# A Bill to Halt The Federal Government From Giving Additional Funds to Public Institutions in States Which Have Banned African American Studies in Public Institutions

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	The United States Federal Government shall halt the ability for public high
2		schools (and or other public educational institutions) from asking for
3		additional funding if the respected state has any restrictions or bans on
4		African American Studies. This will help stop African American Studies
5		classes from being banned at a local and or state level.
6	SECTION 2.	African American Studies class is defined as any class which is the study of
7		people of African descent in the United States with linkages to Africa and
8		the African diaspora.
9	SECTION 3.	The government agency that will oversee enforcement are the following:
10		A. Any local, state, or federal court from any of the fifty states shall dismiss
11		any court case in which one party wants to ban an African American
12		Studies course specifically.
13		B. "Dismissal" of a court case in which one party wants to ban an African
14		American Studies course shall not interject with other court cases
15		which deal with mistreatment or misconduct in the classroom etc.
16	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on the school year 2024-25. All laws in
17		conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

### CONGRESSIONAL DEBATE LEGISLATION

## A Resolution to Impose Sanctions on Surveillance States

1	WHEREAS,	Adversarial nations such as China have increased surveillance
2		on US military and security sites; and
3	WHEREAS,	These surveillance attempts pose substantial threats to
4		national security, safety of US citizens, and a potential
5		compromising of classified information; and
6	WHEREAS,	Such aggressive actions have increased despite peaceful
7		diplomatic negotiation on the behalf of the US;
8	RESOLVED,	That the Congress here assembled will strongly encourage the
9		imposition of economic sanctions on any countries and state
10		parties from here on engaged in surveillance of the US. These
11		include, but are not limited to, tampering with government
12		secrets, physical encroachment on US territory, and
13		unwarranted espionage on US citizens.
14	FURTHER F	RESOLVED, That formal reprimands and diplomatic statements
15		be issued in conjunction with the imposed sanctions.

## A Bill to Establish Net Neutrality and Ensure Equal Access to the Internet for All Users

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	It shall be unlawful for a Internet service provider, insofar as the provider is			
2		engaged in providing fixed broadband Internet access service, to engage in the			
3		restriction, blocking, or discrimination of users and of lawful internet content			
4		based on but not limited to source, destination, content, or application			
5	SECTION 2.	(1) The term "internet service provider" or "ISP" means any person or entity			
6		providing internet access services to the public for a fee.			
7		(2) The term "net neutrality" means the principle that all data transmitted over the			
8		internet should be treated equally, without discrimination or preference given to			
9		any particular websites or services.			
10		(3) "Paid prioritization" means the offering of enhanced or prioritized transmission			
11		of any content, application, or service over the internet in exchange for payment			
12		or other consideration.			
	SECTION 3.	Prohibiting discrimination by ISP's			
13		(a) No ISP shall block, slow down, or otherwise discriminate against any lawful			
14		internet traffic based on its source, destination, or content.			
15		(b) No ISP shall prioritize or charge differently for internet access based on the type			
16		of content, service, or application being accessed by the user.			
17	SECTION 4.	ISPs must be transparent in their network management practices and must			
18		disclose such practices to the public and the Federal Communications Commission			
19	SECTION 5.	ISPs are prohibited from offering or engaging in paid prioritization, or offering			
20		enhanced or prioritized transmission of any content, application, or service over			
21		the internet in exchange for payment or other consideration.			
22	SECTION 6.	The Federal Communications Commission shall have the authority to enforce the			
23		provisions of this Act and may impose penalties on ISPs that include but are not			
24		limited to monetary fines, cease and desist orders, revocation of licenses, and			
25		court injunctions			
26	SECTION 7.	This Bill shall take effect on the date of its enactment

### A Bill to Improve Public and Livestock Health

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	The usage of preventative antibiotics on livestock will be prohibited.
2	SECTION 2.	
3	a. Let "liv	estock" be defined as farm animals being raised for human consumption Let
4	b. Let "an	ntibiotics" be defined as a medicine that inhibits the growth of or destroys
5	microo	organisms.
6	SECTION 3.	The US Department of Agriculture will be in charge of enforcing this
7		operation.
8	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1st, 2024. All laws in conflict with
9		this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# A Bill to Recognize the Independence and Sovereignty of the Republic of Somaliland

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	The United States will officially recognize the independence and
3		sovereignty of the Northern Territory of Somalia known as Somaliland. The
4		United States will set up an official embassy in the de facto capital of
5		Hargeisa and begin diplomatic relations with the new nation.
6	SECTION 2.	Republic of Somaliland- A unrecognized breakaway state in the northern
7		region of Somalia.
8		Sovereignty- The authority of a state to govern itself or another state.
9	SECTION 3.	The United States State Department will handle the process of setting up
10		new diplomatic relations with the Republic of Somaliland and will handle
11		any conflicts with the current government in charge of Somalia that may
12		come from this bill.
13	SECTION 4.	This legislation will go into effect on June 1, 2024.

**SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

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# `A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Ensure Public Safety

1	WHEREAS,	The year of tw	venty twenty-two concluded with six hundred forty-seven

3	WHEREAS,	Firearm induc	ced self harm continues to rise, and
4	WHEREAS,	The right of tl	he people to bear arms has been used for harm rather than
5		security,	
6	RESOLVED,	By two-thirds	of the Congress here assembled, that the following article is
7		proposed as a	an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which
8		shall be valid	to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when
9		ratified by the	e legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within
10		·	rom the date of its submission by the Congress:
11		seven years n	ARTICLE
12		CECTION 4	
13		SECTION 1:	The second article of amendment to the Constitution of the
14			United States is hereby repealed.
15		<b>SECTION 2:</b>	The transportation or importation into any State, Territory,
16			or possession of firearms within the United States is hereby
17			prohibited.
18		SECTION 3:	The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by
19			appropriate legislation.

## A Bill to Establish a Tax on Agricultural Carbon Emissions to Restrict Greenhouse Gas Production

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.		
2	(1) A tax is hereby imposed on agricultural carbon emissions from farms located in the		
3	United	States at a rate of \$10 per metric ton of carbon dioxide equivalent emitted	
4	from s	such farms during any taxable year. The tax shall be paid by the owner or	
5	opera <sup>-</sup>	tor of such a farm at the time and in the manner prescribed by the Secretary	
6	of the	Treasury.	
7	(2) Exemp	otions from this tax include emissions resulting from natural disasters or	
8	other extraordinary events beyond the control of the owner or operator of the		
9	farm, activities conducted pursuant to a permit issued under applicable state and		
10	federa	federal law, and activities conducted pursuant to an approved conservation plan	
11	developed by a State agency or other qualified entity.		
12	SECTION 2.	Applicable state and federal law is defined as the law governing the	
13		territory enclosing the farm in question.	
14	SECTION 3.	The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) shall be responsible for the	
15		implementation of this bill through the administration and regulation of	
16		these agricultural carbon emission taxes.	
17	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2024. All laws in conflict with	

this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

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# A bill to create an overall health, physical education, and sexual wellness curriculum across public schools in America to maximize consistency in adolescent health.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

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2	SECTION 1.	Currently, in the United States, each school district and county decide what
3		and when students learn regarding sex health and wellness. This creates ar
4		inconsistency across the nation, and the bill presented today eliminates
5		that confusion by adhering to one curriculum. In it, there will be specific
6		requirements for elementary, middle, and high school, and each student
7		will take Health and Physical Education to graduate.
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9	SECTION 2.	No ambiguous terms that are not obviously clear were used in this bill; all
10		language and vocabulary falls under common knowledge
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12	SECTION 3.	This bill partners with the U.S. Department of education in setting the
13		standards used to teach health, physical education, and sexual wellness for
14		K-12 public schools.
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16	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on August 1 2024. All laws in conflict with
17		this legislation are hereby declared null and void. Public schools and their
18		educators forfeit previous lesson plans that interfere with this new
19		curriculum.
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### A Resolution to Normalize Responsible Recreational Cannabis Use

1	WHEREAS	Being transparent about responsible use of recreational drugs provides a valuable and
2		instructive alternative to abusive and unhealthy habits and models mature life choices; and
3	WHEREAS	Cannabis has been shown to be no more dangerous than alcohol or nicotine and is in many
4		respects safer than these more socially acceptable drugs; and
5	WHEREAS	Nearly half of all U.S. citizens now live in states where it is legal to purchase and consume
6		cannabis recreationally, and it is likely just a matter of time before recreational cannabis
7		use is legal nationwide; now, therefore be it
8	RESOLVED	by the Congress here assembled that this body encourages responsible users of cannabis
9		who consume the drug in jurisdictions where doing so is legal, especially when those users
10		are government employees or officeholders such as members of the Congress, to speak
11		openly and tactfully about their use in much the same way as responsible users of alcohol
12		and nicotine do in the status quo.

### A Resolution to Protect Virtual and Augmented Reality Users

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

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2	WHEREAS,	Virtual and augmented reality blurs the line between the digital and
3		physical worlds creating a sense of being present in the virtual world; and
4	WHEREAS,	Global virtual reality is steadily growing and the market size is expected to reach
5		\$22.9 billion by the end of 2020, with the United States' market size projected
6		to be \$18.8 billion; and
7	WHEREAS,	The demand for virtual reality applications is increasing in the healthcare
8		sector, gaming, and entertainment media, automotive, manufacturing, and
9		other industries. Of these, gaming and entertainment media covers a 40.5% of
10		the global virtual reality market share; and
11	WHEREAS,	Steam, an online video game distribution service, reported in June of 2019 that
12		the monthly-connected VR headsets on Steam surpassed 1 million for the first
13		time; and
14	WHEREAS,	Virtual reality offers the potential to revolutionize education and training
15		in numerous professional fields; and
16	WHEREAS,	Without established community norms and regulations, virtual reality
17		can become an area for increased virtual assault and harassment; and
18	WHEREAS,	According to Pew Research Center, 41 percent of Americans were subjected
19		to harassing behavior online, while 66 percent witnessed this behavior. For
20		more severe forms of harassment, such as physical threats, sexual harassment
21		or stalking, nearly 18 percent of Americans were targets; now, therefore, be it
22	RESOLVED,	By the Congress here assembled that Congress will create a commission
23		comprised of representatives from the Entertainment Software Rating Board,
24		Federal Communications Commission, and the Federal Bureau of Investigation
25		to oversee the establishment of codes of conduct for virtual and augmented
26		reality users in the United States.
