# A Resolution for the United States to Intervene in Haiti

- 1. WHEREAS, In 2021, the democratically elected President Jovenel Moïse
- 2. was assassinated in Haiti; and
- 3. WHEREAS, A 7.2 magnitude earthquake struck the country weeks
- 4. later leading to more political disarray; and
- 5. WHEREAS, A violent gang insurrection has grown in Haiti; and
- 6. WHEREAS, The Haitian Government has collapsed as a result of the
- 7. instability; and
- 8. WHEREAS, It has led to major humanitarian crises, violence across the
- 9. country, the death and kidnapping of thousands of Haitians; and
- 10. WHEREAS, The United Nations requires more support from member nations
- 11. to stop the violence in Haiti; now, therefore, be it
- 12. **RESOLVED,** By this Congress assembled here that the United States
- 13. initiates military intervention and aids the United Nations' effort to bring
- 14. peace and stability in Haiti; and, be it
- 15. **FURTHER RESOLVED**, That the United States should strive to help the people
- 16. of Haiti and create a path to strengthen relations with the nation.

# A resolution to amend the Constitution to add a maximum age limit to run for president

1	RESOLVED, By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the
2	following article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the
3	United States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the
4	Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several
5	states within seven years from the date of its submission by the Congress:
6	ARTICLE
7	<b>SECTION 1</b> : This resolution would enact a maximum age limit for
8	anyone running for the position of President of the United
9	States of America. Candidates would have to be below 50
10	years of age.
11	<b>SECTION 2</b> : Candidates are defined as anyone who is running for
12	President of the United States of America.
13	<b>SECTION 3:</b> Candidates would have to be below the age of 50 years in
14	order to run for President. Candidates could not turn 50 prior
15	to the inauguration of their presidency if elected.
16	<b>SECTION 4:</b> This legislation will take effect immediately and all laws in
17	conflict with this legislation are hereby null and void.

# A Bill to Implement a Sweet Tax

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	Any food or drink with added sugar or sugar substitutes will be taxed 1.0
2		cents per product ounce.
3	SECTION 2.	Added sugar as defined by the Food and Drug Administration "includes
4		sugars that are added during processing of foods (such as sucrose or
5		dextrose), foods packaged as sweeteners (such as table sugar), sugars from
6		syrups and honeys, and sugar from processed vegetable or fruit juice."
7		Sugar substitutes include aspartame, monk fruit extract, saccharin,
8		sucralose, stevia, acesulfame potassium (ace-K), and cyclamate.
9	SECTION 3.	The United States Food and Drug Administration will be in charge of
10		implementing this bill.
11	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2026.
12	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

### A Bill to Regulate Generative Artificial Intelligence Art

-		HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- **Section 1.** The United States will regulate generative artificial intelligence art by establishing a set of guidelines that AI art generators must follow if they are headquartered within the 50 states or any U.S. territories.
  - A. The companies behind the AI art generators must provide a database of all the art they have collected to generate new pieces from said art. The database needs to provide attribution data (e.g. name of artist, source) for each piece of art. This database must be easily accessible/navigable for the public to view in a designated area of their website.
  - B. Copyright holders must be notified within a month of the art being acquired by the company and provide proof of notification.
  - C. The companies behind AI art generators must remove any piece of art they have in the database if a copyright holder requests its removal through an official form the company must provide. The company has two weeks from receiving the form to remove the piece from its database. The company must also blacklist the art to prevent its addition to the generator.
  - D. If the company fails to remove the piece of art from their database after two weeks, they will be fined \$100 for every piece they failed to remove by the request of the copyright holder. If the same copyright holder requests additional removals after two weeks from their last request of removal, the fine will increase by \$100 for each removal.
  - E. The company must also document the method they use to receive the data and art for the generators and release quarterly reports through the website database. These reports must at least include the sources used for the data and the method of collecting the data.
- Section 2. Al art generators shall be defined as tools, software, or platforms that
  utilize artificial intelligence algorithms to analyze and synthesize visual or
  graphical outputs by referencing existing works, particularly those created by
  humans.
- 32. **Section 3.** The United States Copyright Office will oversee this legislation. The
- 33. annual budget of the Copyright Office will be increased by \$125 million in order to
- 34. hire and pay more employees.
- 35. **Section 4.** This shall be fully implemented by the fiscal year October 1, 2026.
- 36. **Section 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and
- 37. void.

## A Bill to Put Stray Cats in Prison

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- SECTION 1. The United States shall add a Feline Rehabilitation Program to its
   Correctional Facilities once this legislation is passed.
- 3 **SECTION 2**. The following definitions are important for this legislation:
- 4 A. "Feline Rehabilitation Program" refers to a program established in correctional facilities
- 5 that involves the care and training of stray cats.
- B. "Stray Cat" refers to a cat that is not microchipped and does not have a home orowner.
- SECTION 3. The Department of Justice shall establish a Feline Rehabilitation Program in each correctional facility that meets the following criteria:
- 10 **A.** The program must take in stray cats that are not microchipped and have no owner.
- must also facilitate inmate participation in the care and training of the cats.
- 12 **B.** Cats must be extensively documented and photographed in the case that the cat is lost
- and not a stray. The documentation will be added to a database.
- The Department of Justice (Bureau of Prisons) shall allocate \$50 million annually to fund the Feline Rehabilitation Program. This will come out of the existing F-35 military budget.
- 17 A. \$1,000 dollars shall be given to shelters that donate half of their stray cats. The rest of
- the money allocated will be used for any vital infrastructure to make the correctional
- 19 facilities cat-friendly.
- 20 B. Congress will evaluate this funding annually to see if further allocation is needed to
- 21 keep the program intact.
- 22 **SECTION 5.** The following defines which prisoners are eligible for this program:
- 23 A. Inmates who have committed nonviolent crimes shall be eligible to participate in the
- 24 program.
- 25 **B.** Inmates who have committed violent crimes may be eligible to participate in the
- 26 program if they exhibit good behavior.
- 27 C. Inmates who exhibit any violent behavior towards the cats or other inmates shall be
- 28 immediately removed from the program.
- 29 **SECTION 6.** This legislation will take effect at the beginning of the 2025 FY. All laws in
- 30 conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# A Bill to Increase US Aid to Ukraine

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- 1 **SECTION 1**. The *Stand with Ukraine Act of 2024* is hereby passed.
- 2 **SECTION 2**. The aforementioned Act will take effect immediately upon passage.
- 3 **SECTION 3.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

- 6. **RESOLVED,** By this Congress that the United States leave and denounce the
- 7. Quad; and, be it
- 8. **FURTHER RESOLVED**, That we seek to cooperate with China on matters in the
- 9. Indo-Pacific region in a much more open and less hostile manner.

## A Bill to Ban Hostile Architecture

- 1 **Section 1.** The United States shall encourage cities to remove hostile architecture.
- 2 **Section 2.** For the sake of this legislation, the following will be defined as:
- A. "Hostile Architecture" refers to design elements of public buildings and spaces that are intended to stop unwanted behavior, ex: spikes on flat surfaces and ridges in the middle of benches to stop people from sleeping there.
- 7 **Section 3.** \$1 million in grants will be given to every city that chooses to remove their hostile architecture.
- A. Money for the grants will come from the existing military budget
- 10 **Section 4.** The Department of Housing and Urban Development will be in charge of overseeing this legislation.
- 12 **Section 5.** This legislation will take effect in 2025. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## A Bill to Improve Assisted Living Facilities

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2. SECTION 1.
- 3. A. All states are required to have state-funded assisted living facilities for elderly with disabilities.
- 4. a. These facilities are required to have a psychologist and psychiatrist on staff.
- 5. b. There will be a mandated ratio in these homes of 4 nurses to 1 resident.
- 6. B. States will be given 100 million dollars per every 1 million people above the age of 60 in their
- 7. state to fund the assisted living facilities.
- 8. C. All requests to transfer to another facility must be reviewed by an independent review board,
- 9. medical professionals, and social workers.
- 10. a. If every other private facility is deemed unsafe, a state home is required to make a
- 11. place accessible to said resident.
- 12. i. Unsafe shall be defined as not having suitable or proper care available for said
- 13. resident to ensure proper care.
- 14. D. "Endangerment of others" in the Retirement Home Reform Act of 1987 will now be defined by
- 15. a tier list based on frequency, containability, severity, and intent.
- 16. E. Facilities will have the right to ban anyone from a section of the home if a patient jeopardizes
- 17. the safety of staff or other residents.
- 18. F. 1 billion dollars shall be allocated to pay for raises and hiring bonuses to encourage the
- 19. acquisition of more nursing staff for homes.
- 20. **SECTION 2**. Assisted living facilities shall be defined as any place housing and giving daily
- 21. assistance to elderly people with disabilities.
- a. The elderly shall be defined as all people over the age of 65.
- 23. **SECTION 3.** This bill shall be enforced by the Department of Justice and the Department of
- 24. Health and Human Services. Any home in violation of this bill will be under investigation and will
- 25. be shut down after 3 infractions. Each infraction will result in paying a tax of 1,000 dollars per
- 26. resident. Any state in violation of this review will have its highway funding taken away.
- 27. **SECTION 4.** This bill shall go into effect 5 years after the passage of this bill.
- 28. **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1. 2.	SECTION 1.	All students in schools receiving any form of federal funding must do mandatory screenings for Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) as a

# A bill for Responsible AI in Defense (RAID)

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	UAVs that utilize AI must ensure human input is involved in critical
3		decision-making processes, particularly in combat scenarios involving
4		strikes.
5		Continuous human input and oversight is required while operating UAVs
6		that utilize AI particularly when executing strikes.
7	SECTION 2.	'(AI) Artificial Intelligence' shall be defined as a set of advanced
8		computational technologies and algorithms that enable unmanned aeria
9		vehicles (UAVs) to perform tasks autonomously or semi-autonomously.
10		This includes but is not limited to capabilities such as real-time data
11		processing, target recognition and tracking, and decision-making based
12		on environmental inputs.'
13		'(UAV) Unmanned Aerial Vehicles' shall be defined as a type of aircraft
14		that operates without a human pilot on board, controlled remotely or
15		autonomously through onboard systems.
16		'Human Input' shall be defined as the active involvement of human
17		judgment, decision-making, and oversight in military operations,
18		particularly in the context of planning, targeting, and executing strikes.
19		This includes but is not limited to evaluating the legitimacy of targets,
20		assessing potential collateral damage, and ensuring compliance with the
21		Geneva Convention.
23	SECTION 3.	The Department of Defense (DoD) shall develop and implement ethical
24		guidelines for human operators to follow.
25	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect immediately.
26		All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void
