A Bill to Prioritize Trade over Tariffs

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	The Generalized System of Preferences Reform Act is hereby enacted in

3	SECTION 2.	The President may terminate, suspend, or limit a country's status at any
4		time, provided that Congress is notified 60 days prior to the action. The
5		President may determine the eligibility of a country, including its
6		graduation from the Generalized System of Preferences, using official

A Bill to Secure U.S.-R.O.K.-Taiwan Cyber Links to Strengthen Security Across Sea

A Resolution to Restrict the Sale of Weapons to China for the Safety of Taiwan

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

WHEREAS, The United States shall implement a restriction on the sale of weapons and military technology to China, not only inside of the States but also among its international allies. Citing national security concerns and the need to maintain stability in the Indo-Pacific region. This policy aims to prevent China from gaining military advantages that could threaten Taiwan and other neighboring regions through the decrease of trade of weapons from other United States allied countries.

WHEREAS, "Weapons" is defined as any arms, military equipment, technology, and support systems intended for defense or offense.

"Military technology" refers to technical expertise, software, and hardware that could enhance China's military capabilities.

WHEREAS, The United States shall employ its large diplomatic influence to encourage and influence allied and partner nations to adopt similar restrictions on weapons and military technology sales to China. Specific diplomatic efforts include:

- A. Leveraging current alliances to promote a unified stance against China.
- B. Offering economic incentives to allied nations that adopt comparable restrictions, including favorable trade terms and increased military cooperation.
- C. Imposing economic penalties, such as trade sanctions or reduced military aid, on nations that continue to sell arms to China. (An increased 20% sales tax on weapons sold to these nations)

WHEREAS, The U.S. The Department of State and the Department of Defense shall oversee the enforcement of this resolution, with the help of any other international organizations led by allied countries that this congress sees fit. These enforcement details include:

- A. Monitoring and reporting arms sales to China by both the United States and allied countries to ensure compliance.
- B. Establishing international partnerships to share intelligence and coordinate diplomatic efforts aimed at restricting arms sales to China.

A Bill to Implement a Carbon Tax

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1. A carbon tax of \$10 per metric ton of CO2 emitted by for-profit companies
2	will be imposed. The tax will initially apply to companies that emit more
3	than 30 metric tons of CO2 per year, but will be applied to all for-profit
4	companies after 2035. The tax revenue will go to the Office of Energy
5	Efficiency and Renewable Energy (EERE) of the United States Department
6	of Energy to aid the transition from fossil fuels to environmentally
7	sustainable energy.
8	SECTION 2. "Carbon emissions" is defined as carbon gas emissions that are influenced
9	by the direct decisions of for-profit corporations (which do business in the
10	U.S., onshore or offshore) for each calendar year.
11	SECTION 3. The Internal Revenue Service shall implement a tax of \$10 per metric ton of
12	carbon emitted per calendar year (above the threshold of 30 tons of CO2)
13	for U.S. based for-profit organizations
14	A. After 2035, there shall not be a threshold of 30 tons of CO2, and every
15	metric ton of CO2 which for-profit companies emit will be taxed
16	B. After 2035, the tax per metric ton of CO2 emitted by each company per
17	calendar year shall be raised to \$30
18	The taxes will go toward the The Office of Energy Efficiency and
19	Renewable Energy (EERE) of the United States Department of Energy
20	A. the EERE will use these taxes to aid the transition away from fossil
21	fuels to renewable, environmentally sustainable energy
22	SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect on FY 2025. All laws in conflict with this
23	legislation are hereby declared null and void.
