

Legislation # 1: A Bill to Prohibit Testing on Animals

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. Any company operating on U.S. soil, foreign or domestic is prohibited from testing on animals.

SECTION 2. Animal testing is defined as any scientific experiment or test in which a live animal is forced to undergo something that is likely to cause them pain, suffering, distress or lasting harm.

SECTION 3. This bill will be enforced by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2024.

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Legislation #2: A Resolution to Allow Digital Devices in the Classrooms for 3rd through 4th Grade Students

WHEREAS, Only about one in ten 4th graders use computers to access reading-related websites on a daily basis or nearly every day at school; and

WHEREAS, About 30 percent of students in 4th grade classrooms never, or hardly ever, use computers to access such reading material in school; and

WHEREAS, 66 percent of middle school and high school students have access to laptops; and

WHEREAS, Public schools in the United States now provide at least one computer for every five students, spend more than \$3 billion per year on digital content, and in 2015-16, for the first time, more state standardized tests for the elementary and middle school grades will be administered via technology; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, By the Congress here assembled that digital devices will be allowed for student use in the classroom for 3rd through 4th grade.

Legislation #3: A Bill to Fund Free Breakfast and Lunch in All Public Schools

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

SECTION 1. Congress shall direct sufficient funding to the Department of Education so that breakfast and lunch are provided free of charge to every public school student, regardless of household income, every school day of the year.

SECTION 2. To offset this funding need, the top tax rate on capital gains and qualified dividends shall be raised to 30%.

SECTION 3. Section 1 shall be overseen by the Department of Education, and Section 2 shall be overseen by the Internal Revenue Service.

SECTION 4. This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2025.

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Legislation # 4 (Finals): A Bill to Ban Tackle Football

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. States are not permitted to remit federal funds to any K-12 educational institution that allows tackle football.

SECTION 2. Any K-12 educational institution that receives funding directly from the United States federal government is also not permitted to fund tackle football.

SECTION 3. Tackle Football is defined as the team sport played in North America with an oval ball on a field marked out as a gridiron, particularly the version of American football that uses tackling to stop the forward progress of the ball carrier by seizing them and knocking them to the ground.

SECTION 4. On the first offense, educational institutions found to be in violation of this law will receive an official warning. On any subsequent offense, the offending educational institution will lose all federal funding for the remainder of the school year in which the violation took place.

SECTION 5. This legislation shall be enforced by the US Department of Education.

SECTION 6. This legislation will take effect on August 1, 2023.

SECTION 7. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
