- 4. A Bill to Alleviate Conflict in Yemen Marian
- 5. A Bill to Reform the American Wage Millard North
- 6. A Resolution to Withdraw from the United Nations LSW (need sponsorship)

These pieces of legislation will be debated in order. This docket is set and cannot be rearranged by the debaters or the presiding officer.

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Limit a President's Age

1	RESOLVED,	By two-thirds	of the Congress here assembled, that the following article is	
2		proposed as a	an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which	
3		shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when		
4		ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within		
5		seven years from the date of its submission by the Congress:		
6			ARTICLE	
7		SECTION 1:	All presidential candidates including incumbents are unable	
8			to take office if their age will pass 70 years before the end of	
9			their term.	
10		SECTION 2:	Any candidate who is unable to complete their term before	
11			reaching 70 years of age cannot run for president.	
12		SECTION 3:	The Congress shall have the power to enforce this article	
13			by appropriate legislation.	
13			by appropriate registation.

A Bill to Prohibit Online Gambling

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- 1. **SECTION 1**. Online gambling, or any bet or wager that involves the use of the
- 2. internet, will be prohibited.
- 3. **SECTION 2**. A bet or wager will be defined as risking currency or assets on the
- 4. outcome of a contest, sports event, or game subject to chance.
- 5. **SECTION 3.** This bill shall be enforced by the Department of Justice. Any violation of
- 6. this bill shall result in a fine not less than the value of the illegal bet.
- 7. **SECTION 4.** This legislation shall be implemented at the start of the 2024 fiscal year.
- 8. **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Install Term Limits on Supreme Court Justices

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2. **RESOLVED,** By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the following article
- 3. proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which shall be valid
- 4. to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of
- 5. three-fourths of the several states within seven years from the date of its submission by
- 6. the Congress:

ARTICLE --

- 7. **SECTION 1**: The Supreme Court shall have no more than nine justices. Justices shall serve in a term of twenty years. After the expiration of the term, justices shall have to be confirmed by the Senate again to serve a subsequent term. A justice's term shall begin on the June 20th after they are confirmed.
- 8. **SECTION 2**: The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate
- 9. legislation.

A Bill to Alleviate Conflict in Yemen

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2. **SECTION 1**. A. The United States will end all arms sales to Saudi Arabia and the
- 3. United Arab Emirates.
- 4. B. The United States will provide \$500 million to the United Nations
- 5. World Food Programme under the condition that it be allocated to food aid in Yemen.
- 6. C. The United States will provide \$500 million in humanitarian aid to
- 7. Islamic Relief USA to be used in Yemen for clean water and health care purposes,
- 8. electricity and internet access, education, women's protection, sanitation, and hygiene
- 9. assistance.
- 10. **SECTION 2**. "Arms sales" include government-to-government arms transfers and
- 11. commercial export licensing of U.S.-origin defense equipment and technologies.
- 12. **SECTION 3.** The Bureau of Political-Military Affairs and the U.S. Agency for
- 13. International Development will oversee the implementation of this bill.
- 14. Any company found in violation of the ban on arms sales shall be fined 15% of the
- 15. company's previous annual profit per violation.
- 16. **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect three months after passage.
- 17. **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Reform the American Wage
