

Scottsdale Prep Congress 2025 Docket

In the interest of getting a docket to teams to start researching early, we closed legislation submissions and instead borrowed past legislation from the NSDA. Each bill is open for sponsorship (first affirmative), as there are no authorships. In an attempt to be more welcoming to teams trying Congressional Debate for the first time, we have made this year's docket smaller and assigned specific legislation to specific sessions of debate (note: most tournaments do not do this). We hope that this will make it easier for all to do deeper research and minimize wasted research. We also hope that this makes it easier for small teams to know what to expect, rather than get left out of conversations in the weeks leading up to the tournament. Each chamber can decide the order of the three bills set for a session, and will likely end up debating 2-3 of the items in each session. Assigning legislation to sessions also limits the ability for judges to see any debate of a topic in one chamber before judging it again in another.

Morning Prelim Session Bills: Congressional Debaters will caucus and vote for a docket order to debate during the Morning Session. No legislation will be carried over from the morning to the afternoon session.

A - A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Delink Felony Convictions from Enfranchisement

1	RESOLVED,	By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the following article is
2		proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which
3		shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when
4		ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within
5		seven years from the date of its submission by the Congress:
6		Article —
7 8	SECTION 1:	No citizen shall have their right to vote infringed at any point for any amount
9		of time on account of having been accused or convicted of a felony.
10	SECTION 2:	All citizens who are, at the time of ratification, disenfranchised for such
11		reasons shall immediately have their right to vote restored.
12	SECTION 3:	The Congress shall have the power to enforce this article by appropriate
13		legislation.
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B - A Bill to Support Climate-Vulnerable Island Nations

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	The United States Federal Government shall create an Island Nation Fund of
2		\$100 billion for climate-vulnerable, independent coastal nations to take
3		measures to repair damage and protect states from climate change
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6		disasters.
7	SECTION 2.	The Alliance of Small Island States (AOSIS) and its 39 member states will
8		submit funding and action proposals to the U.S. State Department.
9	SECTION 3.	The U.S. State Department will oversee the implementation of this
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11 12		legislation and distribution of funds.
13	SECTION 4.	This bill shall go into effect upon passage. All laws in conflict with this
14		legislation are hereby declared null and void.
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C - A Resolution to Encourage the Criminalization of Vehicular Pet Abandonment

L	WHEREAS, it is estimated that hundreds of pets die from being abandoned in cars every
2	year; and

1	WHEREAS, these deaths can occur not just due to heat but also due to cold, thirst, and
5	other factors; and
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7	WHEREAS, in many parts of the United States and its territories, there are no laws
3	protecting pets from such mistreatment, and those laws that exist elsewhere
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10	are often too vague to be meaningfully enforceable; and
11	WHEREAS, pet ownership is a privilege, not a right, and one that requires significant
12	maturity and responsibility; now, therefore, be it
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L4	RESOLVED, by the Congress here assembled that all jurisdictions throughout these United
15	States are encouraged to enact tough laws that protect pets by criminalizing
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L7	their abandonment in motor vehicles; and be it
18	FURTHER RESOLVED, that Congress also urges the passage of Good Samaritan laws that
19	protect others from entering a vehicle without the owner's permission to rescue
20	protect others from entering a vehicle without the owner's permission to rescut
21	an abandoned pet, even if doing so would result in damage to the vehicle.
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D - A Bill to Close Guantanamo Bay

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E - A Bill to Provide Automatic Facial Copyrighting

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:		
2	SECTION 1.	All citizens and residents of the United States and its territories hence forth	
3 4		shall automatically possess full and unconditional copyright on their own	
5		faces and any images or likenesses thereof, excluding normal exceptions	
6 7		such as Fair Use.	
8	SECTION 2.	Any person, corporation, or other entity wishing to use a citizen's or	
9		resident's face in a manner protected by copyright law must obtain written	
10 11		permission and provide just compensation or face civil, and under extreme	
12		circumstances, criminal penalties.	
13 14	SECTION 3.	When a citizen or resident passes away, the copyright to their face shall pass	
15		to their heirs or beneficiaries as part of their estate. If none are named,	
16		relevant laws of interstate succession shall come to bear. The copyright shall	
1718		remain enforceable by its rightful owner(s) for 70 years following the death	
19		of its original owner, after which point it shall enter the public domain.	
20	SECTION 4.	The Copyright Office of the Library of Congress shall oversee

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F - A Bill to Create High Speed Rail in the Northeast U.S.

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States shall construct and maintain a high-speed rail line in the
3 4		northeast United States in order to promote economic growth and reduce
5		the travel time between northeastern United States cities.
6	SECTION 2.	The northeast United States region shall be defined as from Boston to
7 8		Northern Virginia. The high speed rail line will at first include one train stop
9		in each of the following places: northern Virginia, Washington D.C.,
10 11		Baltimore, Wilmington, Philadelphia, New York, Providence, and Boston.
12	А	. Tracks will be built in such a way that future stops can be added in the
13 14		future if demand warrants.
15	В	. High-speed rail shall be defined as rail that averages above 200 miles per
16 17		hour and that has a wide curve radius to accomplish that speed.
18	SECTION 3.	The Department of Transportion shall oversee construction and use existing
19		rights of way and use eminent domain to acquire the land needed for the
20 21		project. \$20 Billion shall be appropriated by Congress for this project.
22	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall take effect in FY2026 for a completion date ending in

Finals 2 - A Bill to Repeal the Merchant Marine Act of 1920

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	The Merchant Marine Act of 1920, also known as the Jones Act, is hereby
3 4		repealed. There shall no longer be any restrictions on vessels that transport
5		goods between U.S. ports.
6 7	SECTION 2.	This legislation shall be overseen by the Department of Commerce.
8	SECTION 3.	This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2026.
9	SECTION 4.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
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Finals 3 - A Bill to Establish Mandatory Public Service

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	Each U.S. Citizen born after January 1, 2010, must complete at least two
3		years of public service by the time of their 30th birthday.

5	SECTION 2.	This requirement may be satisfied through two full years of service in one
6		of the following: the Armed Forces (including the National Guard), the
7		Peace Corps, AmeriCorps, or the National Health Service Corps.

9	SECTION 3.	The penalties for failing to meet this requirement shall be identical to those
10		that accompany failure to register for the Selective Service when required
