A Bill to Ban Private Prisons to

Prioritize Rehabilitation

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- SECTION 1. The use of private prisons shall now be prohibited. Neither the federal government nor any state shall house prisoners in a private facility. Any state noncompliant with this legislation will lose 50% of the federal funding given to their state police departments. Funding will resume should a state become compliant.
- **SECTION 2.** A private prison is defined as any facility used to house prisoners that Is owned by a private corporation/ A prisoner is defined as anyone being detained as part of a conviction or while awaiting trial.
- SECTION 3. The Department of Justice (DOJ) and Department of Homeland Security (DHS) shall be responsible for enforcing this legislation.
- **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect on FY 2027.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Protect Housing Affordability

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1. A grant of up to \$25,000 will be available to help first-time		
2	homebuyers with their down payments, closing costs, and other related		
3	expenses.		
4	SECTION 2. Eligibility for the grant will be based on:		
5	A. The buyer's income, which must be under the area's Annual Median		
6	Income.		
7	B. The buyer being a first-time homeowner.		
8	C. The home being used as the buyer's only primary residence.		
9	SECTION 3. The amount of the grant will depend on		
10	A. The buyer's income level, with those earning less receiving more.		
11	B. The price of the home, so that the grant does not cover too much of		
12	the total cost.		
13	C. The cost of living in the area where the home is being purchased.		
14	SECTION 4. To make sure the grant is used properly, buyers must live in the home		
15	for at least five years		
16	SECTION 5. This law will take effect on January 1, 2025.		
17	SECTION 6. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and		
18	void.

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Grant all Inhabited U.S. Territories the Right to Vote in the Presidential Election

1	RESOLVED,	By two-thirds o	of the Congress here assembled, that the following article is
2		proposed as ar	n amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which shall
3		be valid to all i	ntents and purposes as part of the Constitution when ratified by
4		the legislature	s of three-fourths of the several states within seven years from the
5		date of its sub	mission by the Congress:
6			ARTICLE
7		SECTION 1:	The United States Federal Government will grant all inhabited U.S.
8			territories the right to vote in the presidential election.
9			A. The Electoral College will be expanded to include each of
10			the inhabited territories, with the distribution of their
11			electoral votes designated by their population size. Each
12			territory must get at least one electoral vote.
13		SECTION 2:	A. U.S. Territories are the sub-national unincorporated
14			geographical areas that belong to the United States government.
15			They are neither states nor countries.
16			B. The presidential election is defined as the election occurring
17			once every 4 years in which the United States citizens cast ballots
18			in favor of a presidential (and vice-presidential) candidate, who is
19			selected through the Electoral College.
20			C. The permanently inhabited U.S. territories include the
21			American Samoa, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana
22			Islands, Guam, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands.
23		SECTION 3:	The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by
24			appropriate legislation.

A Bill to Promote Economic Expression

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- **Section 1**. Citizens of the United States may destroy their currency.
- **Section 2**. United States Currency is defined as any legal tender such as dollar bills as well as coins.
- **Section 3.** The Department of Justice shall oversee this legislation.
- **Section 4.** This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2025. The existence of this law shall not be referenced as an affirmative defense against any other charges.
- **Section 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

WHEREAS, The United States has the highest concentration of wealth, geopolitical power, and is one of the largest contributors to carbon emissions in the world; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Congress here assembled recognize the duty of the federal government to:

- A. Achieve net-zero greenhouse gas emissions;
- **B.** Preserve and protect the nation's natural beauty;
- **C.** Guarantee economic security for all people in the Untied States through the creation of sustainable jobs;
- **D.** Upgrade the nation's crumbling infrastructure; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That these goals be accomplished through a 10-year national mobilization

13	the enforcement of this legislation.

15	increa	se in the federal corporate tax rate	
16	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2025. All laws in	
17	conflict with	this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
