A Bill to Legalize Alcohol Consumption from the Age of 18

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1 .	Alcohol consumption is now legal from the age of 18. Once you reach the age of
2		18, a person would have the ability to buy and consume light alcohol in a
3		regulated environment with supervision until the age of 21. Hard alcoholic
4		beverages will not be included in this bill or sold to persons under the age of 21.
5		Individuals under 18 remain subject to current underage drinking laws.
6	SECTION 2.	Light alcohols will include beer, wine, or other beverages made through
7		fermentation. Hard alcoholic beverages include whisky, gin, rum, brandy, tequila,
8		vodka, distilled spirits, or alcoholic beverages produced by distilling grains,
9		vegetables, or fruits.
10	SECTION 3.	This legislation will take effect on January 1st 2024.
11	SECTION 4.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Recognize the Growing Loneliness Epidemic in America to Better the American Population

1	WHEREAS	, Loneliness is an epidemic growing throughout American society; and
2	WHEREAS	, As of 2020, according to the National Library of Medicine, 60% of
3		Americans report being lonely, as well as experiencing issues regarding
4		the ability to interact with others. This percentage is a 13% rise from the
5		report published two years prior in 2018. With growing suicide rates in
6		America, especially in America's youth, it becomes imperative for the
7		U.S. Government to properly address this issue.
8	WHEREAS	, The need for the US government to address this epidemic grows
9		further after looking into the growing consequences an individual faces
10		because of severe loneliness, such as, but not limited to, earlier mortality
11		rates, physical and emotional problems, anxiety, heart disease, and
12		substance abuse, which were all found in a study published by Harvard
13		medical in 2021; and
14	WHEREAS	, It is important that the US government addresses loneliness as an
15		epidemic growing throughout America to better the lives of the Americans
16		who are suffering from this issue and will hopefully be able to find help
17		through future government legislation and policy; now, therefore, be it
18	RESOLVEI	D, That the Congress here assembled shall hereby publicly address
19		Loneliness as an epidemic that is a growing concern for American society;
20		and, be it
21		RESOLVED , That the US government will make future efforts to implement impactful legislation that will aid in putting a stop to this
22		implement impactful legislation that will aid in putting a stop to this epidemic.

A Bill to Prohibit the Execution of Unnecessary and Cruel Veterinary Procedures

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	No veterinary practitioners shall be allowed to perform any unnecessary
2		and cruel procedures on animals suggested by either their own wills or
3		the wills of the customers, punishable by state and federal courts.
4	SECTION 2.	A. Unnecessary and cruel procedures shall be defined as any procedures
5		that are not medically necessary to preserve the animal's life or
6		wellbeing, excluding those essential to population control like spaying
7		and neutering. Procedures under this bill include but are not limited to
8		debarking, declawing, tail docking, ear cropping, etc. Any procedures
9		called into question that were not previously listed shall be reviewed by
.0		the overseeing agencies specified under Section 3.
1		B. Any creature brought in to be treated by the veterinarians by a
.2		customer shall be considered an animal with protection under this law
13		including but not limited to cats, dogs, birds, rodents, etc.
L4	SECTION 3.	This legislation shall be overseen jointly by the United States Department
15		of Agriculture (USDA) and the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service
16		(APHIS).
17		A. Any necessary funding for the implementation of this bill shall be
.8		delegated by congress through a case by case basis after a request
L9		from both overseeing departments.
20		B. If the overseeing departments have disputes over what specific
21		procedures shall be outlawed by this legislation, the Secretary's
22		Advisory Committee on Animal Health (SACAH) shall be called on to
23		settle the dispute, introducing any necessary changes to this bill
24		following the meeting.
25	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2024.

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Remove the Exception for Slavery in Prisons from the 13th Amendment

1	RESOLVED, By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the following article
2	is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States,
3	which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution
4	when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states
5	within seven years from the date of its submission by the Congress: ARTICLE 13
6	SECTION 1 : The Following amendment "Neither slavery nor
7	involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime
8	whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall
9	exist within the United States, or any place subject to their
10	jurisdiction." Shall be changed to "Neither slavery nor
11	involuntary servitude shall exist within the United States,
12	or any place subject to their jurisdiction under any
13	circumstances."
14	SECTION 2 : The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by
15	appropriate legislation.

A Bill to Require a License for the Ownership of Firearms

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1 .	In order to purchase and own a firearm of any type, an individual will be
2		required to have a gun owner's license. Current owners of guns without a
3		license are required to obtain a license within six months after enactment.
4		Failure to do so will result in a minimum fine of \$1,000, and seizure of
5		unlawful firearms. This legislation will take effect in every state.
6	SECTION 2.	Firearms being defined as every type of gun including muzzleloaders.
7	SECTION 3.	The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms will oversee the issue of
8		firearm licenses. The Bureau of Tobacco, Alcohol, and Firearms will issue
9		licenses to any individual having no criminal record of domestic violence,
10		as well as having passed a psychiatric evaluation, ensuring the individual is
11		mentally fit to safely own a firearm. A license will need to be renewed
12		every four years.
13	A.	One who has purchased a gun without a license will be fined a
14		minimum of \$1,000 and their gun(s) will be taken.
15	В.	Distributors of firearms without requiring a license will be fined a
16		minimum of \$5,000, their Federal firearms license will be revoked, and
17		their business will be taken down.
18	C.	One in possession of a gun without a license or permit will be fined a
19		minimum of \$1,000 and if they own said gun, their gun(s) will be taken
20	SECTION 4.	Funding for the legislation will come from the Bureau of Tobacco,
21		Alcohol, and Firearms's annual budget, a \$25 fee for license issue and
22		renewal, as well as from fines violators of this law will pay.
23	SECTION 5.	This legislation will take effect on 9/1/2030.
24	SECTION 6.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Modify the Life Sentence to Include the Entire **Duration of the Accused's Lifespan**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	Any life sentences prescribed by state or federal courts shall be legally
2		mandated to last the full duration of the sentenced lifespan, instead of
3		the 15 to 25-year current policy.
4	SECTION 2.	In all cases where the accused is deemed to serve a life sentence for their
5		crimes, the accused will remain in prison for the remainder of their life
6		until death, unless otherwise stated.
7	SECTION 3.	This bill will be adopted by the U.S. Congress and the Department of
8		Justice.
9		A. Those who do not adapt to this bill after January 31, 2024, will face a
.0		fine of \$2,500 and a year of prison.
1	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 31, 2024. All laws in conflict
.2		with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

An Amendment to the U.S. Constitution to Implement a Maximum Age for the President of the United States

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	Section 1: Any Candidates for the presidency of the United States shall not exceed the age of
2	70 years old at the age of candidacy. If you are beyond this age, you are not eligible
3	for office. This will ensure that our leader is fit to run at any given time, as well as
4	make it easier for the next generations to have a chance at the presidency.
5	Section 2: Any individual who is sworn into office before they hit the age cap of 70, but turn
6	said age whilst in office, may remain in office for their four year term. However,
7	they are not eligible to run for the office of the presidency again.
8	Section 3: This legislation also applies to the office of the vice president. However, state
9	governments will not have this age cap implemented for any state offices
10	Section 4: All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Reform Animal Treatment in the Food Industry to Reduce Animal Cruelty

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1. Inspections of large-scale industrial animal farms will
2	occur randomly every six months to ensure that animals are treated
3	correctly in their environment.
1	SECTION 2 . Animal cruelty is defined as depriving an animal of food,
5	water, shelter, and veterinary care. Torturing, maiming, or killing animals is
5	also animal cruelty. The food industry denotes a complex global industry
7	that clusters many small- to large-scale industries or businesses that are
3	related to food item production, processing, supply, and distribution.
)	SECTION 3. The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) will
10	conduct inspections and take action as needed to ensure the proper
11	treatment of the animals. Inspectors who notice that the animals are being
12	mistreated will require the offender to take courses to learn how to have a
13	safe environment for the animals. While taking these courses, the company
14	will be forced to cease selling all products. Then they will be fined 30% of
15	all earnings they had made. Fines will go to inspectors and animal cruelty
16	awareness companies.

A Bill to Instate a Standardized Speed Limit on All Interstates

1	BE IT ENACT	TED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	All United States rural interstates will have a standardized speed limit of
3		70 mph and all Urban interstates will have a standardized speed limit of
4		65 mph unless marked otherwise on concerns of safety.
5	SECTION 2 .	Interstate is defined as one of a system of expressways covering the 48
6		contiguous states. A rural interstate is defined as an interstate highway
7		outside an urbanized area of 50,000 or more population. A Urban
8		interstate is defined as an interstate with connections through and
9		around cities.
10	SECTION 3.	The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) will oversee
11		enforcement in which any state who fails to change or remove current
12		signs set over the standardized limit will be fined 5000 dollars per sign for
13		each fiscal year the change hasn't been met. The NHTSA will also provide
14		\$1.5 million dollars towards the purchase of replacement signs.
15	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on FY 2025. All laws in conflict with this
16		legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Replace the Presidential Electoral System

1	RESOLVED,	By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the following article is proposed as
2		an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which shall be valid to all intents
3		and purposes as part of the Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-
4		fourths of the several states within seven years from the date of its submission by the
5		Congress:
6	ARTICLE	
7	SECTION 1:	The purpose of this Article is to replace the Electoral College system with an Instant-
8		Runoff Voting system (IRV system), to ensure that a fair vote of the people elects the
9		President of the United States.
10	SECTION 2:	The Article amends the Constitution of the United States to replace the current Electoral
11		College system with an IRV system, under which voters shall rank candidates in order
12		of preference, and the candidate who receives a majority of votes shall be elected
13		President. In the event no candidate receives a majority of more than 51% of the total
14		vote, the lowest ranked candidate will be eliminated and their votes redistributed based
15		on the voters' second choice. The process repeats until a candidate reaches a majority.
16	CECTION 2	
17	SECTION 3:	The Article also establishes new procedures for the administration of the IRV system,
18		those being the use of ranked- choice ballots, the creation of a new independent
19		commission to oversee the administration of the IRV system, and the establishment of
20		new time limits for the resolution of disputes.
21	SECTION 5:	The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

7	SECTION 3.	The FBI (Federal Bureau of Investigation) will oversee enforcement of this
8		bill along with the specific enforcement mechanism.
9		A. If all parties do not consent or if one is unaware the violator will be
10		charged with a felony for adultery.
11		B. If charged will adultery the violator will be prosecuted in Federal
12		Court.
13	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on Jan 1, 2024. All laws in conflict with this
14		legislation are hereby declared null and void.
