A Resolution to supply Nuclear Weaponry to Eastern European NATO allies

| 1 | BE IT ENACTE | D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: |
|----|----------------|--|
| 2 | SECTION 1. | The United States shall supply Nuclear Weaponry to Eastern European |
| 3 | | NATO (North Atlantic Treaty Organization) allies as part of NATO's |
| 4 | | nuclear deterrence strategy. |
| 5 | SECTION 2. | Poland, Hungary, and Romania will join Germany, Italy, the Netherlands, |
| 6 | | Belgium, and Turkey as part of NATO's nuclear sharing agreement. This |
| 7 | | agreement allows certain NATO members to have a role in nuclear |
| 8 | | defense, with the U.S. retaining sole control over the use of the weapons |
| 9 | | of mass destruction. |
| 10 | SECTION 3. | The Department of Defence (Department of War) shall oversee the |
| 1 | | enforcement of this legislation |
| .2 | | A. Poland will receive 50 B-61 gravity bombs, which will be stationed at |
| 13 | | Redzikowo Missile Defense Base. B-61 gravity bombs are smaller non- |
| L4 | | strategic nuclear weapons. |
| .5 | | B. Hungary and Romania will each receive 20 B-61 gravity bombs, which |
| .6 | | will be stationed at Kecskemét Air Base in Hungary and Deveselu |
| .7 | | Military Base in Romania. |
| 8 | | C. If consent for the nuclear weapons is denied by a country, the offer to |
| .9 | | the country denying consent will be null and void. |

A Bill to Ban Generative AI for Individuals Under the Age of 18

| 1 | _ | TED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: |
|----|------------|--|
| 2 | SECTION 1. | Individuals under 18 within the United States are prohibited from creating, |
| 3 | | using, or accessing generative artificial intelligence (AI) platforms except for |
| 4 | | the following limited circumstances: |
| 5 | | 1. Educational purposes explicitly verified by a school or an accredited |
| 6 | | educational institution; and |
| 7 | | 2. Verified health-related needs as determined by a licensed healthcare |
| 8 | | provider. |
| 9 | | Generative AI platforms shall implement robust age-verification systems to |
| 10 | | prevent users under the age of 18 from creating accounts or accessing their |
| 11 | | services. |
| 12 | SECTION 2. | Generative AI includes, but is not limited to: |
| 13 | | A. Large Language Models (LLMs) such as chatbots capable of producing |
| 14 | | human-like conversation or written material; |
| 15 | | B. Image, video, and audio generation platforms that create synthetic or |
| 16 | | manipulated media; |
| 17 | | C. Code-generation or data-generation tools that autonomously produce |
| 18 | | original outputs. |
| 19 | | This definition does not apply to narrow AI systems used solely for |
| 20 | | functions such as search engines, calculators, or recommendation |
| 21 | | algorithms. |
| 22 | SECTION 3. | The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) shall oversee the implementation of |
| 23 | | this legislation, and the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) shall |
| 24 | | assist in enforcement. Platforms found in violation of this act will face |
| 25 | | penalties, including fines of up to \$10,000 per violation, and additional |
| 26 | | penalties as determined by the FTC. |
| 27 | SECTION 4. | This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2026. All laws in conflict with |

Empowering Clean Outcomes (ECO) Act

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

| SECTION 1. | A federal carbon tax of \$50 per metric ton of carbon dioxide equivalent |
|------------|---|
| | shall be levied on U.S. corporations at the point of production or import. In |
| | addition, a border carbon adjustment tariff shall be imposed on imported |
| | goods, taxing them at a rate equivalent to the domestic carbon tax based |
| | on their carbon intensity. |
| SECTION 2. | Carbon dioxide equivalent (CO₂e) shall be defined as the standard measure |
| | of greenhouse gas emissions as recognized by the Environmental |
| | Protection Agency (EPA). |
| | Border carbon adjustment shall be defined as a tariff on imports that |
| | accounts for the greenhouse gas emissions associated with their |
| | production. |
| SECTION 3. | The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) shall oversee the |
| | administration of the carbon tax. |
| | US Customs and Border Protection (CBP), in coordination with the US |
| | Department of Commerce, shall enforce the border carbon adjustment |
| | tariff. |
| | Revenues from the carbon tax shall be allocated as follows: |
| | A. 50% towards clean energy investment and research, |
| | B. 25% toward direct rebates to low- and middle-income households, |
| | C. toward federal deficit reduction. |

A Bill to Remove Sanctions on North Korea

| 5 | SECTION 3. | The Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) will enforce the removal of |
| 6 | | sanctions. |
| 7 | | A. Failure to lift the sanctions will result in a \$1 million deduction of the |
| 8 | | Office of Foreign Assets Control budget. |
| 9 | SECTION 4. | This legislation will take effect on August 1, 2026. All laws in conflict with |
| 10 | | this legislation are hereby declared null and void. |

A Bill to Jumpstart Domestic Rubber Production

| 1 | BE IT ENACT | ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED: |

| 2 | SECTION 1. | Congress shall establish a fund of \$2 billion per year for each of the next five years to |
| 3 | | increase domestic rubber production toward a goal of rubber independence. |
| 4 | SECTION 2. | These funds shall be used to increase farming of guayule (Parthenium argentatum), Russian |
| 5 | | dandelion (Taraxacum kok-saghyz), and any other plants that may be used to produce |
| 6 | | rubber, as well as to build additional factories for the processing and refinement of rubber. |
| 7 | | These funds may also be used to expand and improve any infrastructure deemed necessary |
| 8 | | to this goal. |
| 9 | SECTION 3. | This legislation shall be overseen by the Department of Agriculture, which shall be |
| 10 | | responsible for disbursing and monitoring the use of these funds. |
| 11 | SECTION 4. | This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2026. |
| 12 | SECTION 5. | All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void. |



A Bill to Remove the Social Security Cap

| 1 | BE IT ENACT | ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED: |

| 2 | SECTION 1. | All payroll earnings shall henceforth be subject to the Social Security payroll tax, regardless |
| 3 | | of how much those earnings total each year. |
| 4 | SECTION 2. | This legislation shall be jointly overseen by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) and the Social |
| 5 | | Security Administration (SSA), with the latter organization specifically tasked with |
| 6 | | determining appropriate rates for those income levels that were not covered before this |
| 7 | | point. |
| 8 | SECTION 3. | This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2026. |
| 9 | SECTION 4. | All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void. |



A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Establish the Right to Unionize

| 1 | RESOLVED, | That the following article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United |

| 2 | | States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when |
| 3 | | ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within seven years from |
| 4 | | the date of its submission by the Congress: |
| 5 | | ARTICLE — |
| 6 | SECTION 1. | An empowered and respected labor force being necessary to the prosperity and integrity of |
| 7 | | a free state, the right of the people to unionize shall not be infringed. |
| 8 | SECTION 2. | The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation. |



A Bill to Provide for Automatic Facial Copyrighting

| 1 | BE IT ENACT | ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED: |
|----|-------------|---|
| 2 | SECTION 1. | All citizens and residents of the United States and its territories henceforth shall |
| 3 | | automatically possess full and unconditional copyright on their own faces and any images |
| 4 | | or likenesses thereof, excluding normal exceptions such as Fair Use. |
| 5 | SECTION 2. | Any person, corporation, or other entity wishing to use a citizen or resident's face in a |
| 6 | | manner protected by copyright law must obtain explicit written permission and provide |
| 7 | | just compensation or face civil and, under extreme circumstances, criminal penalties. This |
| 8 | | shall include any future usage of faces by artificial intelligence services. |
| 9 | SECTION 3. | When a citizen or resident passes away, the copyright to their face shall pass to their heirs |
| 10 | | of beneficiaries as part of their estate. If none are named, relevant laws of interstate |
| 11 | | succession shall come to bear. The copyright shall remain enforceable by its rightful |
| 12 | | owner(s) for 70 years following the death of its original owner, after which point the face in |
| 13 | | $question \ shall \ enter \ the \ public \ domain. \ This \ provision \ shall \ not \ apply \ retroactively \ to \ those$ |
| 14 | | who are already deceased at the time this legislation takes effect. |
| 15 | SECTION 4. | The Copyright Office of the Library of Congress shall oversee implementation of this |
| 16 | | legislation. |
| 17 | SECTION 5. | This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2026. |
| 18 | SECTION 6. | All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void. |



A Bill to End Federal Subsidization of Healthcare for Congresspeople

| 1 | BE IT ENACT | ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED: |
|----|-------------|--|
| 2 | SECTION 1. | Elected members of federal Congress (Representatives and Senators) shall no longer |
| 3 | | $receive \ any \ employer \ contributions \ from \ the \ federal \ government \ toward \ their \ healthcare$ |
| 4 | | costs, including dental and vision insurance. Should a Representative or Senator choose to |
| 5 | | purchase health, dental, or vision coverage, they shall be responsible for covering these |
| 6 | | costs on their own. |
| 7 | SECTION 2. | Should universal healthcare someday be provided to citizens of the United States and its |
| 8 | | territories, Representatives and Senators shall of course reap these benefits along with |
| 9 | | their constituents, unless specifically excluded from them. |
| 10 | SECTION 3. | The money saved through this legislation shall be redirected to the Centers for Medicare & |
| 11 | | Medicaid Services (CMS) to support insurance for those in need. |
| 12 | SECTION 4. | This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2026. |
| 13 | SECTION 5. | All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void. |
