- Is the legislation thought out and logical? Is it clear and well-written? Does it meet the form requirements?
- · Does the bill offer meaningful opportunities for competitors to speak in both support and opposition to the bill?

Using the above criteria, apply your findings against the scoring scale:

- 0: Participant has no legislation submitted.
- 1-5: The bill is offensive and unacceptable—hate legislation or otherwise demonstrating contempt for the event and the participants. This score will also be given if the legislation clearly does not meet Rule 7.9.
- 6-10: While non-offensive, the legislation is otherwise nonsensical or absurd, showing little to no effort from the competitor.
- 11-15: Basic legislation without much detail or substance. Leaves many loopholes or unanswered questions.
- 16-20: Solid legislation. May have some flaws but demonstrates real effort to solve a problem or create a sound law.
- 21-25: This is an amazing bill. Purpose is clear, solution is specific, form is perfect. Cannot be significantly improved in any way the judge can see.
