A Bill to Increase Research and Development in Cloning for Organ Duplication

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	ON 1. Thousands of Americans spend years on organ donor waitlists. We call	
3		this Congress here assembled to invest in research and development into	
4		cloning technology for Organ Duplication.	
5	SECTION 2.	Organ Duplication Technology will be defined as methods of cloning that	
6		are only developed for cloning already living organisms, including but not	
7		limited to somatic cell nuclear transfer, artificial wombs, and/or	
8		xenotransplantation.	
9	SECTION 3. The United States will direct 15 billion dollars of total funding to subs		
10		the cloning/biotechnology industry over a 5-year period. The funding	
11		shall be provided for by the Department of Defense.	
12	SECTION 4.	The Department of Health will oversee the funding implementation to	
13		increase R&D using private contractors to conduct the research.	
L4	SECTION 5.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2026. All laws in conflict with	
15		this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Prohibit the Banning of Critical Race Theory Being Taught in Schools

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:			
2	SECTION 1.	1. The federal government will strip funding from any state education		
3		agency that has banned the teachings of critical race theory in their		
4		curriculum, and AP courses related to the matter.		
5	SECTION 2.	Critical Race Theory shall be defined as the teachings that race is a social		
6		construct, and that racism is not merely the product of individual bias or		
7		prejudice, but also something embedded in legal systems and policies.		
8	SECTION 3.	The Department of Education will oversee the implementation of this		
9		legislation until deemed unnecessary.		
10		A. If states are found in violation of this legislation, federal funding to		
11		their education departments will be decreased on a 25% increment		
12		per semester.		
13		B. Once a previously violating state begins to abide by this legislation,		
14		federal funding will be added back on a 25% increment per semester		
15		until it returns to the state's original education funding.		
16	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2026. All laws in conflict with		
17		this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

3	SECTION 2.	Cellular Devices shall be defined as a telecommunication device that uses	
4		radio waves over a networked area (cells) and is served through a cell site	
5		or base station at a fixed location, enabling calls to transmit wirelessly	
6		over a wide range	
7	SECTION 3.	The Department of Education shall oversee the implementation of the	
8		bill.	
9		A. Federal Funding will be decreased for any district, not in compliance	
10		B. Schools shall have the autonomy to implement the device ban.

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Limit the use of Eminent Domain to Disaster Relief and Defensive Purposes.

1		RESOLVED,	By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the following		
2		article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States,			
3		which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when			
4		ratified by the	legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within seven		
5		years from the	date of its submission by the Congress:

7		SECTION 1.	No longer shall the use of eminent domain be invoked under any		
8		circumstances outside the use of aid in defensive readiness or humanitarian nee			
9		Furthermore, a minimum of \$100,000 shall be set for the compensation of			
10		properties seized by eminent domain to ensure that the amount compensated is			
11		just.

13		A. Defensi	ive readiness shall be defined as the ability needed for military		
14		forces to f	ight and meet the demands of their mission.		
15		B. Human	itarian needs shall be defined as, but not limited to: relief aid, food,		
16		shelter, wa	ater, sanitation, and hygiene promotion.

The Genital Research Around Contraceptive Equality (G.R.A.C.E) Act

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:			
2	SECTION 1.	The United States government shall push funding towards genital		
3		research for contraception, specifically focusing on efforts to expand		
4		access for male birth control methods. These methods, once approved,		
5		will available to the public through Planned Parenthood, which will also		
6		be receiving more federal funding to expand overall access to		
7		contraception.		
8	SECTION 2.	Birth control methods are defined as the use of medicines, devices, or		
9		surgery to prevent pregnancy.		
10	SECTION 3.	The FDA will oversee the research part of this legislation. They will		
11		provide funding for the research and spread it across multiple private		
12		research institutions. Funding towards Planned Parenthood will be		
13		centered based on state record.		
14		A. Funding for research will be 50 million dollars.		
15		B. The private research institutions in question will be chosen by the		
16		FDA.		
17		C. Funding towards Planned Parenthood will be increased by 100 million		
18		dollars.		
19		D. Funding will come from a 10% tax on nicotine products.

A Bill to Ban Diabetes Medication Use for Cosmetic Purposes to Decrease Medication Costs and Increase Accessibility for Diabetic Needs

BE IT ENACTED BY THIS NSDA CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. The United States Federal Government shall ban the use of Diabetes medicines for weight loss and/or cosmetic purposes instead of using FDA-approved weight loss drugs

SECTION 2. Diabetes medication shall be defined as FDA-approved drugs used to treat diabetes mellitus by decreasing glucose levels in the blood. This includes but is not limited to Ozempic, Mounjaro, and Trulicity. Cosmetic purposes shall be defined as an action for the purpose of beautifying, preserving, or conferring comeliness which includes but is not limited to weight loss.

SECTION 3. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) shall oversee the implementation of this bill.

A. Individual states shall oversee the punishment given. B. Any disputed claims shall be determined by individual states.

SECTION 4. If a physician is charged with administering a prescription of diabetic medication instead of weight loss medication, he or she will have his or her medical license suspended for 28 days.

SECTION 5. Implementation will be June 2025. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Prohibit the Marketing of Prize-Based Content to Children Tied to Merchandise Purchases

1 2	BE IT ENACTE SECTION 1.	CTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:		
	SECTION 1.	It shall be illegal to create and distribute online video content marketed		
3		towards children that offers entry into contests, giveaways, or prize		
4		opportunities in exchange for the purchase of merchandise associated		
5		with the content creator.		
6	SECTION 2.	A. "Content marketed towards children" refers to any online video		
7		content primarily designed for, or appealing to, audiences under the age		
8		of 13.		
9		B. "Prize opportunities" refer to any form of sweepstakes, contests,		
10		raffles, or giveaways where a child may enter based on the purchase of		
11		merchandise.		
12		C. "Merchandise" refers to any products, including but not limited to		
13		apparel, toys, accessories, or digital goods, that are sold directly by or on		
14		behalf of the content creator.		
15	SECTION 3.	The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) shall oversee the enforcement of		
16		this legislation and be empowered to issue fines and penalties for		
17		violations.		
18		A. A first instance of illegal marketing shall result in a fine of up to		
19		\$50,000.		
20		B. Subsequent violations may result in increased fines up to \$200,000		
21		and potential restrictions on the content creator's ability to monetize		
22		content for a period of up to one year.		
23		C. Video platforms hosting content directed at children must implement		
24		measures to identify and restrict any content creators engaging in		
25		activities that violate this legislation.		
26	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2026.		
27	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Remove Direct Election of Presidential Electors

1	RESOLVED,	By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the
2	following arti	cle is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the
3	United States	, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the
4	Constitution	when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the
5	several states	within seven years from the date of its submission by the
6	Congress:	
7		ARTICLE
8	SECTION 1:	The Electoral College, and its electors, shall hereby be
9		selected by each state's legislative branch by a two thirds
10		majority in each house (if applicable).
11	SECTION 2:	Each state's slate of electors must be confirmed by their
12		legislative branch at least 5 months before the meeting of
13		the Electoral College to elect the President.
14		· ·
15	SECTION 3:	Valid electors will be vetted by the state legislature based on
16		advanced military rank, educational attainment, and service
17		to the United States at the state or federal level, whether
18		appointed or elected.
19	SECTION 4:	Elections for the electors of each state, and the regularly
20		scheduled general election for President, shall be ended.
21	SECTION 5:	The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by
22		appropriate legislation.
