The River Valley Speech and Debate League exists to provide local, cheap and robust competitive Speech and Debate tournaments to the River Valley. The RVSDL exists because Coach Eric Gamble saw a need and decided to find a remedy for it.

During the course of his 16 years of coaching he was faced with 2 persistent problems. First, almost all of the tournaments offered in the state necessitated overnight travel and costly hotel stays. Second, he saw wave after wave of students at small, rural schools graduate without the opportunity to experience the life changing experience of Speech and Debate competition. Like every other program, in most schools, Covid-19 decimated the DHS Speech and Debate team's numbers. In an effort to reinvigorate the activity in his own school, and address those two problem areas, Coach Gamble developed the concept of the River Valley Speech and Debate League. The initial goals of the League are to target six local counties: Yell, Logan, Pope, Conway, Perry and Johnson. In those counties, the league would offer: free instructional materials to kickstart programs, workshops for both teachers and students and a local, free, monthly competition.

In the fall of 2022, The Arkansas Communications and Theatre Arts Association membership voted to establish the RVSDL as its very first regional league. Our first year was a resounding success with teams from Morrilton, Bigelow, Russellville and Dardanelle experiencing success in multiple events.

In our third year, we hope to see an expansion of that success. Our league is a learning league and is committed to helping any school in our region start up Speech and Debate teams. We provide free handouts, a schedule for starting a team, personalized coaching and help with your team and most of all.....the tournaments are free for the first year of competition! You and your kids can take part in the activity spending nothing more than your own time. We will continue to reach out to teachers and administrators in local schools in an attempt to engage you into the league!

Coaches Katelyn Davis, Becky Lawson, and Eric Gamble welcome back all returner competitors and are incredibly happy to see the massive amount of brand new members in the league this year! It is going to be a great season, IT'S YOUR TIME TO SHINE!

The River Valley Speech and Debate League exists to found, develop and expand Speech and Debate competitions in rural Arkansas with an initial focus on the River Valley.



The RVSDL encourages membership in both the Arkansas Communications and Theatre Arts Association and the National Speech and Debate Association. Both provide multiple opportunities for competition and growth for their members. As such, the RVSDL also encourages its own members to adhere to the **NSDA's Code of Honor which states:**

"As a student or coach member, I pledge to uphold the highest standards of humility, equity, integrity, respect, leadership, and service in pursuit of excellence."

Humility: A member does not regard oneself more highly than others. Regardless of a person's level of success, an individual always looks beyond oneself to appreciate the inherent value of others.

Judge Instructions

Thank you so much for taking the time to judge for our tournament. We appreciate you so much! Remember that all of the competitors that you will see today are new to debate. Please treat them with kindness and compassion.

A good judge will:

- Listen attentively to the speeches of both students without yielding to distractions. (make sure your phones are silenced)
- Take notes on the major points of each side and how the opposing team responds to them
- Make a judgment solely on what is said in the round by each student and not based on your own bias or knowledge. **This is the hardest part.**

You will be judging these rounds using the website <u>www.tabroom.com</u>. You will need to sign up on the website so that you will be added to the rounds you will judge. This needs to be done immediately when you decide to take part. You can access it using a laptop, chromebook or smartphone. **Remember a few things as you fill out your ballot.**

SPEAKER POINTS: Speaker points are extremely important. Take care with how you hand out these points. They serve two purposes. They allow us to crown a tournament speaking champion and they serve as a tiebreaker for students who have identical win/loss records.

Two clarifications:

You

- Support can come in either the form of cited evidence, specific examples or ample explanation from the debaters.
- Refutation is in regards to how well the speaker responds to what their opponent says.

MAKE SURE TO COMPLETE YOUR BALLOT AS QUICKLY AS POSSIBLE. YOU CAN GO BACK AND ADD IN SPECIFIC COMMENTS TO BOTH SIDES AFTER THE ROUND IS COMPLETE. We cannot start the next round until all ballots have been turned in on the website.

Coach Instructions

Congrats coach! You have done it. You started a team and brought them to competition.

Remember that the number one reason kids won't come back is because of how they are treated while competing. We want the kids to have as much fun as possible while also learning and growing as competitors.

This will allow you to get ready for the first round.

- Find an area in the cafeteria where your team will set up their base camp. Feel free to spread it across several tables. Make sure that your competitors have pens, paper and something to time themselves with. (remember cell phones and computers are NOT allowed in the round)
- Make sure your kids have their phones charging while they debate so that they can access the internet during the competition.
- Help your students prep for their rounds. Remember, these kids can use ANYTHING at their disposal before the round starts and that includes their most valuable resource... YOU.
- Go watch a round! (if you aren't judging)
- Come visit tournament officials in the Tabroom. (Lounge Area) And I will explain to you how hosting works and what will need to be done when your program hosts a tournament later in the year.
- HAVE FUN!! We want you to come back as well. That will only happen if you are having fun during the course of the tournament. If you are experiencing anything that causes you pause or concern don't hesitate to bring it up to tournament officials.

Student Instructions

You need to be in the cafeteria at all times when you are not competing. <u>Please do not wander the school or the competition area hallway.</u>

- Be quiet and respectful as you wait for your round to be called. We will call by last name. We will explain who is affirmative and who is negative. Negative will draw first. Affirmative should keep the slip and present it to the judge before the round starts. Be sure that you are ready to draw for your debate topic at the scheduled time. Draw will occur in the foyer in front of the cafeteria.
- Your time starts the moment you and your competitor are handed the slip. (You have 30 minutes and this includes getting to your room)
- During your preparation you are allowed to use anything and anyone to prepare
 you for the topic. Remember that your case needs to be written on paper and
 you cannot take in any laptops or cell phones into the competition room. You
 need to leave your room with about 1-2 minutes left so that you are ready to
 begin promptly
- DO NOT ENTER A ROOM WITHOUT A JUDGE PRESENT. This will result in disqualification.
- When you go into the room you are allowed pens/pencils, paper with handwritten notes and a timer. (Phone may only be used on airplane mode as a timer) Any use of phone outside of its timer setting will result in disqualification.
- Make sure to move back any and all tables, desks or chairs that you might move during the round after you are done.
- Grab a quick snack or drink between rounds and get ready to do it again!!
- ***If you advance, you will continue debate on saturday. If you are competing in other events you will compete on saturday. I HIGHLY encourage everyone to return on saturday EVEN IF YOU DON'T ADVANCE because it is the best way to learn.
