Bill 1: A Bill to Abolish Daylight Saving Time in the United States

_		
1	SECTION 1.	Daylight Saving Time (DST) shall be permanently abolished in the United
2		States. The nation shall observe Standard Time year-round, with no
3		seasonal adjustments to clocks. This legislation seeks to promote public
4		health, consistency, and economic stability by eliminating the biannual
5		time change.
6	SECTION 2.	Daylight Saving Time (DST) shall be defined as the practice of advancing
7		clocks by one hour during warmer months to extend evening daylight.
8		Standard Time shall refer to the legal time established for each time zone
9		without alteration. The term public and private institutions includes
10		businesses, schools, and governmental entities subject to federal or state
11		scheduling.
12	SECTION 3.	The Department of Transportation (DOT) shall oversee and coordinate the
13		transition to permanent Standard Time with all state and local
14		governments. The DOT shall issue regulations ensuring synchronization of
15		transportation, communication, and energy systems. The National Institute
16		of Standards and Technology (NIST) shall update all official U.S.
17		timekeeping systems accordingly. No state or territory shall independently
18		reintroduce or alter time shifts after the effective date of this legislation.
19	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall take effect January 1, 2026, with all timekeeping
20		systems adjusted to permanent Standard Time by March 1, 2026.
21	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Bill 3: A Bill to Increase Restrictions on Artificial Intelligence to Protect Children Online

1	SECTION 1.	The United States Federal Government will create licensing requirements
2		and new datasets for the use of image and voice of minors for training
3		input and output of commercial generative Artificial Intelligence. This
4		requires AI companies to restrict the ability for users to generate content
5		regarding pornographic materials, specifically regarding minors.
6	SECTION 2.	The definitions are as follows:
7		A. Minors: Those people under the age of 18 years old.
8		B. Commercial Generative AI: Any type of artificial intelligence that
9		can create new content, such as text, images, video, or audio, based
10		upon the patterns and structures of the data it learns from.
11	SECTION 3.	The Federal Trade Commission with oversights from the National Institute
12		of Standards and Technology.
13		A. The Federal Trade Commission will use its power under section 5 of
14		the FTC Act to address all fraudulent and deceptive rule breakings
15		from AI companies.
16		B. The NIST will develop the guidance and safety efforts for
17		enforcement to establish all framework.
18	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on FY 2027.
19	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Bill 4: A Bill to Invest in American Railways

1	SECTION 1.	Congress shall invest \$100 billion into both creating new high-speed
2		railroads as well as maintaining all pre-existing railroads.
3	SECTION 2.	Railroads are defined as a track or set of tracks made of steel rails along
4		which passenger and freight trains run. Traditional Railroads are defined as
5		any railroads that are not high speed.
6	SECTION 3.	The Federal Railway Administration (FRA) and the Federal Department of
7		Transportation (DOT) will oversee enforcement.
8		Funding shall come from a 5% tax on diesel sales, a 5% tax on No.6 fuel oils
9		and a 5% tax on airline ticket sales. Any additional funding required shall be
10		provided by the Department of Defense.
11		The FRA and DOT must submit a plan of action detailing the location of
12		railways they will construct as well as which sections of pre-existing
13		railways they will maintain to Congress within 6 months of this legislation
14		taking effect. The plan will emphasize maintaining high-speed and
15		traditional railroads first and then constructing new railroads second.
16		Newly created railroads must be able to withstand high-speed passenger
17		trains traveling above 180 miles/hour.
18	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall take effect January 1, 2026.
19	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Bill 5: A Bill to Invest in Nuclear Energy

SECTION 1.	The United States shall substantially increase investment into U.S. nuclear
	power plants and infrastructure to decrease reliance on foreign energy
	supplies. The U.S. shall increase the affordability of nuclear energy options
	by subsidizing consumer costs.
SECTION 2.	Terms are defined as follows:
	A. Nuclear power plants are nuclear power reactors that generate
	electricity for a power grid.
	B. Substantially increasing investment is investing enough money to
	build 25 more nuclear plants over the next 10 years. This funding
	will also cover the costs associated with maintaining existing
	nuclear plants.
	C. Subsidizing consumer costs will be defined as keeping costs low
	enough to stay competitive with solar, wind, and other renewable
	energies.
SECTION 3.	The Department of Energy will be responsible for implementing this
	legislation.
	A. The Department of Energy will submit an annual report on progress
	made.
	B. If logistical or other challenges should arise, the Department of
	Energy will allocate as much funding as necessary to stay on
	schedule.
SECTION 4.	This legislation shall take effect January 1, 2027.

Bill 6: A Bill to Make Election Day a Federal Holiday to Increase Citizen Engagement

1	SECTION 1.	The United States Federal Government will observe the first Tuesday after
2		the first Monday in November every even-numbered year (Election Day) as
3		a Federal Holiday. 5 U.S. Code § 6103 will be amended to add Election Day
4		as a Federal Holiday.
5	SECTION 2.	All government buildings shall be closed on Election Day, with their
6		employees receiving paid time off. A Federal Holiday is defined as a
7		designated day recognized by the federal government during which
8		non-essential federal government offices are closed, and federal
9		employees are typically given the day off. Private sector employees may
10		also receive time off or holiday pay, depending on their employer's policies
11	SECTION 3.	The Office of Personnel Management (OPM) shall oversee the
12		implementation and scheduling of this holiday, ensuring it aligns with
13		existing Federal Holiday standards.
14	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall not alter the early voting procedure or mail-in voting
15		currently established by state or federal statutes.
16	SECTION 5.	This act shall take effect beginning with the next federal general election
17		following its passage.
18	SECTION 6.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Resolution 1: A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Ensure the Responsible Possession of Firearms

1	RESOLVED,	By two-thirds	of the Congress here assembled, that the following article is
2		proposed as	an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which
3		shall be valid	to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when
4		ratified by the	e legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within
5		seven years f	rom the date of its submission by the Congress:
6			ARTICLE
7		SECTION 1:	The right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be
8			infringed, provided that all individuals seeking to purchase,
9			possess, or carry a firearm must first obtain a federal firearm
10			license issued under uniform national standards.
11 12		SECTION 2:	The federal firearm license shall require:
13			(a) A comprehensive background check including criminal,
14			mental health, and domestic violence records;
15			(b) Completion of certified firearm safety and storage
16			training; and
17			(c) Renewal every 5 years contingent on continued eligibility.
18		SECTION 3:	The possession, sale, or transfer of any firearm without a
19			valid federal firearm license shall be prohibited and subject
20			to penalties as defined by law.

22		SECTION 4:	States may impose additional regulations aligned with, but
23			not less stringent than, standards established in this article.
24		SECTION 5:	The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by
25			appropriate legislation.

Resolution 2: A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Repeal the Twenty-First Amendment

1	RESOLVED,	By two-thirds	of the Congress here assembled, that the following article is
2		proposed as a	n amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which
3		shall be valid	to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when
4		ratified by the	e legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within
5		seven years fr	om the date of its submission by the Congress:
6			ARTICLE
7		SECTION 1:	The twenty-first article of the constitution of the United
8			States shall be repealed.
9		SECTION 2:	Therefore, the eighteenth amendment of the constitution of
10			the United States shall be reinstated. A nation-wide
11			prohibition on alcohol shall be instituted; banning the
12			
13			transport, sale, or ownership of alcoholic beverages.
14		SECTION 3:	The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by
15			appropriate legislation.
