BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1 . Internet Gambling is now banned in the United States		
2	A. This bill supplements the Unlawful Internet Gambling Enforcement Act		
3	(UIGEA) and the Federal Wire Act		
4	SECTION 2. Internet gambling shall be defined as the means to place a bet or wager by		
5	any means which involves the use, at least in part, of the Internet. Compulsive gambling		
6	shall be defined as a persistent inclination towards putting something in value at stake		
7	and governed by the chance of uncertainty.		
8	A. Internet gambling includes but is not limited to:		
9	a. Online betting on teams		
10	b. In-game lootboxes		
11	c. Online casinos		
12	d. Online slot machines		
13	SECTION 3. The Department of Health and Human Safety (HHS) will		
14	oversee the implementation of this legislation.		
15	A. Companies using internet-gambling will be fined \$10,000 fine for each		
16	day they have internet-gambling implemented after this legislation		
17	takes effect.		
18	SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect 30 days after passage.

8		SECTION 3	In order to fund this legislation, tax reforms will be put in place. A		
9		progressive Va	progressive Value-Added Tax (VAT) shall be placed on luxury goods. In addition,		
10		Companies tha	Companies that produce over \$1,000,000,000 in yearly revenue shall now be		
11		taxed a 35% co	taxed a 35% corporate tax. Funds from redundant welfare programs shall be		
12		transferred to this legislation. Whether or whether not a welfare program is			
13		redundant is to	be at the discretion of the U.S congress.

- A Bill to Strengthen Safety Regulations for Gun Ownership to Protect Public SafetyBE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- **SECTION 1**. The federal government shall implement stricter safety regulations for gun ownership, including mandatory federal background checks, yearly safety inspections for all firearms, and a renewable safety license required for possession.
- **SECTION 2.** A. A "Federal Background Check" shall be defined as a review of criminal, mental health, and other relevant records to determine eligibility for firearm possession.
 - B. A "Safety Inspection" shall be defined as an annual examination conducted by a certified firearm specialist to ensure safe operation and compliance with federal standards.
 - C. A "Safety License" shall be defined as a certification that the firearm owner has met all legal, safety, and training requirements to possess a firearm, renewed every five years.
- **SECTION 3.** A. The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) shall oversee the enforcement of this legislation. An extra 6 billion dollars a year will be allocated from the government.
 - B. State-level law enforcement agencies will assist in performing background checks, firearm safety inspections, and managing the issuance and renewal of safety licenses.
 - C. Firearm owners found to be non-compliant with this legislation will face fines or revocation of firearm privileges.
- **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2025. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A BILL TO REGULATE CRYPTOCURRENCY TO ENSURE MARKET TRANSPARENCY AND INVESTOR PROTECTION

1	BE IT ENACT	TED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	To ensure transparency and accountability, all cryptocurrency projects
3		with an anticipated market capitalization exceeding \$1 million must
4		register with the newly established Digital Asset Regulatory Agency
5		(DARA).
6	SECTION 2.	"Cryptocurrency" refers to a digital or virtual currency secured by
7		cryptography and operating on a decentralized blockchain platform.
8		"Market Manipulation" refers to actions such as pump-and-dump schemes,
9		insider trading, and other activities that intentionally mislead investors or
10		artificially inflate asset value. "Pump and Dumps" in the Cryptocurrency
11		market typically involve an actor or group of actors investing in a token,
12		heavily promoting it to spur a price increase, and subsequently dumping
13		their holdings at a significant profit.
14	SECTION 3.	This legislation shall create the Digital Asset Regulatory Agency (DARA),
15		allocating \$750 million for FY2026 from the Department of the Treasury.
16		A. DARA shall maintain a public database of registered cryptocurrencies,
17		their founders, and compliance records.
18		B. DARA shall investigate and prosecute cases of market manipulation
19		and fraud.
20		C. Enforcement mechanisms will include:
21		a. Mandatory project registration with penalties of up to \$5
22		million for non-compliance.
23		b. Imposing a 30-day holding period for large stakeholders
24		(holding over 5% of tokens) before selling assets.
25	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2025.
26	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Implement a Carbon-Tax

1	BE II ENACIEI	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States shall implement a Carbon-Tax in order to reduce the amount
3		of carbon dioxide (CO ₂) in the atmosphere and to promote a more
4		environmentally friendly and sustainable future.
5	SECTION 2.	A. A Carbon-Tax is defined as a tax on the amount of carbon dioxide that a given
6		facility emits exceeding emissions of 20 metric tons per year. Emissions
7		above this threshold will be taxed at \$5 per metric ton until January 1,
8		2030, when the rate will increase to \$50 per metric ton.
9		B. Companies will be subject to the tax if they meet the following criteria:
10		1. The company receives any form of government subsidies;
11		2. Operate facilities in regions with an Air Quality Index (AQI) of 100 or
12		higher.
13		C. This tax applies to all American-owned manufacturing facilities operating
14		abroad, regardless of local carbon tax policies.
15	SECTION 3.	The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the Internal Revenue Service
16		(IRS) will oversee the tax's implementation and distribution.
17		A. The EPA will invest 70% of the collected tax money into the research and
18		development of renewable energy, which includes the expansion of the
19		renewable energy power grid.
20		B. 15% of the collected tax money will go to the Arbor Day Foundation, which
21		will use the funds to plant trees in areas with a dangerously high AQI.
22		C. 15% of the collected tax money will go directly to the EPA, to help fund
23		other environmentally sustainable projects.
24	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2026. All laws in conflict with this
25		legislation are hereby declared null and void.
