

A Bill to Establish a Statewide Age Limit on Caffeinated Beverage Consumption

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CALIFORNIA STATE LEGISLATURE HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1. In an effort to combat rising caffeine consumption in teens and its adverse health effects, the
3	California State Legislature shall hereby ban the purchase and consumption of caffeinated beverages
4	for those under the age of 16.
5	SECTION 2. Caffeinated beverages shall be defined as any beverage with more than 100 mg of caffeine.
6	SECTION 3. The specifics of the bill are as follows:
7	A. Consumers shall be required to provide state or federal verification to purchase caffeinated
8	beverages.
9	B. Those under the age of 16 found to be consuming caffeinated beverages with more than 100 mg
10	of caffeine shall be given an infraction and fined up to \$300.
11	C. Vendors must apply for a license to sell caffeinated beverages with more than 100 mg of caffeine
12	from the state government.
13	D. Vendors found selling these beverages to those under the age of 16 shall be fined \$300 per
14	violation and may have their caffeinated beverage license revoked after three offenses.
15	E. Vendors can appeal to the state to regain their caffeinated beverage license.

- **SECTION 4.** This law shall take effect on October 1st, 2027.
- 17 **SECTION 5.** This bill shall be carried out by the California Department of Public Health.
- **SECTION 6.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

11		below 2°C, to avoid the worst impacts of climate change; and
12	WHEREAS,	a methane and carbon emissions tax would disincentivize further
13		production of carbon and methane emissions, while also generating
14		funds for things like clean energy programs
15	RESOLVED,	That the Congress here assembled impose taxation on carbon and
16		methane emissions.

- 1 WHEREAS, Involuntary labor in prisons have been internationally recognized as forms of labor
- that violate human rights such as health issues and forced work and

- 4 individuals are compelled against their will to provide work or service through the use of force,
- 5 fraud, or coercion and
- 6 **WHEREAS,** A report by the American Civil Liberties Union in 2022 found that 800,000 prisoners
- 7 are forced to work and
- 8 **WHEREAS,** This involuntary servitude has been known to exploit prisoners and therefore be it
- 9 **RESOLVED,** That the Congress assembled here today shall federally abolish involuntary labor in
- prisons to end the exploitation of the incarcerated for the betterment of our justice system

A Bill to Ban Meta's Use of Al Generated Profiles

BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. Meta's use of AI generated profiles on their platforms ought to be banned.

SECTION 2. Al generated profiles, referring to user accounts which are created and operated entirely by Meta's artificial intelligence.

SECTION 3. The Federal Trade Commission will enforce this legislation. The usage of Meta's AI on their platforms relating to artificial profiles or personalities will be banned.

SECTION 4. This legislation will be fully in effect by 2027.

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
