This docket consists of 18 bills and resolutions for consideration at the tournament. Legislation grouping is randomized. The chamber shall set its own calendar, prioritizing B/R with authors present, before starting floor debate.

Delegations should consider splitting their research duties over the coming week.

Some of this legislation may be unconstitutional, unworkable, or ill-advised. These are all issues that may be addressed in floor debate. The inclusion of an item of legislation on this docket does NOT constitute a "clean bill of health" from the League!

A Few Reminders

There are two sessions, each 120 minutes long (plus 15 minutes for morning business). PO service counts as one speech. If you've wanted to preside, now is the time! The FGCCFL Congress site https://fgccfl.net/congress has a copy of the manual and a PO script for beginners.

Recency does not reset. The initial recency tiebreak is set by a random draw in Tabroom.

Direct questioning is now the rule at all tournaments.

The PO may use her/his phone as a timer if it is silenced and in airplane mode.

A Bill to Eliminate the Bike Lane to Create Safer Walkways for Pedestrians

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful not to remove the bike lane and deny the 3 riding of bikes on sidewalks. If people need to walk across the street or 4 somewhere else they may use the newly-constructed pedestrian overpasses. 5 SECTION 2. Pedestrian Overpasses shall be defined as structures designed for pedestrians to cross over a road, river, or railway that would 6 otherwise be more dangerous to cross. 7 8 SECTION 3. The Federal Highway Administration shall be responsible for enforcing the provisions of this bill. They will keep local governments in 9 check by making sure that the pedestrian overpasses are constructed, 10 cyclists are riding on the sidewalk, and that the bike lanes are removed. 11 12 A. Each city's Public Works Department will further enforce this bill. B. In the case that the local government does not have enough funds, they 13 will be given the money necessary to create the pedestrian overpasses 14 but they will be in debt. 15 C. Any local government that fails to comply with this bill will be fined 16 17 D. The money from this fine will go towards the construction of pedestrian 18 overpasses. 19 E. The construction of pedestrian overpasses, depending on the height and length, will cost from \$600-\$1200, which is approximately less than 1% 20 of the government's funding. 21 SECTION 4. The provisions of this bill shall take effect immediately upon 22 passage to avoid further cyclist and pedestrian deaths. SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Require Citizens Over the Age of 80 to Retake Driving Tests Every 2 Years

WHEREAS, Road safety is a critical public concern in the United States; and 1 WHEREAS, Studies show that cognitive and physical abilities necessary for safe driving often decline 2 3 with age; and WHEREAS, Citizens over the age of 80 are statistically more likely to experience accidents due to 4 5 slower reaction times, impaired vision, or hearing; now, therefore, be it **RESOLVED**, By the Congress here assembled that all U.S. states shall require drivers aged 80 and 6 above to retest for their driver's licenses every two years to maintain their legal driving 7

A Bill to Reform Pretrial Justice and the Bail System

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The cash bail system shall be abolished at the federal level, and pretrial release decisions
3		shall be directed to prioritize flight risk assessments, risk of harm, and the presumption of
4		release.
5	SECTION 2.	A. Flight risk assessments shall include the use of evaluations via the Public Safety
6		Assessment (PSA), the Federal Pretrial Risk Assessment Instrument (PTRA), and
7		COMPAS for the reduction of bias in human judgement calls.
8		B. Risk of harm shall be determined through an evaluation by a local officer familiar with
9		the case within twelve hours of prisoner intake, and shall include risk to any victims' life
10		and health, risk of property damage, and review of weapons owned by the imprisoned
11		individual.
12	SECTION 3.	The Department of Corrections shall provide guidance to local jails and courts to enforce

	A Resolution to Increase Mental Health Resources In Schools
1	WHEREAS, Currently, over 7.7 million children and teens ages 3-17 across the United
2	States suffer from 1 or more treatable mental illnesses; and
3	WHEREAS, Only 20% or less of those children receive adequate professional help for
4	their illness, and over 50% of US public schools report not being able to
5	provide mental health resources to students due to lack of funding and
6	untrained personnel; and
7	WHEREAS, As a result of inadequate youth mental health services in schools and the
8	growing mental health crisis, nearly 20% of high school-aged kids have
9	seriously considered committing suicide, and more than 10% have attempted
10	to commit suicide; and
11	WHEREAS, On average, schools in the US have a student-to-mental health
12	professional ratio of roughly 408 students per counselor and 1,127 students
13	per psychologist, significantly exceeding the recommended ratios; and
14	WHEREAS, The American School Counselor Association (ASCA) recommends a 250:1
15	student-to-counselor ratio; and
16	WHEREAS, This can largely be attributed to the lack of funding that schools receive to
17	put toward mental health services; and
18	RESOLVED, That the Congress here assembled implements a 5-phase plan to increase
19	mental health service budgets in US schools from the current roughly \$1
20	billion to \$5 billion over 5 years; and, be it
21	FURTHER RESOLVED, That each phase will gradually increase existing funding sources
22	expand state-level grants, increase medical reimbursements for schools, increase federal
23	education budgets, start mental health programs in select schools to ensure effectiveness
24	before spreading wide-scale, fund training programs for mental health personnel, partner
25	with large medical providers, develop crisis teams, and require schools to allocate a certain
26	percentage of education funding toward mental health services.

A Bill to Reinstate Voting Rights for Formerly Incarcerated People

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	This bill will restore the rights of the people who were formerly incarcerated. Their rights
3		will be restored to what they were before their incarceration.
4	SECTION 2.	A. As used herein the word incarceration will be defined as people who were previously
5		in prison, jail, probation, work release, and home confinement.
6		B. There are some exceptions to the voting rights restoration as rights will not be restored
7		to people who have been convicted of voter fraud, interfered with a election, treason,
8		attempted overthrow of the government, and assassination or attempted assassination on a
9		elected official.
10	SECTION 3.	A. The Department of Justice Civil Rights Division and the Federal Election Commission
11		specified shall be responsible for enforcing the provisions of this bill.

A Bill to Regulate the Public Use of AI-Generated Videos

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The public use of AI-generated videos shall be restricted, allowing access only to
3		approved businesses that will be held legally liable for any defamatory content or
4		misinformation they produce.
5	SECTION 2.	A. "AI-generated videos" are defined as any video content created, manipulated, or
6		altered using artificial intelligence technology.
7		B. Approved businesses shall include all the companies legally registered in the United
8		States.
9		C. Defamation is defined as any false statement presented as fact that harms an
10		individual's reputation.
11	SECTION 3.	A. The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) and the Securities and Exchange Commission
12		(SEC) shall be responsible for enforcing the provisions of this bill.
13		B. Violations of this bill, including the spread of false information or character
14		defamation, shall result in a minimum fine of \$20,000, business restrictions, and potential
15		legal action.
16	SECTION 4.	The provisions of this bill shall take effect immediately upon passage.

A Bill to Reduce Military Aid to Israel to Promote Regional Stability

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1.** The United States shall reduce its annual military aid to Israel by 40% over the next five
- years.
- 4 **SECTION 2.** A. Military aid shall be defined as direct financial assistance for military operations,
- 5 supply of weapons, supply of defense systems, or security-related support.
- B. This bill shall not affect humanitarian aid or economic assistance for non-military
- 7 purposes and/or diplomatic cooperation.
- 8 C. The funds originally dedicated for military aid subject to this legislation shall be
- 9 reallocated toward diplomatic initiatives, humanitarian aid, and economic development in
- the region with the purpose of de-escalating current conflict and preventing future
- 11 conflicts.
- SECTION 3. A. The U.S. Department of State and the Department of Defense shall be responsible for
- enforcing this legislation.
- 14 **SECTION 4.** The provisions of this bill shall take effect immediately upon passage.
- 15 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Ban Compulsory PTO Usage

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
- 2 SECTION 1. No employer may require an employee to use their paid time off when the option to work
- does not exist for that employee, such as on a holiday observed by the employer. If an
- employee is not permitted to work during what would otherwise be normal working hours,
- 5 their employer must pay them without penalty.
- 6 SECTION 2. Any employer that violates this legislation shall be fined an amount equal to ten times the
- total gross wages any affected employees ought to have earned during the timespan in
- 8 which the violation occurred. Half of this fine shall be delivered as compensation to the
- 9 affected employee(s), and the other half shall be retained by the Department of Labor to
- fund enforcement.
- 11 SECTION 3. This legislation shall be overseen by the Department of Labor.
- 12 SECTION 4. This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2026.
- 13 SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Abolish DOGE

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
- 2 SECTION 1. The Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE) is hereby abolished.
- 3 SECTION 2. Given the abundant unconstitutional overlap of DOGE's responsibilities with those of the
- 4 legislative branch, the President shall not recreate this agency or establish another like it
- 5 without having attained explicit Congressional authority in advance.
- 6 SECTION 3. This legislation shall take effect immediately upon passage.

A Bill to Provide Common-Sense Childcare for Federal Employees

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2	SECTION 1. All federal employees working in offices where childcare is not provided free of charge are
3	hereby permitted and encouraged to bring their children to work with them whenever
4	needed, particularly when those children are not yet of school age and/or when school is
5	not in session.
6	SECTION 2. Any federal employee who attempts to penalize, retaliate against, or otherwise harass
7	another federal employee for taking advantage of this legislation shall be disciplined
8	accordingly.
9	SECTION 3. While at work with their parent or guardian, a child of a federal employee shall be included
10	free of charge in any meal, travel, or lodging arrangements that their parent/guardian
11	would be.
12	SECTION 4. This legislation shall be overseen by the United States Office of Personnel Managemen
13	(OPM).
14	SECTION 5. This legislation shall take effect on June 1, 2025.

SECTION 6. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Defend the Right of Ukraine to Join NATO

1	WHEREAS It ought to be the sole choice of each sovereign nation which treaties they want to sign and
2	to which intergovernmental organizations they wish to become party; and
3	WHEREAS Ukraine's ties with the nations of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) are more
4	than strong enough to justify its own admission into this alliance; and
5	WHEREAS Any one nation's efforts to sway the diplomatic foreign policy of another nation through
6	military force must be condemned; now, therefore be it
7	RESOLVED by the Congress here assembled that the right of Ukraine to join NATO is roundly and
8	eternally defended; and be it
9	FURTHER RESOLVED that Congress commits to considering the use of diplomatic, economic, and even
10	military means to counteract the efforts of any other nation to dissuade or prevent Ukrain
11	from joining NATO.

A Bill to Provide Congressional Vaccine Oversight

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
- 2 SECTION 1. Henceforth, before reducing any recommendations or requirements concerning vaccines,
- the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) must receive majority approval from
- 4 both chambers of Congress.
- 5 SECTION 2. Any increased or new recommendations or requirements with regards to vaccines shall
- 6 require no such approval.
- 7 SECTION 3. This legislation shall take effect immediately upon passage.
- 8 SECTION 4. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Adjust the Presidential Line of Succession

1	RESOLVED, That the following article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United
2	States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when
3	ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within seven years from
4	the date of its submission by the Congress:
5	ARTICLE —
6	SECTION 1. In case of the removal of the President from office or of their resignation, the highest
7	ranking elected federal officer who is not affiliated with the same political party as that
8	President shall become President. In the case that the outgoing President is not affiliated
9	with a political party, the highest ranking elected federal officer who is affiliated with any
10	party shall become President.
11	SECTION 2. If there is no elected federal officer of a different party affiliation anywhere in the Executive
12	or Legislative branch, or in the case of the death of the President, the Vice President shall
13	become President.
14	SECTION 3. The remainder of the Presidential Line of Succession as laid out in the 25th Amendment
15	shall be unchanged.
16	SECTION 4. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Increase Executive Efficiency

1	RESOLVED, That the following article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United
2	States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when
3	ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within seven years from
4	the date of its submission by the Congress:
5	ARTICLE —
6	SECTION 1. Presidential appointments to head Executive cabinet departments shall require neither
7	advice nor consent from the Senate.
8	SECTION 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Check the Executive Order

1	RESOLVED, That the following article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United
2	States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when
3	ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within seven years from
4	the date of its submission by the Congress:
5	ARTICLE —
6	SECTION 1. Any President who has an Executive Order overturned by the Federal Judiciary at any point
7	while holding office shall henceforth have to submit all Executive Orders to the Supreme
8	Court for advance approval. Until and unless such approval is granted, any Executive Order
9	from such a President shall remain null and void.
10	SECTION 2. This article shall retroactively take into account any previously overturned Executive Orders
11	issued by whichever President is serving at the time of ratification.
12	SECTION 3. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

A Bill to Make Our Skies Safer

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
- 2 SECTION 1. The Department of Defense shall conduct no airborne training exercises anywhere within
- 3 25 miles of an airport engaged in commercial passenger air travel.
- 4 SECTION 2. For the purposes of this legislation, "an airport engaged in commercial passenger air travel"
- shall be defined as an airport at which a commercial passenger airplane is expected to land or depart at any time within the next two hours. Therefore, military airborne training
- exercises may be conducted around such airports whenever there is an extended span of time during which commercial passenger air travel is not occurring.
- 9 SECTION 3. Congress directs the Department of Defense to court-martial any service members who 10 violate the terms of this legislation, and further to determine for themselves a range of
- consequences that are appropriate for such violations.
- SECTION 4. This legislation shall be jointly overseen by the Department of Defense and the Federal
- Aviation Administration (FAA).
- 14 SECTION 5. This legislation shall take effect immediately upon passage.
- 15 SECTION 6. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
