



Springboard Scrimmage #13 Legislative Docket

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A Bill to Promote Privacy in Federally Funded Buildings

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2 **SECTION 1.** Any building which is administered in any part with federal funding shall convert
3 all of its restrooms into single-occupancy or single-family units within three years
4 of the passage of this legislation. All organizations, corporations, agencies, and
5 other entities that administer public spaces without federal funding are strongly
6 encouraged to implement similar changes with their own restrooms.

7 **SECTION 2.** For the purposes of this legislation, a single-occupancy restroom unit is defined as
8 a lockable bathroom accessible to any individual for that individual's sole and
9 private use, and a single-family restroom unit is defined as a lockable bathroom
10 accessible to any individual and that individual's family for their sole and private
11 use.

12 **SECTION 3.** Congress shall establish a committee tasked with implementing and overseeing
13 this transition and allocate to that committee a fund of \$500 million to be
14 dispersed to agencies or organizations in need of financial support to reach
15 compliance as the committee sees fit.

16 **SECTION 4.** Failure to comply with this legislation shall result in suspension of federal funding
17 for the agency or organization responsible for the facility in question until such
18 time as compliance is reached.

19 **SECTION 5.** This legislation shall be overseen by the Office for Civil Rights.

20 **SECTION 6.** This legislation shall take effect on July 1, 2023.

21 **SECTION 7.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Fund the Creation of a Monument to the Haudenosaunee Confederacy

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2 **SECTION 1.** Congress shall direct \$250 million to the National Park Service (NPS) to plan,
3 design, and construct a monument in Washington, D.C., honoring and celebrating
4 the Haudenosaunee Confederacy and its inestimable influence on the
5 government and history of these United States.

6 **SECTION 2.** The NPS shall have five years from the date of passage to complete these tasks
7 and open the monument to the public.

8 **SECTION 3.** The NPS is directed to work extensively with the Bureau of Indian Affairs and in
9 particular with the Cayuga Nation, the Saint Regis Mohawk Tribe, the Oneida
10 Nations of New York and Wisconsin, the Onondaga Nation, the Seneca Nation, the
11 Tonawanda Band of Seneca, the Seneca-Cayuga Nation, and the Tuscarora Nation
12 to ensure this monument is meaningful, authentic, and historically and culturally
13 appropriate.

14 **SECTION 4.** This legislation shall take effect at the start of the next fiscal year.

15 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Establish Mandatory Public Service

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2 **SECTION 1.** Each U.S. Citizen born after January 1, 2006, must complete at least two years of
3 public service by the time of their 30th birthday.

4 **SECTION 2.** This requirement may be satisfied through two full years of service in one of the
5 following: the Armed Forces (including the National Guard), the Peace Corps,
6 AmeriCorps, or the National Health Service Corps.

7 **SECTION 3.** The penalties for failing to meet this requirement shall be identical to those that
8 accompany failure to register for the Selective Service when required to do so.

9 **SECTION 4.** This legislation shall be overseen by the Selective Service System.

10 **SECTION 5.** This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2024.

11 **SECTION 6.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Commend Art Vandalism in the Name of Stopping Climate Change

1 **WHEREAS** Climate change poses an existential threat to human life and the future of
2 civilization; and

3 **WHEREAS** The nations of the world, including our own, continue to fall woefully
4 short of making the changes necessary to save our species from climate
5 change, or even to mitigate its impacts; and

6 **WHEREAS** The value of even the most celebrated works of art pales in comparison to
7 these deadly, catastrophic, and potentially irreversible perils; now,
8 therefore be it

9 **RESOLVED** by the Congress here assembled that this body commends the recent and
10 growing trend of vandalizing art in order to draw attention to the threat of
11 climate change and to the failure of global leaders to act appropriately to
12 stop it; and

13 **FURTHER RESOLVED** that states, territories, the federal district, counties, and municipalities
14 ought to consider light sentencing, or not pressing charges at all, for
15 perpetrators of these sorts of acts; and

16 **FURTHER RESOLVED** that Congress urges global leaders to take whatever measures are
17 necessary to save our planet so that the less powerful no longer feel
18 compelled to vandalize art in order to draw attention to the tragic
19 absurdity of this crisis and their helplessness in the face of it.

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Revoke the Presidential Veto Power

1 RESOLVED, That the following article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the
2 United States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the
3 Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several
4 states within seven years from the date of its submission by the Congress:

5 ARTICLE —

6 SECTION 1: The President shall no longer have the right to veto bills sent to
7 them by Congress.

8 SECTION 2: As the Constitution stipulates, a bill that the President does not
9 sign within ten days (Sundays excepted) will become law anyway.

10 SECTION 3: The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by
11 appropriate legislation.

A Bill to Subsidize Flood Insurance

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2 **SECTION 1.** Congress shall direct \$1 billion annually to the Federal Emergency Management
3 Agency (FEMA) to pay the premiums of any homeowners whom FEMA requires to
4 purchase flood insurance and whose household income is less than 400% of the
5 federal poverty level as determined by the Department of Health and Human
6 Services.

7 **SECTION 2.** Congress shall work with FEMA on a year-to-year basis to determine and
8 implement any necessary adjustments to the amount of this funding to more
9 appropriately meet the need outlined by this legislation.

10 **SECTION 3.** Funding for this legislation shall be sourced from a 1% tax increase on annual
11 fossil fuel industry revenue.

12 **SECTION 4.** This legislation shall be overseen by FEMA, with the exception of Section 3, which
13 shall be overseen by the Internal Revenue Service.

14 **SECTION 5.** This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2024.

15 **SECTION 6.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
