### A Bill For Farmland Preservation and Urban Limitation.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- 1 **SECTION 1**. The purpose of this bill is to incentivize states to limit urban expansion,
- 2 preserve farmland, and prioritize agricultural land use, with the ultimate goal of
- 3 contributing to food security, environmental sustainability, and responsible land use
- 4 planning.

#### 5 **SECTION 2**. Definitions:

- Cities are defined as urban centers that serve as political, economic, or social hubs
   within a region.
  - Farmland Preservation refers to the protection of agricultural land from urban sprawl and the continued use of land for farming and agricultural production.

- Each state is encouraged to limit urban sprawl by developing zoning and land-use plans that designate a balanced number of urban centers. In return, participating states will receive increased federal funding for agricultural, environmental, and conservation projects.
  - `The excess land in states that participate in this program should be preserved for agriculture to promote food security and address global hunger concerns.

#### 17 SECTION 4.

- The USDA will administer this program in collaboration with state governments.
- States that wish to participate must submit a voluntary plan to the USDA by

  January 1, 2026, detailing how they will achieve urban limitation and increase

  farmland preservation. States that submit an acceptable plan will qualify for a 10%

  increase in federal funding through existing agricultural programs, such as the

  Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) and Environmental Quality Incentives

  Program (EQIP), which may be expanded or modified as needed to support this

  effort.
  - States that choose not to participate may see a reduction in discretionary federal funding related to agriculture and environmental programs, following this bill's provisions.

- The USDA will provide states with guidance, tools, and best practices to assist in developing urban limitation and farmland preservation plans.
- Existing cities that exceed the recommended limits will undergo a review process to assess their potential reclassification and, where feasible, be supported in transitioning smaller urban areas to rural designations.

**SECTION 5.** This legislation will take effect immediately upon passage. All conflicting laws are hereby declared null and void, provided that this Act's provisions are construed to incentivize, rather than mandate, compliance.

# A Bill to Incentivize Employment Among the Lumber Industry to Improve the Housing Crisis

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	Under the passage of this legislation, lumber businesses will receive a tax
2		exemption under the Work Opportunity Tax Credit (WOTC). The Work
3		Opportunity Tax Credit will continue to operate until 30 September of 2030
4		unless action is taken by Congress to extend or reduce.
5	SECTION 2.	A lumber business is defined by the Cambridge Dictionary as, "Wood that
6		has been prepared for the activity for buying and selling."
7	SECTION 3.	The Department of Treasury will oversee the enforcement and funding of
8		this bill.
9		A. For employees of the Lumber Industry who worked at least 120 hours
10		but less than 400 hours in a year, the employer shall receive up to
11		\$6,000 in tax credit (25% of \$24,000 of first-year wages) per

14		more, the employer shall receive \$9,600 (40% of \$24,000 of first-year

### A Bill to Disable All Nuclear Weapons

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- **SECTION 1**. This bill is set to completely disable all of the nuclear weapons in the arsenal of the United States of America military in all branches.
- SECTION 2. Nuclear weapons will be defined as any kind of explosive which draws upon nuclear energy to detonate, for the purpose of causing destruction (e.g. bombs, torpedoes, missiles, etc.).
- SECTION 3. This bill shall be enacted by the Department of Energy, specifically the National Nuclear Security Administration, in conjunction with the Department of Defense. The departments shall, as swiftly as is feasible, completely disable all nuclear weapons held by the United States military and all the branches thereof such that they will never again become usable.
- **SECTION 4.** This bill shall go into effect six months after passing.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## A Bill to Establish Grants to Promote ADUs as an Affordable Housing Solution

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- **SECTION 1.** Establish a grant program that homeowners can apply to to fund the building of an Additional Dwelling Unit. The City where these individuals live will receive infrastructure funding upon approval of these residential zones to be ADU friendly.
- **SECTION 2.** ADU is Additional (or Accessory) Dwelling Unit, a secondary house or apartment that shares the building lot of a larger, primary home.
- **SECTION 3.** The Department of Housing and Urban Development will oversee the enforcement of this legislation.
  - A. Grants up to \$20,000 for the building of an ADU, based on location, size, and cost, can be awarded to individuals that apply to their state for this program.
  - B. Individuals must apply to the city for their residential zoning to be ADU friendly. Upon the city's approval of their zoning request, the grant will be given to the individual and the city will receive \$5,000 in infrastructure spending.
  - C. This program will be funded through an increase on corporate taxes from 21% to 28%. The additional revenue created will be directed and managed by the Department of Housing and Urban Development for use in this program.
- **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect on FY 2026. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

### **Autonomous AI Safety and Oversight Act**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

**SECTION 1**. No autonomous AI system shall be permitted to operate independently in high-stakes decision-making without human oversight.

Any autonomous system used in critical applications must have a

Any autonomous system used in critical applications must have a designated human operator who retains ultimate decision-making authority.

Autonomous AI systems may not engage in activities that could directly harm individuals, infringe on rights, or operate in environments where they could unpredictably interact with humans.

All autonomous AI systems must include a failsafe mechanism that allows human operators to override decisions or shut down the system in emergencies.

Regular testing of these mechanisms is required to ensure functionality.

- SECTION 2. Autonomous AI System: Any artificial intelligence system that operates without human intervention or control in decision-making processes.

  High-Stakes Decision-Making: Decisions that could significantly affect individuals' rights, safety, or well-being, including but not limited to military operations, law enforcement, healthcare, and financial services.
- **SECTION 3.** The Office of the Under Secretary of State for Arms Control and International Security will oversee the enforcement of this bill. All those in violation of this bill will be subject to fines, sanctions, or other penalties as determined by the department.
- **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2025. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## A Bill to Increase Research and Production Funds towards the Implementation of Fusion Energy

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

**SECTION 1.** The government will stop investing in private sector fusion companies and officially transfer to and invest in a newly created public organization. 2 billion USD will be invested annually into this program. The program will be called the National Research and Developmentation Institution of Fusion Energy and will focus entirely on advancing the implementation of Fusion Energy in the power grid and removing unclean energy from it in the future. All previous nuclear fusion reactors owned by the US will be used to achieve this goal. Any additional details will be up to the discretion of the President.

In addition to this investment, let it be know that with the implementation of the bill

- a. there will be a 15% increase in investment annually after the first 3 years.
- b. All information revealed from the numerous investigations will be released to the public as needed.
- c. All leading workers in previous nuclear energy facilities under research will be provided with a job with the necessary training and background information if it be their will. In addition, a special investigation will go underway immediately to find and hire (if they see it fit and the one found agrees) any additional people for the job.
- d. Additional support from the public will be required as needed. This will include scheduled energy grid redirections towards specific institutions and the general suggestion for budgeted energy usage in towns with research and experimentation facilities.

This bill will be funded by the The U.S. Department of Energy.

- Fusion power is defined as the "proposed form of power generation that would generate electricity by using heat from nuclear fusion reactions". In a fusion process, two atomic nuclei combine to form a heavier nucleus, while releasing energy. Fusion reactors are devices designed to harness this energy.
- **SECTION 3.** This bill will be overseen and enforced by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC)
- **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2025. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
