- 7. districts house seat will be refused a seat in congress.
- 8. Until an election can be held with fair congressional district lines, the current house member
- 9. would maintain their position.

- 11. Force.
- 12. Article 3: This bill will take effect upon passage.
- 13. Article 4: This commission will operate using all Federal Advisory Committee Act requirements.

A Resolution to Encourage States to adopt Top 4 Primaries used with Ranked Choice Voting

1 Whereas: First-past-the-post election systems prevent fair elections from taking 2 place and prevent voters from having a representative that they agree with on policy; 3 Whereas: Someone running for office could be running in a very large field and win 4 their race despite getting less than a quarter of the vote; 5 Whereas: People getting elected without a majority vote prevents the majority of a 6 community from having a representative that represents their beliefs, and only represents the beliefs of a plurality; 7 8 Whereas: A top-4 primary system would allow for every candidate to run on one 9 ballot and the top 4 vote getters would advance to a general election where voters would 10 have the opportunity to rank the candidates, meaning if no one reaches a majority of 11 votes, those votes would be redistributed to the candidates that remain, that the voters 12 ranked second, third, or fourth;

13 Therefore: Be it resolved, by the Student Congress here assembled that the American

14 Government encourages all states to implement a top-4 primary system as seen in Alaska.

Bill #1562 A Bill to End Partisan Gerrymandering

Article I: Independent redistricting committees shall be formed to redraw America's congressional district maps for their respective states to prevent the act of partisan gerrymandering by politicians.

Article II: Independent committees shall be defined as committees which do not consist of a state, local, or federal government official. The committees shall be selected randomly from the adult population of each state. Partisan gerrymandering shall be defined as the act of drawing state government and congressional districts such that one political party can gain an unfair advantage over others in elections.

Article III: This legislation shall take effect in FY 2025.

Article IV: The United States Census Bureau shall be tasked with the implementation of this legislation.

A. These committees shall be re-selected immediately following the results of the U.S. Census every 10 years.
