# A Bill to Increase Security in the Middle East

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	The U.S. Military will construct a military base in the Republic of Cyprus.
2	SECTION 2.	A. A military base is a facility directly owned and operated by or for the U.S.
3		military that shelters military equipment and personnel, and facilitates
4		training and operations.
5		B. The base will be built in the area of the island presently unoccupied by
6		Turkish forces.
7	SECTION 3.	The Department of Defense (DoD) will be responsible for funding and
8		facilitating the base's construction. The budget for the base's construction
9		will be \$100 million. The DoD will have discretion for the funding and
10		resources allocated to the base after its construction.
11	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect immediately. The base's construction will be
12		completed by October 31, 2024.
13	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A Bill to Mandate Businesses to Provide Childcare

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	Employers with revenues exceeding \$10 million shall establish and
2		maintain an Employer-Provided Child Care Assistance Program (EPCCAP) to
3		assist employees with child care expenses.
4	SECTION 2.	The program shall include, but is not limited to:
5		A. Financial assistance or subsidies for eligible employees' child care
6		expenses, flexible work arrangements to accommodate employees'
7		child care needs, counseling and resources related to child care options
8		and services, etc.
9		B. Employees with children below the age of 6 will qualify for the
10		program.
11	SECTION 3.	An Employer-Provided Child Care Credit will be expanded nationwide to all
12		businesses providing these services.
13	SECTION 4.	The Department of Labor shall conduct periodic compliance reviews to
14		ensure that employers subject to this Act are in compliance with the
15		EPCCAP requirement and are providing the intended benefits to their
16		employees.
17	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect 12 months after passage.
18	SECTION 5. A	Il laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A Bill to Remove Sanctions on North Korea

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	The United States shall remove all current economic sanctions imposed on
2		North Korea.
3	SECTION 2.	Economic sanctions shall be defined as sanctions that prevent the buying
4		of goods from North Korea and the selling of goods to North Korea.
5	SECTION 3.	The Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) will enforce the removal of
6		sanctions.
7		A. Failure to lift sanctions will result in a \$1 million deduction of the Office
8		of Foreign Assets Control budget.
9	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on August 1, 2024. All laws in conflict with
10		this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

### A Bill to Increase Aid to Haiti

1	BE IT ENACTED	BY THE CONG	RESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2		SECTION 1.	\$2 billion will be allocated to Haiti to improve the people's	
3		access to necessities and to stabilize the economy.		
4		A. \$720 millio	on will be allocated to foreign aid through Christian Health	
5		Services Corps	s (CHSC) and the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) to	
6		implement the	e Humanitarian Response Plan for Haiti.	
7		B. \$1.28 billio	n will be allocated to foreign direct investment through	
8		United States	businesses.	
9		SECTION 2.	Foreign aid shall be defined as money and commodities	
10		that the Unite	ed States provides to other countries. Foreign direct	
11		investment sh	nall be defined as investment involving a long-term	
12		relationship and reflecting a lasting interest.		
13		SECTION 3.	The Department of State will oversee the implementation	
14		of the legislat	ion.	
15		A. The Depar	rtment of State will conduct semiannual investigations to	
16		ensure th	at the funding is properly used and will revoke aid if not	
17		properly u	used.	
18		B. Funding w	vill be taken from the Department of Defense's discretionary	
19		budget.		
20		SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1st, 2024.	
21		SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared	
		null and void.

# A Bill to Require Firearm Liability Insurance

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2	SECTION 1.	All gun owners residing in the United States shall carry liability insurance no
3		lower than \$250,000 US Dollars. The insurance shall be used in event of
4		theft, accidental firing, or committing a crime with said firearm.
5	SECTION 2.	Gun owners shall be defined as an individual, group of private citizens or
6		private businesses who own and or manage at least one firearm. Firearms
7		shall be defined by the ATF as any weapon (including a starter gun) designed
8		to or readily convertible to expel a projectile by explosive action; The frame
9		or receiver of such a weapon; or any firearm muffler, firearm silencer, or
10		destructive device.
11	SECTION 3.	The Bureau of Alcohol Tobacco and Firearms shall be given final authority
12		over the registration and enforcement of this law, as well as any state
13		agencies the ATF deems necessary to aid.
14	SECTION 4.	This law will take effect January 31, 2024. All laws in conflict with this
15		legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# A Bill to Make the Fashion Industry Greener

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:			
2	SECTION 1.	Clothing sold in the United States must be made from environmentally		
3		friendly, durable, and recyclable material.		
4	SECTION 2.	Clothing is defined as items that are worn to cover the body. Environmentally		
5		friendly materials are defined as materials that, throughout all stages of		
6		production, have lower carbon emissions and fewer environmental harms		
7		than relevant reference materials. Durable materials are defined as lasting		
8		through numerous wash/wear cycles, over the span of at least one year.		
9		Recyclable materials are defined as those which can be broken down and		
10		reused to make a new product.		
11	SECTION 3.	This legislation shall be enforced by the Federal Trade Commission (FTC).		
12		A. The FTC shall work with nonprofit organizations such as Textile Exchange		
13		to generate a list of eligible materials for each fiscal year.		
14		B. Companies in violation of this legislation shall face fines of 10% of their		
15		annual gross profit in the previous fiscal year.		
16	SECTION 2.	This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2024. All laws in conflict with		
17		this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A RESOLUTION ELIMINATE THE MORTGAGE INTEREST DEDUCTION

1	WHEREAS,	The Mortgage Interest Deduction (MID) allows homeowners to deduct from their
2		income the interest paid on their mortgages when filing tax returns; and
3	WHEREAS,	This section of the tax code is regressive, as it is a boon which typically is only
4		available to those with a high income; and
5	WHEREAS,	The MID leads to higher housing prices, as well as larger and more wasteful new
6		housing construction; and
7	WHEREAS,	Economists generally conclude that the MID does not in fact serve to encourage
8		home ownership; now, therefore, be it
9	RESOLVED,	That the Student Congress here assembled shall seek to phase out the Mortgage
10		Interest Deduction for new mortgages.

4		and third-party	y candidates have no chance in the pure "first past the post"
5		system within	the Electoral College; and
6	WHEREAS,	To break out o	of this trap, viable third party candidates must be plausibly
7		relevant in pre	esidential elections; and now, therefore, be it
8	RESOLVED	, By two-thirds	of the Congress here assembled, that the following article is
9		proposed as an	n amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which
10		shall be valid	to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when
11		ratified by the	legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within
12		twenty years f	From the date of its submission by the Congress:
13			AMENDMENT XXVIII
14		SECTION 1:	Presidential electors shall use ranked-choice voting to
15			select the President and Vice President. They shall vote by
16			ranking their top five choices. If no candidate has a
17			majority of first-place votes, the candidate(s) with the
18			fewest such votes will be disqualified, and their electors'
19			votes awarded to their second-ranked candidates — and so
20			on in this fashion until a candidate obtains a majority.
21		SECTION 2:	All sections in conflict with this Amendment are declared
22			null & void.
23		SECTION 3:	This Amendment shall be considered null & void if not
24			ratified by three-fourths of the states within twenty years of
25			passage.
