A Bill to Establish an AI Energy Tax

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:		
2	SECTION 1.	Any energy costs incurred by a technological enterprise in order to provide artificial	
3		intelligence (AI) services shall be taxed at a rate of 25% each month.	
4	SECTION 2.	Such technological enterprises shall be wholly responsible for faithfully reporting to their	
5		energy providers how much of their energy costs result from AI services each month.	
6		Failure to report accurately shall result in a fine equal to ten times the amount of the	
7		underreported energy costs.	
8	SECTION 3.	Funds raised through these taxes shall be used to support and, if possible, expand the	
9		Department of Energy's renewable energy subsidies.	
10	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall be overseen by the Department of Energy, and this agency shall be	
11		responsible for monitoring compliance.	
12	SECTION 5.	This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2026.	
13	SECTION 6.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to End United States Support for the Saudi-Led Military Intervention in Yemen

1	WHEREAS,	The civil war and humanitarian crisis in Yemen has led to over 377,000 deaths and
2		widespread human suffering; and
3	WHEREAS,	Saudi Arabia initiated an intervention in Yemen in 2015 that has resulted in indiscriminate
4		attacks causing thousands of civilian casualties; and
5	WHEREAS,	This Saudi-led coalition could not wage war without the United States providing
6		intelligence sharing, training, arms sales, aerial refueling and other military assistance; and
7	WHEREAS,	Human rights groups have documented Saudi war crimes including bombing hospitals,
8		schools, markets, and civilian infrastructure; now, therefore, be it
9	RESOLVED,	That the United States Congress calls for immediately ending all military assistance and
10		arms sales to Saudi Arabia used to perpetuate civil war and humanitarian disaster in
11		Yemen; and, be it
12	FURTHER RE	ESOLVED, That any future military support or arms sales be conditioned on Saudi Arabia
13		upholding ceasefire agreements, facilitating humanitarian relief, and demonstrating
14		concrete human rights reforms.

A Bill to Protect Children from Social Media

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2	SECTION 1.	No social media platform shall permit citizens of the United States under the age of 16 to $$
3		sign up for or maintain an account on their service. It shall be the responsibility of social
4		media platforms to monitor and ensure the ages of their users in order to comply with this
5		legislation.
6	SECTION 2.	The 42 USC § 1862w(a)(2) definition of a social media platform shall be utilized: "a website
7		or internet medium that— (A) permits a person to become a registered user, establish an $$
8		account, or create a profile for the purpose of allowing users to create, share, and view
9		user-generated content through such an account or profile; (B) enables 1 or more users to
LO		generate content that can be viewed by other users of the medium; and (C) primarily
11		serves as a medium for users to interact with content generated by other users of the
12		medium."
L3	SECTION 3.	Any domestic social media platform that violates this legislation shall be fined \$5000 for
L4		each underaged user found to be registered and/or maintaining an account on their
15		service. Any domestic platform with more than 10 violations in a 365-day period shall be
16		banned from conducting business for a period of at least 5 years. Any foreign social media
17		platform that violates this legislation shall be immediately and permanently blocked from $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right) \left(1\right$
18		all United States' web servers and devices.
19	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall be overseen by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC).
20	SECTION 5.	This legislation shall take effect on January 19, 2026.
21	SECTION 6.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
