



A Bill to Fund Initiatives to Recycle Pickle Brine for Use as a De-icer

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY T <mark>H</mark> E CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2	SECTION 1.	Congress shall apportion \$500 million a year for each of the next five years to the
3		Department of Transportation for the express purpose of funding initiatives in jurisdictions
4		throughout the United States and its territories that will recycle pickle brine for reuse as a
5		de-icer of roadways and/or sidewalks. Jurisdictions are encouraged to make use of and
6		expand upon existing recycling infrastructure for these purposes.
7	SECTION 2.	Pickle brine is defined as liquid with a salinity of at least 3.5% that is used to pickle and
8		preserve cucumbers and other vegetables. Jurisdictions applying for this funding from the
9		Department of Transportation may determine, as individual jurisdictions, whether to
10		accept only commercially produced pickle brine or homemade brine as well. In either case,
11		jurisdictions may take steps to increase the salinity of brine if necessary before applying it
12		to road <mark>ways and/or sidewalks.</mark>
13	SECTION 3.	This legislation shall be overseen by the Department of Transportation, which shall
14		additionally be tasked with establishing a fair and speedy process by which jurisdictions
15		may apply for and receive these funds. The Department of Transportation is further
16		encouraged to work to establish programs that collect used pickle brine from areas that do
17		not experience icy roadways and sidewalks so that this brine may be transported to areas
18		that are in need.
19	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall take effect at the start of the next fiscal year.
20	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

8		official	state song(s) (or lack thereof) and to consider replacing or supplementing any such
9		selectio	ns with a more culturally resonant song if current offerings are deemed to be
10		inadequ	ate; and be it
11	FURTHER R	ESOLVED	that Congress recognizes and celebrates those states that are trailblazers in this
12		respect	, specifically Colorado ("Rocky Mountain High"), Georgia ("Georgia on My Mind"),
13		Kentucl	ky ("Blue Moon of Kentucky"), Tennessee ("Rocky Top"), and especially West
14		Virginia	("Take Me Home, Country Roads").

A Resolution to Protect Virtual and Augmented Reality Users

1	BE IT ENACTED	BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	WHEREAS,	Virtual and augmented reality blurs the li

2 ine between the digital and 3 physical worlds creating a sense of being present in the virtual world; and 4 WHEREAS, Global virtual reality is steadily growing and the market size is expected to reach 5 \$22.9 billion by the end of 2020, with the United States' market size projected 6 to be \$18.8 billion; and The demand for virtual reality applications is increasing in the healthcare 7 WHEREAS, 8 sector, gaming, and entertainment media, automotive, manufacturing, and 9 other industries. Of these, gaming and entertainment media covers a 40.5% of 10 the global virtual reality market share; and Steam, an online video game distribution service, reported in June of 2019 that 11 WHEREAS, the monthly-connected VR headsets on Steam surpassed 1 million for the first 12 13 time; and 14 Virtual reality offers the potential to revolutionize education and training WHEREAS, 15 in numerous professional fields; and 16 WHEREAS, Without established community norms and regulations, virtual reality 17 can become an area for increased virtual assault and harassment; and 18 WHEREAS, According to Pew Research Center, 41 percent of Americans were subjected 19 to harassing behavior online, while 66 percent witnessed this behavior. For 20 more severe forms of harassment, such as physical threats, sexual harassment 21 or stalking, nearly 18 percent of Americans were targets; now, therefore, be it 22 RESOLVED, By the Congress here assembled that Congress will create a commission 23 comprised of representatives from the Entertainment Software Rating Board, 24 Federal Communications Commission, and the Federal Bureau of Investigation to oversee the establishment of codes of conduct for virtual and augmented 25 26 reality users in the United States.
