTION 1.** No state, district, or territory shall make or enforce any law prohibiting a 3 patient's right to seek medical or pharmaceutical care across state lines via 4 telehealth technologies so long as the relevant medical professional(s) deem(s) 5 such services safe to provide without in-person examination, nor shall any 6 insurance provider refuse coverage of such services on these grounds. 7 **SECTION 2.** No state, district, or territory shall criminalize the shipment or receipt of 8 pharmaceuticals prescribed under the conditions described in Section 1. This legislation shall be overseen by the Department of Health and Human 9 SECTION 3. 10 Services. 11 **SECTION 4.** This legislation shall take effect immediately upon passage. 12 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Apologize to the Republic of Chile

1	WHEREAS	In pursuit of its own selfish political gain, the United States took
2		substantive action to impede Salvador Allende's political campaigns and
3		to overthrow him once democratically elected; and
4	WHEREAS	The US supported his usurper, Augusto Pinochet, despite that man's
5		reprehensible human rights record; and
6	WHEREAS	Chile suffered enormously under Pinochet's regime, with thousands
7		executed and tens of thousands detained and/or tortured on the basis of
8		politics alone; now, therefore be it
9	RESOLVED	By the Congress here assembled that the US sincerely apologizes for a
10		reckless abuse of power and, as a leader of world democracies, for its
11		historical meddling in Chilean affairs, as well as for the damages that
12		meddling caused to Chile and the Chilean people; and
13	FURTHER RESOLVED	That Congress commits to supporting the right of Chileans and of all
14		peoples to self-determination and, moreover, to lend Chile financial or
15		other support in its continued efforts to recover from the damages of the
16		Pinochet regime.

A Bill to Return Looted Artworks and Artifacts

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2	SECTION 1.	Congress shall establish a committee in conjunction with the Institute of
3		Museum and Library Services (IMLS) and the Smithsonian Institution to survey
4		the collections of all public and private US museums, libraries, and art galleries
5		and compile a list of artworks and artifacts that have been looted, stolen, or
6		otherwise improperly taken from peoples and cultures, both within the US and
7		abroad.
8	SECTION 2.	Once this committee has completed its survey, it will publish its findings, and all
9		US museums, libraries, and art galleries will have one year to return any looted,
10		stolen, or improperly taken items to their rightful owners. The committee will
11		work with museums, libraries, and art galleries to determine best practices.
12	SECTION 3.	Following the one-year deadline, any museum, library, or art gallery that remains
13		in or acquires possession of illicit artworks or artifacts will be fined \$5000 per
14		item, and the item(s) in question shall be repossessed and transported back to
15		its/their rightful owner(s).
16	SECTION 4.	Congress hereby calls upon all nations to undertake similar measures to work to
17		mitigate the detrimental impacts of imperialism and the cultural theft it brought
18		about.
19	SECTION 5.	This legislation shall be overseen by the IMLS.
20	SECTION 6.	This legislation shall take effect immediately upon passage.
21	SECTION 7.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
