Round 1

A Bill for Bail Reform

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2. **SECTION 1**. The US shall eliminate the payment of money as a condition of
- 3. pretrial release.
- 4. SECTION 2. Individuals currently facing charges for a misdemeanor or
- 5. non-violent felony will be granted release without bail as they await their
- 6. court date, unless it is proven that specific conditions are necessary to
- 7. ensure their appearance in court. Any release conditions imposed must be
- 8. non-monetary and designed to be as minimally restrictive as possible to
- 9. reasonably guarantee their return to court.
- 10. SECTION 3. Individuals charged and released to await trial in the
- 11. community may potentially be subjected to bail or pretrial detention at a
- 12. later point if they persistently and willfully fail to appear in court, violate a
- 13. protection order, engage in witness tampering or intimidation, or face
- 14. additional charges while awaiting trial.
- 15. **SECTION 4.** The Department of Justice will oversee the
- 16. implementation of this bill.
- *17.* **SECTION 5.** This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2025. All *18.* laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

<u>A Bill to Define the Sovereign Territory of the United</u> <u>States of America to Include All Airspace from the</u> <u>Surface of the US Vertically to the Beginning of Outer</u> Space

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 SECTION 1, The people of the United States of America are entitled to be protected from, and

3 remain secure from the effects of objects floating and flying above them.

4 However, current law is unclear as it does not specify the height to which the

5 United States claims sovereignty over its airspace;

6 SECTION 2, Therefore, 49 U.S.C. §40103 is hereby amended to define sovereign US airspace

7 to extend from the surface of any part of the United States vertically to the

8 beginning of Outer space.

9 SECTION 3, The Departments of State and Defense will oversee implementation and 10 enforcement of this legislation;

11 SECTION 4, This law will take effect and be implemented immediately on passage;

12 SECTION 5, All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void

The No More Meat Act

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2. SECTION 1. The United States Congress shall gradually phase out all subsidies and
- 3. financial incentives to meat and dairy manufacturers.
- 4. SECTION 2. All funding currently allocated to meat and dairy industries shall be
- 5. redirected to fruit and vegetable agriculture.
- 6. SECTION 3. Subsidies to meat and dairy industries will be phased out by 20% each year,
- 7. to be fully reallocated 5 years after the date of enactment of this act.
- 8. SECTION 4. The implementation of this bill shall be overseen by the United States
- 9. Department of Agriculture.
- 10. SECTION 5. This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2025.
- 11. SECTION 6. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

1 WHEREAS, The war in Afghanistan has ended; and

2 WHEREAS The United States government has committed to continuing "over the horizon"

3 drone strike attacks on Afghanistan, as well as on other countries, and

4 WHEREAS These drone attacks have increasingly resulted in civilian casualties;

5 **RESOLVED** by this Student Congress here assembled that:

6 All drone strikes conducted by or in the name of the United States of America

7 shall be limited to those which comply with all applicable laws

A Bill to Modernize American Road Infrastructure

- 2. SECTION 1. The United States federal government will invest \$100 billion dollars into
- 3. American infrastructure with the purpose of improving the quality of roads and
- 4. highways.
- 5. SECTION 2. The funding for this legislation will come from a federal gas tax hike of
- 6. \$0.25/gallon.
- 7. SECTION 3. All additional revenue generated by this gas tax will be given to subsidize
- 8. the production of EV infrastructure including electric vehicle chargers and increase
- 9. federal rebates for the purchase of electric vehicles.
- 10. SECTION 4. The Department of Transportation will be in charge of implementation of
- 11. today's legislation.
- 12. SECTION 5. This legislation will go into effect on January 1st, 2025.
- 13. SECTION 6. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Ban to Hydraulic Fracturing

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
 - 2. SECTION 1. Fracking shall be prohibited by federal agencies by ending
 - 3. permits for the expansion of fracking or fracked oil and natural gas
 - 4. infrastructure, including infrastructure intended to extract, transport, or
 - 5. burn natural gas or oil across all 50 states and U.S. territories.
 - 6. SECTION 2. Hydraulic fracturing, or fracking, shall be defined as a
 - 7. process that provides access to reservoirs of natural gas and petroleum by
 - 8. opening rocks deep underground. U.S territories shall be defined as
 - 9. administrative districts overseen by the Federal government of the United
 - 10. States without national status.

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- 11. SECTION 3. The Environmental Protection Agency and Department of
- 12. Energy shall oversee the enforcement of this legislation.
- 13. SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect on January 1st, 2025.
- 14. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to End International Arms Sales

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2. SECTION 1. No individual or corporation shall engage in the sale of
- 3. military technology, military intelligence, or weapons to any foreign
- 4. government, corporation, individual, or any other entity.
- 5. SECTION 2. Every sale of United States arms must be considered and
- 6. approved by the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations.
- 7. **SECTION 2**. Any violation of this legislation shall be prosecuted in a federal
- 8. court as treason.
- 9. **SECTION 3.** The Bureau of Industry and Security and the Department of
- 10. Justice shall jointly oversee the implementation of this legislation.
- 11. **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect immediately upon passage.
- 12. SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby
- 13. declared null and void.

<u>A Bill to Permit Truck Drivers to Make Their Own Choice</u> <u>Regarding Employment Status</u>

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 SECTION 1, The relevant sections of the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938, as

3 amended (29 USC §§201, et. seq.) are hereby amended to require truck

4 drivers to have the decision of being classified as either employees or

5 independent contractors upon completing a thousand hours of work for a

6 trucking company. Truck drivers will be entitled to change or renew this decision

7 at each one year anniversary of their employment.

8 SECTION 3, The Department of Labor will oversee the implementation of this legislation.

9 SECTION 4, This law will take effect immediately upon passage.

10 SECTION 5, All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

<u>The Mission for Advancing NASA's Aerospace Science</u> (MANAS) Act

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2. SECTION 1. The National Aeronautics Space Administration (NASA) will redirect
- 3. \$10 billion dollars from private space corporations for fiscal year 2024 and each
- 4. subsequent fiscal year for the purpose of improving NASA's facilities and
- 5. infrastructure in support of the development and construction of a permanent
- 6. Moon base.
- 7. SECTION 2. A. The term "Moon base" means a self-sustaining, habitable facility
- 8. constructed on the surface of the Moon, capable of supporting human life and
- 9. scientific research activities.
- 10.B. Private corporations shall be defined as companies such as SpaceX and Blue 11. Origin or space companies worth over \$30 billion dollars.
- 12. **SECTION 3.** NASA shall be tasked with the implementation of this legislation.
- 13.A. \$10 billion dollars shall be redirected from private corporations every year to 14. support the implementation.
- 15.B. Annual audits shall be carried out to ensure that research and development is 16. making significant progress.
- 17.C. If it is determined that after 10 years enough progress has not been made,
- 18. this legislation will be declared null and void.
- 19. SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2025.
- 20. **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and 21.void.
