A Bill to Require Financial Literacy Education in Highschools.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	All public high schools will be required to provide a financial literacy course	
2		as a mandatory part of the curriculum for all students prior to graduation.	
3		This course will cover essential topics such as budgeting, savings, credit	
4		management, taxes, loans, and investments.	
5	SECTION 2.	The financial literacy course must include the following core topics:	
6		a)Budgeting and Money Management – Basic budgeting principles,	
7	managing income and expenses, and the importance of savings.		
8		b)Credit and Loans — Understanding credit scores, credit cards, loans	
9		(student loans, car loans, mortgages), and the consequences of debt.	
10		c)Taxes – How do you file basic tax returns? What is the understanding of	
11		different types of taxes, and how they work.	
12		d)Investing and Retirement—This Course introduces investments, stocks,	
13		and bonds and discusses the importance of long-term financial planning,	
14		such as retirement accounts (e.g., 401(k), and Roth IRA).	
15		e)Consumer Protection and Financial Scams – Recognizing financial fraud,	
16		predatory lending, and protecting personal information.	
17	SECTION 3.	Public high schools shall integrate financial literacy into their curricula	
18		starting in the 2025-2026 school year.	
19	SECTION 4.	The Department of Education shall oversee the implementation of this bill.	
20		Schools may either add a stand-alone course or incorporate financial	
21		literacy into existing subjects such as mathematics or economics.	
22	a) \$50 r	million in funding shall be allocated annually to support the development of	
23	financial literacy resources, training for educators, and access to materials for		
24	students. Schools may apply for grants to assist in implementing the course.

A Bill to End Tipping

1	SECTION 1.	Employers shall divide among and pay restaurant employees ten percent of
2		sales revenue generated by that business.
3	SECTION 2.	Restaurant employees shall be defined as all employees of businesses
4		where food is served, all employees who engage in cashiering or table
5		waiting. Managers shall be defined as any employee responsible for
6		controlling or administering all or part of the restaurant's staff, employees
7		who do not engage in cashiering or table waiting.
8	SECTION 3.	The Bureau of Labor shall oversee the implementation of this policy,
9		ensuring that employers pay this remittance.
10		A. This additional remittance must be included in the price before
11		purchase.
12		B. This additional remittance will not be paid to managers.
13	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on August 1, 2025. All laws in conflict with
14		this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
