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A Bill to End Pretextual Traffic Stops

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:		
2	SECTION 1.	Law enforcement officers throughout the United States and its	
3		territories are henceforth prohibited from conducting pretextual traffic	
4		stops.	
5	SECTION 2.	A pretextual traffic stop is defined as the detainment and investigation	
6		of a motorist for an offense that does not present a clear and present	
7		danger to those on or near the roadway or which is conducted primarily	
8		to pursue suspicion of a more serious crime.	
9	SECTION 3.	Any law enforcement agency found to be in violation of this legislation	
10		shall lose federal funding until such time as compliance is reached. Any	
11		officer found to be in repeated violation of this legislation shall be	
12		disciplined up to and including termination.	
13	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall be overseen by the Department of Justice.	
14	SECTION 5.	This legislation shall take effect immediately upon passage.	
15	SECTION 6.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and	
16		void.	

A Resolution to Celebrate and Protect Surrogacy for Foreign Nationals

1	WHEREAS	A prominent European nation which already bans its citizens from
2		becoming parents through surrogacy has now criminalized the same
3		practice even when pursued abroad; and
4	WHEREAS	This is a clear infringement of basic human rights and a shameless and
5		overreaching attempt to enforce traditionalist and reactionary notions
6		of family that have no place in the 21st century; and
7	WHEREAS	As a global leader, the United States owes it to the international
8		community to reject such hatred and speak up for human rights around
9		the globe; now, therefore be it
10	RESOLVED	by the Congress here assembled that foreign nationals who visit the
11		United States seeking to become parents through surrogacy because
12		they are forbidden from doing so in their homeland are to be celebrated $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right) \left(1\right) \left($
13		and supported in these pursuits; and be it
14	FURTHER RESOLVED	that Congress encourages all who are involved in such undertakings
15		here in the United States to do their best to serve foreign nationals in a
16		way that shields them to the greatest extent possible from potential
17		recriminations from their home governments; and be it
18	FURTHER RESOLVED	that Congress calls upon all foreign governments not just to
19		decriminalize so-called surrogacy tourism but also to legalize and
20		regulate the practice within their borders.

A Bill to Institute Siesta in Federal Offices

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRE	ESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2	SECTION 1.	All federal offices shall redesign their schedules to provide three full
3		hours of off-time in the middle of the work day to allow employees time
4		for siesta. Employees may stay at their worksite for siesta, or they may
5		leave the premises.
6	SECTION 2.	A siesta is defined as resting or napping during the middle of the day, a
7		practice with wide-ranging and well-documented health benefits.
8	SECTION 3.	Federal offices are encouraged to provide space for employees to take
9		their siesta on the premises. Congress shall apportion an additional
10		\$500 million annually to the Department of Health to be used to
11		support workplaces in preparing spaces and purchasing supplies for
12		siesta. Non-federal workplaces may also apply for these funds and are
13		encouraged to enact similar practices for the health and well-being of
14		their employees.
15	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall be jointly overseen by the Department of Health
16		and the Department of Labor.
17	SECTION 5.	This legislation shall take effect January 1, 2026.
18	SECTION 6.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and
19		void.
