#### *Will X event be Online or In-Person?*

Per this Tournament Invitation: "This Fall, Congressional Debate and all eight Speech events will take place In-Person in New Haven. Lincoln Douglas, Public Forum, Policy, and Parliamentary Debate will be held Online. For a full explanation of our motivations in implementing this structure as well as its logistical details, please refer to the 'Note On Hybrid Structure' on page 5."

#### May I register as an independent entry?

Per this Tournament Invitation: "This tournament is open only to institutions that award high school diplomas. Students must be representing the school they attend, and their entries sanctioned by that school. Therefore, we will not be allowing independent entries. All entries must be affiliated with a diploma-granting school and registered by an authorized adult from that school."

If you are an International School or Academy, please contact us to confirm your eligibility.

#### Why am I unable to double-enter a speech entry in X event and Y event?

Per this Tournament Invitation: "On Saturday, Speech Events will take place across two sites. All Platform Events will be at one site (EX, INF, and OO), and all Interpretation Events will be at a different site. Students may only double-enter across events at a particular site."

#### Will my entries be admitted off the waitlist?

Per this Tournament Invitation: "Each year, we receive many questions concerning whether teams will be able to leave the waitlist. We will NOT be able to answer these inquiries, for the answer is a variable function of our ability to promote a fair break, our ability to ensure a quality judge pool, whether other schools drop entries, and whether we can increase physical space for the tournament."

## **Note On Hybrid Structure**

#### **Motivation**

As many of you know, the Yale Debate Association is a non-profit organization run entirely by undergraduate Yale students who share a passion for debate. We are sponsored by Yale University as a student organization, but we are self-sufficient in our operations and finances. This freedom allows us to host multiple tournaments for high-school and college debaters each year, but it also leaves us vulnerable when challenges strike.

As we were planning this Fall's tournament, two such challenges arose: a contract signed by a YDA Board over three years ago—unexpectedly—set us back significantly financially; and coinciding student events constricted already limited physical space on Yale's campus, decimating our access to free tournament rooms. As a result, we realized we did not have the capacity to host the Yale Invitational at the scale we had in previous years. In this difficult position, we turned to the Speech and Debate community for input.

On July 11<sup>th</sup>, we sent a survey to the schools that attended our tournament last year, soliciting feedback on three potential structures for our tournament: a limited In-Person tournament, a Hybrid tournament, or an entirely Online tournament. We also invited interested schools to participate through our Tabroom page. Over the course of the survey period, which we ended on July 21<sup>st</sup>, we received responses from over 70 schools, and we are incredibly grateful for the time every coach offered us in completing our form.

The data itself showed great support for In-Person competition, but indicated the changes required (event cap decreases, higher registration fees, multiple external sites, etc.) would make the experience untenable for many schools. At the same time, some programs ranked an Online experience first for its accessibility and efficiency. But most importantly, the nearly unanimous second choice for both of these groups—as well as the first choice for many programs—was our Hybrid structure.

In making our final decision, we worked closely with our Tournament Chair Sarah Donnelly and ultimately decided that we ought to support In-Person competition when and where we can. Since we have the resources to host some In-Person programming this year, we elected to pursue a Hybrid Structure. We recognize this choice is not without its own negative consequences: we empathize with schools who do not wish to stratify their Speech and Debate programs in travel, and those debaters who will not be able to join us in New Haven this Fall.

We strongly believe, however, that this option optimizes the amount of Speech and Debate that will be able to take place in its proper form and maximizes access to this activity - through our tournament - as much as possible. Most importantly, though, we find this all to be a single-year complication, and we are looking forward to inviting *everyone* back to New Haven again next Fall.

## Logistics

Congressional Debate and all eight Speech events will take place In-Person in New Haven. Lincoln Douglas, Public Forum, Policy, and Parliamentary Debate will be held Online.

Schools are able—and encouraged—to participate in both In-Person and Online events.

#### *Improvements*

Despite the difficulties we have faced this summer, we remain aware of the imperfections with last year's tournament. We are highly appreciative of the efforts of last year's Tournament Directors, but we also recognize that the 2022 Yale Invitational failed to meet community expectations in a number of areas, including but not limited to hospitality, the variety and provision of food, as well as trophy quality.

We want to note here that we have heard these complaints, and we are applying ourselves full-measure to addressing their correction. With respect to food, lunch and dinner will be available for purchase on Saturday at both of our In-Person sites. In an effort to increase Judge Benefits, In-Person judges will receive these meals at no charge while also maintaining access to a Judge's Lounge stocked with water and snacks throughout the tournament.

For all competitors, we are working on acquiring higher-quality trophies, and we have appointed a team to handle the shipping of trophies after the tournament to guarantee their timely delivery.

We also received input in our survey indicating our tentative Online pricing was too expensive. We have adjusted accordingly and decreased our Online Entry Fees by a cumulative \$25. In the same vein, we have kept Entry Fees for Congressional Debate and Speech Events the same as they were last year, despite inflation's upward pressure on our food and site costs.

#### Changes

Unfortunately, not all the changes we would have preferred to make this year are feasible. As was explained in our survey, In-Person competition will be offered at a decreased capacity this year, and thus **we will not be offering any Shuttle services**. To mitigate the impacts of this change, however, for the Saturday of the tournament, we will only be using *one external site* beyond Yale's campus. We will moreover be releasing our Event Location information on **Friday, September 1**<sup>st</sup> so that schools can plan their transportation routes well ahead of time. All rounds on Sunday will take place on Yale's campus.

#### Trophy Pickup

If your school is attending our tournament BOTH Online and In-person, we would like to distribute any debate awards your debate entries earn the Sunday of the tournament on Yale's Campus. The logistics of this distribution are forthcoming.

## **In-Person Rules and Hospitality**

This section applies to In-Person schools and attendees traveling for Congressional Debate and/or Speech Events.

#### COVID-19

This is our second year welcoming you back to in-person competition in New Haven since our two-year pandemic hiatus. To ensure the safety of this effort, Yale University Visitor Policy *encourages* all visitors, (that is all tournament attendees who are not students, faculty, staff, or postdoctoral/postgraduate trainees), to be "up-to-date with COVID-19 vaccinations as recommended by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention before coming to campus."

To ensure the health and safety of other students, staff, and the greater New Haven community, Yale University Visitor Policy also *encourages* visitors "to test for COVID-19 before participating in a university event and/or accessing a university location," and notes visitors must "refrain from coming to campus if they test positive for COVID-19 or experience symptoms suggestive of COVID-19."

## **Adult Supervision**

All students must be accompanied by their parent or legal guardian, or by a school-approved adult guardian, teacher, or coach who is empowered to deal with emergencies, medical or otherwise. The adult guardian must be a high school graduate; high school students who have passed their 18<sup>th</sup> birthday do not count. All registrants must provide a name and phone number for an adult contact who will be present at the tournament and is responsible for the students in case of an emergency.

## **Code of Conduct and Safety**

The Yale Debate Association would like to remind all attendees of the tournament of the following rules: (1) you must follow all laws from the city of New Haven, CT as well as Connecticut state law and U.S. federal law, (2) you must follow the rules and regulations of Yale University and comply with requests made by officials of the school. We also expect all participants to hold themselves to a high standard of conduct. These requirements include but are not limited to: (a) following instructions by those running the tournament and officials at the University. Do not wander off and do not go where one has been told not to go. (b) Treat all other attendees and all other people with respect. Do not harass or bully others. (c) Avoid creating safety/security risks for others (such as by propping open doors, going through the trash, bringing anything that could potentially be dangerous, etc.). If those running the tournament find that a participant has broken these requirements, we reserve the right to ban them from the tournament.

The tab room phone number will be announced on Tabroom in August. Please make all your students and judges aware of this number so they can contact tab during the tournament. This number is for on-site issues only and will be answered only during the tournament.

The policy of the Yale Invitational concerning consumption of alcoholic beverages by minors, illegal use of controlled substances, vandalism, destruction, and other illegal or disorderly behavior is: (1) to disqualify involved contestants from further competition, (2) to communicate the offending incident to the contestants' on-site guardians and/or parents, (3) to require financial reimbursement for all damages or liabilities caused directly or indirectly by the incident, and (4) to notify the local legal authorities. The precise remedy or remedies selected will remain at the discretion of the tournament staff. Every student must be accompanied at the tournament by an adult. This adult should be authorized by the student's school and/or parent to care for that student in the event of a medical or other emergency. The contact information for this adult must be given to tab at registration. The Yale Invitational takes no responsibility for the health and safety of students beyond notifying this accompanying adult of concerns or problems as we become aware of them.

Yale Invitational staff reserve the right to refuse entry to the tournament to anyone—be they a competitor, judge or observer—at its sole discretion.

## **Online Rules and Hospitality**

### **Adult Supervision and Virtual Chaperones**

Every student must be virtually accompanied at the tournament by an adult. This adult should be authorized by the student's school and/or parent to care for that student in the event of a medical or other emergency. #### Registration Open Date

We plan to open registration at 1:00 PM ET on Wednesday, August 2<sup>nd</sup>.

#### **Registration Process**

We will begin with universal waitlist status. All entries will automatically be placed on a waitlist. Two weeks after registration opens, we will fairly and evenly take students off the waitlist. For schools attending in-person, please do NOT make plane reservations or sign hotel contracts until your entries are verified.

#### Initial School Limits

To ensure regional and school diversity in our competitor pool, we impose limits on the initial amount of entries by a school that may receive approval. Importantly, this is NOT a guarantee that you will receive this many slots, but solely a maximum limit on how many may be approved initially.

Beginning at **7:00 PM ET on Wednesday, August 23<sup>rd</sup>**, we will evaluate registration numbers and, if available, start distributing additional entry slots.

#### Waitlist Information

We will determine who receives additional entries with four factors of cascading importance in mind: total registration interest with respect to the event's cap, the school diversity of the competitor pool, the date of a school's registration, and previous attendance at our tournament.

Practically, this is to say that if we cannot approve all entries in a division without exceeding its event cap, schools wishing to enter a large number of additional entries in a particular event will not receive slots for the totality of their additional entries before other schools receive their first additional slots. Beyond that, we will look to a first-come first-serve basis, and finally, in close instances, show appreciation to teams who have supported our tournament in the past.

We will notify waitlisted entries immediately if they are moved off of the waitlist. Though we usually have had a waitlist through August, we have historically been able to accommodate almost every student that has wanted to compete in our tournament.

#### Waitlist Contact

Each year, we receive many questions concerning whether teams will be able to leave the waitlist. We will NOT be able to answer these inquiries, for the answer is a variable function of our ability to promote a fair break, our ability to ensure a quality judge pool, whether other schools drop entries, and whether we can increase physical space for the tournament.

#### Reporting Entry Drops and Entry Drop Fees

Please report to tab all entry drops before or during the tournament. In the past, schools have sometimes failed to report all their entry drops to the tournament. An **unreported entry drop** is defined as when an entry drops, and their school fails to inform tab they dropped before the next round of their event ends. This harms our ability to panel rounds for good competition. Schools with unreported drops will be assessed a fee of \$50 per unreported entry drop. Please notify tab immediately if a student withdraws from competition during the tournament.

#### Outstanding Fines

Students from schools owing outstanding fines to our tournament will be permanently wait-listed until those fines are paid. Those schools will be registered after other schools based on available space.

#### IE Speaker Codes

IE Speaker Codes will be reset on the Wednesday before the competition. Therefore, do not print codes until you receive an email saying it is time to print codes. Field reports in the debate events will also be posted in advance of the tournament.

## **Event Caps**

We set caps with two factors of cascading importance in mind: our capacity to logistically host the specific division and our commitment to promoting a fair break. *It is our intent* that all teams with a clearing record in their division will participate in elimination rounds.

## Varsity and Junior Varsity Status

We strongly encourage coaches to choose division with the educational purpose of debate in mind. Overqualified debaters competing in Junior Varsity divisions can compromise this purpose and damage tournament experiences. This being said, there are a few hard and fast rules.

If a student meets any single one of these benchmarks, they must enter Varsity:

- They have more than two years experience.
- They are in the 12<sup>th</sup> grade.
- They broke at a national tournament in a Junior Varsity division last year.

Students who do not meet any of these benchmarks may enter Varsity or Junior Varsity.

#### Middle School Students

Middle school students are not exempt from the first benchmark above. We will accept middle school students in JV, but any middle school students with more than two years of debating experience should enter Varsity.

## **Required Forms**

There will be two required forms for all schools and an additional fourth form for schools competing in In-Person divisions:

- "Participant Supervision Agreement"
- "Parent and Guardian Waiver"
- "Food Interest" (In-Person Only)

The "Participant Supervision Agreement" form is required for students to compete at the tournament. Only one authorized individual **per school** needs to fill out the form.

The "Parent and Guardian" forms must be signed by a parent or legal guardian **for each student** who is participating in the tournament.

The "Food Interest" form is required for students to compete in In-Person divisions at the tournament. Only one authorized individual **per school** needs to fill out the form.

#### Submission Instructions

The primary contact for each school will receive an email with links to complete each form.

- The primary contact or authorized official of the school must complete the "Participant Supervision Agreement" form.
- The primary contact or authorized official of the school must distribute the links for the "Liability Waiver" and "Image and Recording Release" to the parents or legal guardians of each student.

#### Check-In

All schools must check in online using Tabroom tomorrow (Friday). Check-in will open at 9:00 am EDT, and you must check in by 1:00 pm EDT. We need you to check in so we can confirm that your entries and judges are correct, and that everyone on your team is ready to participate (starting either tomorrow afternoon or Saturday morning). Schools that do not check in will be dropped from the tournament. To check in, click the "Confirm Onsite" button on Tabroom (next to the tournament name on your account dashboard, under "Existing Tournament Registrations"). There is no in-person registration.

Schools may not hire out their entire obligation in a division. This means that if you are a lone student for your school in a division, you must provide your own judge.

We assume judges will stay for the duration of the tournament unless we hear otherwise. You must contact us if you are leaving.

#### Judge Changes

Please note that the judges you bring need to be the judges you registered online by the deadline. You may not substitute another judge in a rated pool. Schools that change their judges after online strikes and Mutually Preferred Judging ratings (LD) have opened will lose all of their strikes and ratings in the division(s) in which they made the offending changes.

Do not bring judges unregistered by the deadline; we cannot use them. If you have a judge who has an emergency and cannot come to the tournament, you will have to pay the **dropped judge fee** to keep your ratings because we will not be changing the judge pool at the last minute. The pool will be locked by **5:00 PM ET on Wednesday, September 27**<sup>th</sup>. There will be no changes possible after that time, and any judges that drop will incur a **hired judge fee**.

### **Judge Expectations**

Please appreciate the impact your judge will have on the debates they evaluate, and the educational goals of this activity. We often only notice unqualified judges after a number of competitors have been unfairly adjudicated.

A qualified judge understands the activity and is either experienced sitting in the back of the room with a ballot or flow pad, or has been carefully trained by the team they are accompanying. A qualified judge knows how to assign ranks or wins/losses, speaker points, and knows how to fill out a ballot. All judges must be older than high school age.

For Public Forum, all judges must be qualified to evaluate Varsity debate rounds.

#### **Tabroom**

Your Tabroom account should be linked and ready by Monday, September 25th.

All events will post updates on <u>yaleinvite.tabroom.com</u>. Please make sure that you have your notifications sent to your cell phones, and that all of your team, including students and judges, are plugged in. Students and/or judges who miss rounds will not be forgiven because of "technical problems." It has been our experience that most technical issues result from the students' or judges' Tabroom.com profile not being linked correctly or contact information (cell phone and email) not being provided within the profile.

We will also be asking for judge cell phone numbers at registration on the tournament website. Keep in mind that the more judge cell numbers you register, the fewer times we'll be calling you. The more contact information that we have for your judges, the easier it will be to resolve questions or issues that may arise during the tournament.

#### Paradigms (LD/Policy/PF)

We require all debate judges to post a paradigm under their Tabroom accounts profile. In any case, judges should be willing to indicate before a round to competitors a general sense of their vision of debate (if any) or a sense of their experience, to aid competitors in choosing how best to make their arguments.

Debate entries will not be allowed to submit preferences and strikes unless all of their judges have paradigms. This is true for Policy, PF, and LD.

#### Decision Disclosure (PF)

We require judges relay their decision to the debaters verbally after the round has concluded, specifying both the name and side (pro/con) of the team that won. Reasons for decisions are not required to be delivered verbally, though they are expected in the written ballot. We find this measure decreases the number of mistaken ballot entries and improves debaters' tournament experiences.

#### Missing Judge Fees

Schools whose judges fail to appear for an assigned round will be fined \$50 for each round. Judges fined may compensate by judging rounds beyond their assignment. We do not want your money; we want judges to show up. However, schools with unpaid fines will not be given ballots or awards, and they will be prevented from registering at other tournaments we run until those fines are paid. Our tab staff runs many, many tournaments. Don't break the rules, or else you may be prevented from competing at other tournaments

## **Judge Benefits**

All In-Person Yale Invitational judges will receive lunch and dinner on Saturday. Judges will also have access to a Judge's Lounge stocked with water and snacks, during their event's rounds, throughout the tournament.

## **Hired Judging**

First, please note from the **Obligations By Entry** section above, we will not allow schools to hire out their whole commitments in any event category. This is to say you must bring at least one judge in every event you are competing in.

We are committed to cultivating an excellent judge pool. To aid us in that effort, the registration system will ask you to explicitly request Judge Hires. Please do so early. We will not harm the quality of our tournament by oversubscribing hired judging.

Importantly, though, Judge Hire Requests are Judge Hire *Requests*. Schools should not count on the tournament to accept all their hired judges requests. In any case, the best way to receive additional entry slots is to enter your own judges.

#### Hired Judging Fees

We charge for hired judges by the student, not by the whole judge. Practically, this means if you have 7 IE students entered, and only 1 judge covering 5 of those students, you owe 2 hired judging fees for a sum of \$100. We find this system fair because it does not require you to hire a whole judge just to cover a fractional obligation.

## **Dropping Judges**

For LD, dropping judges after registration is frozen on **Wednesday, September 27**<sup>th</sup> will incur a substantial fee. Similarly, if you add a judge after September 27<sup>th</sup>, you will still have to pay for the hired judges you signed up for.

For all other events, the above rule applies to **Monday, September 18<sup>th</sup>**. Dropping judges after September 18<sup>th</sup> will incur a substantial fee, and if you add a judge after September 18<sup>th</sup>, you will still have to pay for the hired judges you signed up for.

## **LD Mutually Preferred Judging**

We will be using Mutually Preferred Judging in LD Debate. Each debater in the Varsity division, provided their judging obligation is covered, will be able to rank all judges from 1-6 (6 being a strike). Conflicts will be handled separately, and instructions will be provided for defining conflicts both for teams and for judges; keep in mind that a conflict is a judge who likes you too much, not another chance for you to get more strikes. Students found to be misusing conflicts will face repercussions up to and including disqualification from the tournament. We wish to emphasize that we expect students participating in non-school sponsored "club programs" are expected to follow the conflict regulations set forth by both their school and their club. Debaters who are discovered to not be following any set of conflict guidelines applicable to them can lose all of their preferences.

MPJ ratings will be available on <u>yaleinvite.tabroom.com</u> on the Wednesday before the tournament. They will close **Friday, September 29<sup>th</sup> at 3:45 PM ET**. If you are not getting a ranking option when you go into your online registration, your judging obligation was not covered.

### Speech

Schools must indicate whether their judges are for Platform Events (EX, INF, OO) or Interp Events.

## **Event Information**

## **Lincoln Douglas Debate**

There will be both Varsity and Junior Varsity divisions of Lincoln Douglas Debate. The resolution will be the September-October National Speech and Debate Association (NSDA) topic for 2023. Both VLD and JVLD will follow the 6-3-7-3-4-6-3 format. Debaters will have 5 minutes of prep time. Ties will be broken based on record, high/low adjusted points, double-adjusted points, opponent's record, total points, judge variance, and coin flip, in that order. There will be six rounds in both Varsity and JV; the break will be to double-octofinals in both LD divisions. If necessary, there will be a run-off in VLD of 4-2's.

#### **Public Forum Debate**

There will be both Varsity and Junior Varsity divisions of Public Forum Debate. We will follow all NSDA rules. The tournament will use the NSDA September/October topic for 2023. Ties will be broken using the same criteria as Lincoln Douglas Debate. For the Varsity division, we expect to host 6 pre-elimination rounds with a break to full or partial triple-octa finals. For the Junior Varsity division, we expect to host 6 pre-elimination rounds with a break to partial or full double-octofinals. We may alter these structures in response to Registration interest.

#### International Breakout

Resources permitting, we intend to host a separate international PF breakout bracket for elimination rounds. This means the Varsity Public Forum division will have two brackets of elimination rounds. The overall top 64 seeds will break into the Varsity PF elimination rounds bracket, and the top 4 seeds out of the international teams will break into the international PF elimination round bracket. Any international teams who are among the overall top 64 seeds will not be allowed to choose to compete in the international PF bracket and must compete in the primary elimination rounds bracket.

## **Policy Debate**

Policy Debate will be using the NFHS resolution. Teams will give eight-minute constructive speeches, three-minute cross-examinations, and five-minute rebuttals and will have eight minutes of prep time. Ties will be broken using the same criteria as Lincoln Douglas Debate. The break will be to the appropriate elim.

## **Parliamentary Debate**

There will be a single, open division of Parliamentary Debate. We will follow the American Parliamentary Debate Association (APDA) format with its 7-8-8-8-4-5 speech times. For a full style guide, please visit the tournament website. We will release the straight-link resolution 15 minutes before the start of each round. There will be five (5) rounds with a break to quarterfinals. We may run partial/full octos depending on the size of the field.

### **Student Congress**

There will be a single, open division of Congressional Debate. There will be three preliminary sessions. Sessions 1 through 3 will take place on Saturday, and the Semifinal and Final Sessions will take place on Sunday.

Please mark judges available to act as a parliamentarian when entering judge info on Tabroom.

Please note that **registration for Congressional Debate is due before that of other events**, on Friday, September 1<sup>st</sup>, so we can create docket assignments. We will add late entries as we have drops in the released chambers. We will assign dockets (for prelims and outrounds), and we will publish the dockets for pre-elimination rounds on the Yale Invitational website by **Monday, September 11<sup>th</sup>**. Final chamber assignments will be published at least 1 hour prior to session 1.

This year, we will be accepting legislation for preliminary rounds, and the tournament will provide **legislation for elimination rounds.** The legislation submission process will be announced shortly, and an update will be posted on the Tabroom page. The deadline for submission will be **Friday, September 1**<sup>st</sup> at 5:00 PM ET.

#### **Speech Events**

On Saturday, Speech Events will take place across two sites. All Platform Events will be at one site (EX, INF, and OO), and all Interpretation Events will be at a different site. Students may only double-enter across events at a particular site. For example, a student can double-enter across EX and INFO but NOT EX and POI.

We are planning to host four preliminary rounds. We may add a fifth preliminary round in response to registration interest.

As specified in the "Judging" portion of this Invitation, when people register, they have to select what pool their judges go to in interpretation or platform events.

Students may enter each event only once. Students may use the same source material in only one event. For example, a student may not perform the same piece for OI and DI. Students performing the same source material in more than one event will be disqualified from *both events* at tab's discretion. Two works from the same collection, volume, or anthology do not qualify as the same material. However, two cuttings from the same work do. Feel free to email us in advance if you have questions about this rule.

Extemp, Informative, Oratory, DI, HI, POI, and Duo will follow *National Speech and Debate Association (NSDA)* rules and guidelines. Oral Interpretation of Literature will follow *National Catholic Forensic League (NCFL)* rules and guidelines. We will use the NCFL's guidelines for published material in Interp events. The grace period will be 30 seconds for all speech events. Any IE participant who exceeds the grace period may not receive a rank of one in the round. Any further penalty will be at the discretion of the judge. A participant may be penalized for a time violation only if the judge has used a precise timing device and notes the penalty on the ballot.

Speech events will break to either quarterfinals or semifinals based on the size of the events. An event with 60 or more competitors will break to quarterfinals. Speech tabbing will be cumulative throughout the tournament. We will advance as many students tied on ranks as logistics permit to each consecutive elim round. If there are too many tied competitors to advance all competitors with a given cumulative score, ties will next be broken by reciprocal ranks. Students on the edge of breaking who are tied on both ranks

and reciprocals will always be advanced to the next elim round. The Extemp final round will feature cross-examination in accordance with NSDA rules.

## **Source Integrity**

#### Debate

All students must bring copies of all sources, which must include the full context of the citation, not simply a retyped list of short sentences and quotes. Upon request, competitors must make these sources available to their opponent(s) in the round and/or their judges (after the round). Debate entries failing to do so or debaters who significantly misrepresent sources in the round may be disqualified at tab's discretion.

#### Speech

Speech contestants should have the full original source and their cutting of all material in interpretive events available at the tournament. Oratory and Extemp students should have the text of any material they cite in their speeches available at the tournament. Students misrepresenting sources or using unavailable sources may be disqualified at tab's discretion.

#### **Equity**
