# **PRE**

#### A BILL TO INCREASE U.S. INVOLVEMENT IN GREENLAND

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

Article I: For economic and national security purposes, the United States will explore options to increase involvement on the island of Greenland.

Article II: Allocated from the National Defense Budget, up to \$5 Billion will be allotted for the purpose of purchasing the island. If Greenland is sold for less than \$5 Billion, the remaining allotted funds will be added back into the yearly National Defense Budget.

Article III: If a sale is not permitted, or the desired sale price exceeds the allotted \$5 Billion, the United States will not purchase the island. Instead, the U.S. will move to add Greenland to the list of Compact of Free Association States (COFA). To incentivize this deal to be made, funds from the allocated \$5 Billion may be used. If a deal is not made, Greenland will not be added to the list of COFA states.

Article IV: This bill will become effective on May 1, 2025.

Article V: All laws in conflict with this legislation shall hereby be declared null and void.

# The Federal Emergency Management Alignment Act (F.E.M.A. Act)

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) is hereby divided and
3		reorganized under each statewide National Guard.
4	SECTION 2.	A. Each state's National Guard shall have the oversight to respond and
5		provide resources to disaster relief efforts.
6		B. The extent of these efforts shall be at the discretion of each governor for
7		their respected state.
8		C. All current funding from FEMA shall be transferred to the National Guard
9		Bureau and specifically allocated for disaster relief.
10	SECTION 3.	The National Guard Bureau shall be responsible for the implementation and
11		oversight of this bill.
12	SECTION 4.	This transition will begin upon passage and shall be complete by January 1,
13		2030. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and
14		void.

## A Resolution to Provide Financial Aid to Argentina to Promote Stability in South America

1	WHEREAS,	Argentina's current economy is in a critical state; and
2	WHEREAS,	They are about \$400 billion in debt, with predictions strongly indicating
3		that their debt will only continue to grow in the following years; and
4	WHEREAS,	The Argentine Peso has been subject to extreme devaluation, causing
5		hyperinflation, the detriments of which has caused a crisis within the
6		civilian population despite their government's ongoing efforts to fix the
7		economy; and
8	WHEREAS,	Hence they would benefit greatly from external assistance, including such
9		from their allies; now, therefore, be it
10	RESOLVED,	That the Congress here assembled authorizes the allocation of a sum of
11		\$10 billion to the Argentinian Ministry of Economy to repay their debt; and,
12		be it
13	FURTHER RES	<b>SOLVED,</b> That the use of this aid is overseen by the United States Department
14		of State (DoS) and the United States-Argentina Council on Trade and
15		Investment.

#### A Bill to Ban All Social Media for Children Under the Age of 16

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- **SECTION 1.** Children under the age of 16 are prohibited from creating, using, or accessing social media platforms within the United States, except for the following limited circumstances:
- A. Educational purposes explicitly verified by a school or educational institution.
- B. Verified health-related needs as determined by a licensed healthcare provider.
- **SECTION 2.** The purpose of this Act is to protect children's mental and emotional well-being by addressing the following concerns:
- A. Social media platforms expose children to harmful content, including cyberbullying, inappropriate material, and online predators.
- B. Excessive screen time associated with social media use negatively affects cognitive, emotional, and social development.
- C. Children under 16 are particularly vulnerable to these risks due to their developing cognitive and emotional maturity.

#### **SECTION 3.** To ensure compliance and enforcement:

- A. The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) shall oversee the implementation and enforcement of this legislation.
- B. Social media platforms shall implement robust age-verification systems to prevent users under the age of 16 from creating accounts or accessing their services.
- C. Platforms found in violation of this Act will face penalties, including: 1. Fines of up to \$10,000 per violation. 2. Additional penalties as determined by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC).
- **SECTION 4.** This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2026. All laws or parts of laws in conflict with this Act are hereby declared null and void.

## A Bill to Create a Minimum Wage for Working Inmates

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	All private prisons shall pay their working inmates a minimum wage of
2		\$7.25 per hour.
3	SECTION 2.	a. "Working inmates" are defined as prisoners in private prisons who do
4		labor for their prisons (i.e. cooking, cleaning, etc.)
5		b. "Minimum wage" is defined as the minimum amount of money a
6		working inmate must make per hour.
7		c. "Private prisons" are defined as prisons and correctional facilities not
8		owned and/or operated by the federal, state, or local government.
9	SECTION 3.	a. Any and all private prisons who do not adhere to this minimum wage by
10		the time this legislation takes effect will be paid half as much as they
11		previously were by the government in all future payments until they
12		adhere to the \$7.25 minimum wage.
13		b. This legislation will be overseen jointly by the Federal Bureau of Prisons
14		(FBOP) and the Department of Labor (DOL).
15	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1st, 2026. All laws in conflict with
16		this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
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# A Bill to Fund the Research and Development of Cultivated Meat

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	The United States will hereby provide funding and subsidies
2	towards resea	rch into cultivated meat and the growth of the cultivated
3	meat industry	. These subsidies will be provided to research groups and

## A Bill to Construct Semiconductor Manufacturing Facilities to Increase US Self-Sufficiency

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	This Congress will allocate funds to support the completion and
2		enhancement of semiconductor manufacturing facilities and rare earth
3		mineral extraction sites currently under construction in Utah, Arizona, and
4		Nevada.
5	SECTION 2.	Semiconductor manufacturing facilities are defined as any factory that
6		produces semiconductors or microchips via the transformation of raw
7		materials into integrated circuits (IC).
8	SECTION 3.	\$40B will be allocated from the annual budget of The Department of
9		Defense for the implementation of this project. The Department of
10		Commerce (DOC) shall oversee fund allocation, ensuring transparency,
11		efficiency, and adherence to federal environmental and labor regulations.
12		Funds shall be distributed as follows:
13		A. \$25 billion for enhancing and optimizing semiconductor manufacturin
14		facilities under construction.
15		B. \$10 billion for supporting rare earth mining and processing operations
16		in progress.
17		C. \$5 billion for workforce development programs, technology upgrades,
18		and environmental compliance measures.
19		D. The DOC is mandated to submit annual progress reports to Congress.
20		E. All facilities receiving funding under this Act must be fully operational
21		no later than December 31, 2031.
22	SECTION 5.	The President may invoke the Defense Production Act to expedite or
23		prioritize semiconductor production and mineral extraction in cases of
24		national emergency.
25	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on February 1st, 2025. All laws in conflict
26		with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
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### A Bill for Strategic Metrics for Advanced Rigorous Teaching (SMART Act)

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

#### SECTION 1.

Nationwide standards for core subject education shall be established and mandated across all public schools in the United States and its territories.

#### SECTION 2.

- A. "Core Subjects" include mathematics, science, language arts, and social studies, as defined by the U.S. Department of Education.
- B. The standards shall establish uniform benchmarks for educational proficiency, referencing evidence-based frameworks such as the Common Core State Standards (2010) and the Next Generation Science Standards (2013).

#### SECTION 3.

- A. The Office of National Educational Standards (ONES) shall be created within the Department of Education to develop, disseminate, and enforce these standards.
  - 1. ONES will include curriculum experts, state education representatives, and stakeholders from each core subject area.
  - 2. The office will consult state boards, researchers, and subject-matter organizations to ensure equitable and rigorous standards adaptable to evolving needs.

#### B. ONES shall:

- 1. Periodically update standards to maintain relevance and competitiveness.
- 2. Provide technical assistance and resources to state education boards for implementation.
- 3. Monitor compliance through biennial audits and federal reporting systems.
- C. Of the \$5 billion in federal funding allocated annually:
  - 1. \$500 million shall support ONES operations, including standard development, compliance monitoring, and technical assistance.
  - 2. \$4.5 billion shall be distributed to states and schools to aid compliance, with priority given to underfunded districts.
- D. Schools failing to meet the standards will face a 10% reduction in federal funding after one year of noncompliance, increasing by 5% annually until compliance is achieved.

### A Bill to Preserve Net Neutrality

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- **SECTION 1.** The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) shall reclassify Internet service providers as common carriers under the Communications Act of 1934 to preserve net neutrality.
- by Internet service providers without discrimination or favoritism based on the type of content or method of communication. "Internet service providers" shall be defined as any organization providing users with Internet access. "Common carriers" shall be defined as companies that transport goods for a fee and whose services are open to the general public.
- **SECTION 3.** The Federal Communications Commission shall oversee the implementation of this bill.
- **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect January 1, 2025. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

21		A.	Haitian-based employees must account for at least 75% of a
22			corporation's workforce in these locations for the corporation to be
23			eligible for this grant.

## A Bill to Implement a Universal Basic Income

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	A cash payment of \$1,000 shall be made to every American citizen of at
2		least 18 years of age every six months.
3	SECTION 2.	A. The funds for the universal basic income program will come from a
4		value-added tax of 5%.
5		B. The value-added tax will not apply to small businesses with annual
6		revenue under \$7.5 million.
7	SECTION 3.	Every five years, the amount of money allocated will be revised to remain
8		proportional to economic inflation.
9	SECTION 4.	A. The United States Department of Health and Human Services will
10		oversee the implementation of the UBI.
11		B. The Internal Revenue Service will oversee the implementation of the

## A Bill to Reduce Corporate Emissions

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	Corporations who fail to significantly decrease their carbon emissions by	
3		2035 must purchase carbon credits to offset their excess emissions.	
4	SECTION 2.	"Carbon Credits" are tradable permits representing the right to emit one	
5		metric ton of carbon dioxide or its equivalent. These credits are typically	
6		purchased to offset carbon emissions by funding projects that aim to	
7		reduce carbon emissions elsewhere. A significant decrease in emissions	
8		shall be defined as a 25% overall reduction in a company's carbon	
9		emissions from 2025 to 2035.	
10	SECTION 3.	The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) shall work in conjunction	
11		with the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) to oversee the implementation of	
12		this bill.	
13		A. Corporations shall be required to submit annual reports to the	
L4		EPA detailing their carbon emissions and efforts to reduce their	
L5		emissions.	
L6		B. Corporations will be forced to purchase carbon credits valued at	
L7		\$20 per metric ton of excess carbon emissions if they fail to	
L8		significantly decrease their emissions by 2035.
