- 1.SECTION 1: This bill will necessitate preferential voting across the United States. This includes
- 2. both state government and national representative voting.
- 3.SECTION 2: Preferential voting, also known as preference voting, is defined as a voting system
- 4. which voters rank their candidates (or options) in a sequence of first or second (or third,
- 5.etc.) on their respective ballots.
- 6. **SECTION 3:** The United States Department of Justice will oversee the implementation and 7.enforcement of this bill.
- 8. **SECTION 4:** This bill will be fully introduced and implemented within 3 years of passing.
- 9. **SECTION 5:** All laws in conflict with the legislation are hereby declared null and void.

1. SECTION 1 .	All public school lunches in the United States shall be free. Extra food	
2.	that is not included in the school lunch shall be paid for separately.	
3. SECTION 2.	A school lunch consists of a main entrée, low-fat/fat-free milk, and a	
4.	serving of a fruit/vegetable. Extra food consists of any more food items	
5.	not included in the school lunch.	
6. SECTION 3.	The United States Department of Education shall oversee the	
7.	enforcement of this bill. The Internal Revenue Service shall oversee the	
8.	funding of this bill.	
9.	A. Funds for this bill will be offset by a new 10% tax on the revenues of	
10.	the confectionary industry, and a new 7% tax on the revenues of the	
11.	fossil fuel industry.	
12. SECTION 4.	This legislation shall take effect November 1, 2023.

7		history of repaying debts. A credit score is defined as a
8		statistical representation of a credit report.
9	SECTION 3.	This legislation shall be overseen by the Consumer Financia
10		Protection Bureau.
11		A. Any lender found to be in violation of this legislation shall
12		be banned from engaging in lending for a period of 5
13		years and shall be liable for civil action from the affected
14		individual. If a lender again violates this legislation
15		following the first 5-year ban, the ban shall be reinstated
16		permanently.
17	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2025.

A Bill to Implement a National Standard for Paid Parental Leave

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Individuals who have become legal guardians of a dependent in the four
3		months preceding their leave are guaranteed a minimum 16 weeks of job
4		protected parental leave, of which must be paid at 100% of the
5		individual's salary at the time of leave.
6	SECTION 2.	Legal dependent: natural born and adopted children, special needs
7		individuals, household members covered by a conservatorship or
8		guardianship, and elders living in household claimed on tax returns as
9		dependents. Job-protected leave: time away from work wherein an
10		individual is not at risk of losing employment due to their absence.
11	SECTION 3.	The U.S. Department of Labor's National Labor Relations Board will
12		oversee implementation of this legislation.
13		A. Employees can charge employers with noncompliance to this
14		standard, and the NLRB will investigate and conduct an informal trial
15		to render a decision regarding the matter. Employers or employees
16		dissatisfied with NLRB's decisions may file opposition with a court of
17		appeals and ultimately the U.S. Supreme Court.
18	SECTION 4.	This law will go into effect October 1, 2025.
19	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.



A Bill to Fund Education

1	BE IT ENACTED BY	THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	The United States shall impose the following:	
3		A. Upon completion of a college degree, state certified teachers,	
4		who work in public schools, will be eligible for a loan forgiveness	
5		program upon completion of a 4-year teaching contract. B. An	
6		increase of 10% property taxes and an additional 10% income	
7		taxes on large corporations shall be allocated to the Department	
8		of Education.	
9	SECTION 2.	A. "Loan Forgiveness Program" will be defined as "a debt being	
10		retired early or "forgiven" in finance parlance."	
11		B. "Large Corporation" will be defined as "a corporation that had,	
12		or whose predecessor had, taxable income of \$1 million or more	
13		for any of the 3 tax years immediately preceding the 2021 tax	
14		year, or if less, the number of years the corporation has been in	
15		existence."	
16	SECTION 3.	The Department of Education and the IRS will oversee the	
17		enforcement of this bill. Any certified teacher who does not finish	
18		their 4-year teaching contract will have to pay back their proration	
19		with a 10% interest.	
20	SECTION 4.	This legislation will be enacted upon the day of passage.	
21	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and

A Bill to Make the Use of Polygraph Examination Results Admissible in Court

1	BE IT ENACTED B	Y THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	The results of questioning through the use of Polygraphs will	
3		be allowed to be used in criminal proceedings.	
4	SECTION 2.	A Polygraph is a machine designed to detect and record	
5		changes in physiological characteristics, such as a person's	
6		pulse and breathing rates, used especially as a lie detector.	
7		Criminal proceeding is the adversary judicial process	
8		prosecuted by a public officer and initiated by a formal	
9		complaint, information, or indictment charging a person with	
10		an offense denominated criminal by applicable law and	
11		punishable by death, imprisonment, or a jail sentence.	
12	SECTION 3.	The implementation of this bill will be overseen by the	
13		Department of Justice.	
14	SECTION 4.	This bill will be implemented on December 31, 2023.	
15	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared

A Bill to Ban Research into Artificial Intelligence

2	SECTION 1.	Further research into artificial intelligence (AI) is hereby
3		banned.
4	SECTION 2.	The US strongly encourages all other nations to enact
5		similar bans and warns those nations that fail to do so that
6		the US will consider a variety of consequences to bring
7		about a global end to Al research.
8	SECTION 3.	The use of foreign AI technology is also banned. Any
9		company, organization, or individual found to be utilizing
10		foreign AI technology will be fined \$1 billion and the
11		responsible party/parties shall be imprisoned for no fewer
