# A Bill to Ban Homeschooling to Enhance Social Activity and Independence

1	BE II ENACIE	D BY II	HE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	In ord	der to ensure children have the opportunity to gain independence
3		and r	eceive the basic standards of education and fundamental skills,
4		home	eschooling shall be banned for children of appropriate age for
5		educa	ation.
6	SECTION 2.	The to	erms shall be defined as follows:
7		A.	"Basic Standards of Education" shall be defined as the basic skills
8			necessary to learn the average school curriculum.
9		В.	"Homeschooling" shall be defined as education conducted in any
10			place other than a school.
11		C.	"Appropriate Age for Education" shall be defined as any person at
12			or between the ages of 4 to 17.
13	SECTION 3.	The D	epartment of Education shall pull the funding of institutions,
14		indivi	duals, and programs that receive Federal funds if they do not
15		comp	ly with the provisions of this bill.
16		A.	Recipients of Federal funds through grants, agreements, loans, or
17			arrangements are subject to the consequences of encouraging
18			homeschooling.
19	SECTION 4.	This l	egislation will take effect on January 1, 2025. All laws in conflict with
20		this le	egislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A Bill to Aid Sudan

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY TH	HE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The U	nited States shall hereby donate and deliver \$400 million in
3		huma	nitarian aid to the citizens of Sudan through Sudan's maritime
4		borde	er with Saudi Arabia. US troops will be allotted as necessary to
5		delive	r the aid to USAID representatives at the border.
6	SECTION 2.	The te	erms shall be defined as follows:
7		A.	Humanitarian aid shall consist of a combination of agricultural
8			supplication, temporary housing, bottled water, and medical
9			supplies, including but not limited to; vaccines and first aid
10			equipment.
11		В.	The maritime border shall be defined as the Red Sea that is apart
12			of Sudan's territorial waters.
13		C.	US troops allocation shall include but not be limited to: arming
14			ships used for transport.
15	SECTION 3.	The U	S Department of State in conjunction with USAID will be
16		respo	nsible for the implementation and oversight of this bill.
17	SECTION 4.	This le	egislation shall be implemented immediately upon passage. All laws
18		in con	flict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## The Taxpayer Assistance and eXemption (T.A.X.) Act

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY TH	IE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	To exe	empt tips and overtime earnings from federal income tax,
3		increa	sing take-home pay for American workers and retirees.
4	SECTION 2.	For th	e purposes of this legislation, the following terms are defined:
5		A.	"Tips" shall be defined as any income received as gratuities.
6		B.	"Overtime Earnings" shall be defined as any income received from
7			overtime hours.
8		C.	"Tip Credit" shall be defined as the practice of counting tips as a
9			portion of wages to meet federal or state minimum wage
10			requirements.
11	SECTION 3.	The D	epartment of Treasury and Internal Revenue Service will be
12		respoi	nsible for the implementation of this legislation:
13		A. Bu	sinesses that utilize tip credits shall be subject to an additional 12%
14		tax	Х.
15	SECTION 4.	This le	gislation will take effect on January 1st, 2025. All laws in conflict
16		with t	his legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## A Bill to Limit Annual College Tuition Price Increases

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The U.S Federal Government will require colleges to limit annual tuition
3		price increases no greater than the year-over-year inflation rate to
4		address the student debt crisis. Colleges that raise tuition prices above
5		the predetermined amount will lose the benefits of their tax-exempt
6		status.
7	SECTION 2.	Benefits of tax-exempt status shall include access to tax-deductible
8		donations, tax-free infrastructure projects, and minimal tax payments.
9	SECTION 3.	The Department of Education will be responsible for overseeing the
10		implementation and enforcement of this bill. Congress must vote to
11		increase tuition fees if it exceeds the current year-over-year inflation
12		rate.
13	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2025. All laws in conflict with this
14		legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## **The Haitian Recovery Act (HR Act)**

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	The United States government shall allocate \$1 Billion to support Haiti in	
3		restoring stability, strengthening its national police force, and addressing	
4		urgent humanitarian needs.	
5	SECTION 2.	Haitian National Police (HNP) shall be defined as the primary law	
6		enforcement agency of Haiti.	
7	SECTION 3.	The Department of State, in coordination with the Department of	
8		Defense and the Department of Treasury, shall oversee the enforcement	
9		of this legislation. The specific enforcement mechanisms shall include:	
10		A. Allocation of Funds:	
11		I. \$500 million shall be earmarked for enhancing and strengthening	
12		the capacity of the HNP, including training, equipment, and	
13		infrastructure.	
14		II. \$300 million shall be allocated for urgent humanitarian aid,	
15		including food, medical supplies, and clean water.	
16		III. \$200 million shall be reserved for future governance support and	
17		economic development initiatives. This would be a second	
18		subsection.	
19		B. Deployment of U.S. Troops: A limited contingent of U.S. troops, not	
20		exceeding 1,000 personnel, shall be deployed to Haiti to assist in	
21		training the HNP and providing logistical support for aid distribution.	
22		C. Reporting requirements: The Department of State shall provide	
23		quarterly reports to Congress on the implementation of this bill and	
24		the situation in Haiti, which they will get from the HNP.	
25	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect immediately upon passage. All laws in	
26		conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A Bill to Establish Universal Preschool

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States Department of Education will integrate universal
3		preschool into our public school system.
4	SECTION 2.	Universal Preschool is a publicly funded and tuition-free program
5		for age-eligible children. Age-eligible children are children who are
6		between the ages of 2-5.
7	SECTION 3.	The United States Department of Education will oversee and
8		enforce this legislation.
9		A. The DOE shall have a budget of \$40 billion per annum.
10		B. Subsidies shall be given to the early childhood providers within the
11		\$40 billion budget.
12	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2025. All laws in
13		conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A Bill to Demilitarize Police

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The Department of Defense will no longer sell or transfer Surplus Military
3		Equipment to State or local law enforcement, firefighting, homeland
4		security, or emergency management agencies.
5	SECTION 2.	Surplus Military Equipment is defined as equipment transferred under 10
6		U.S. Code § 2576. State or local law enforcement, firefighting, homeland
7		security, or emergency management agencies are agencies eligible for
8		Surplus Military Equipment as defined by 10 U.S. Code § 2576.
9	SECTION 3.	The Defense Logistics Agency must cease the approval of any new
10		transfers of Surplus Military Equipment.
11		A. The Defense Logistics Agency is directed to find alternate ways to use
12		or dispose of Surplus Military Equipment.
13	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect immediately upon passage. All laws in
14		conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## A Bill to Revive the Company Town

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY TH	HE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	All co	mpanies doing business in the United States that employ more than
3		2,000	individuals will be required to provide affordable housing for their
4		emplo	byees no more than 25 miles from the company's place of business.
5		A.	Employees cannot be required to make use of their employer's
6			housing options, but the company must provide affordable
7			housing for all employees who request it.
8		В.	Individuals' job performance and/or employment status at the
9			company cannot be used as grounds for eviction.
10		C.	If the corporation has an excess of housing units, they may offer
11			these for rent or purchase to individuals who do not work for the
12			company.
13	SECTION 2.	"Affor	dable housing" shall be defined as housing on which the occupant
14		is pay	ing no more than 30% of their gross income for housing costs,
15		includ	ling utilities.
16	SECTION 3.	This le	egislation shall be implemented by the U.S. Department of Housing
17		and U	rban Development (HUD).
18	SECTION 4.	This le	egislation will take effect on August 1, 2030. All laws in conflict with
19		this le	gislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### **A Bill to Invest into Water Conservation**

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Congress shall provide funding towards the construction of technology
3		that will help farmers conserve water. This funding will come in the form
4		of grants for which U.S. farmers may apply.
5	SECTION 2.	A. The technologies mentioned in Section 1 are primarily defined as drip
6		irrigation, micro-irrigation, and nanobubble technology.
7		B. Funding for this legislation will come from a 5% increase in corporate
8		income tax.
9	SECTION 3.	This legislation will be jointly overseen by the Department of Agriculture
10		(USDA), U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), and Internal
11		Revenue Service (IRS).
12		A. Once the USDA and EPA deem the water conservation adequate and to
13		a sustainable level, the corporate tax rate will be returned to its rate at
14		the time of passage.
15		B. The USDA will conduct inspections starting 2 years after this legislation
16		takes effect. Any farm found to be using more than 2.5 acre feet of water
17		per acre will be fined \$50,000.
18	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on June 1st, 2025. All laws in conflict with
19		this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
