

# A Bill to Establish Bipartisan Deliberation Standards in Congress to Reduce Political Polarization

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States Congress shall establish mandatory bipartisan
3		deliberation standards for the federal legislation to strengthen cross
4		party cooperation and reduce political polarization
5	SECTION 2.	Bipartisan deliberation standards shall be defined as legislative rules
6		requiring.
7		A. All standing committees to hold at least one bipartisan roundtable fo
8		major legislation before a vote is reported to the floor.
9		B. Equal representation of majority and minority party members in
10		committee hearings when expert witnesses are called
11		C. Publication of bipartisan policy impact statements prepared jointly by
12		the congressional Research Service (CRS) and committee staff.
13	SECTION 3.	The House committee on Rules and the Senate Committee n Rules in
14		Administration shall oversee implementation of these standards.
15		A. The Government Accountability Office shall conduct annual reviews to
16		ensure compliance.
17		B. Failure to comply with deliberation standards shall result in the suspension
18		of committee action on legislation until requirements are met.
19	SECTION 4.	This bill will go into effect January 1st, 2027.
20	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## A Bill to Remove Tax Exemption from Megachurches to Better fund Public Services.

BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1.

Congress shall remove 501(c)(3) tax exemption status for any and all megachurches.

SECTION 2.

1. Megachurch: any church with that earns more than 1.5 Million per year.

SECTION 3.

This change in the tax code will be overseen by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS).

A. The IRS will file megachurches under the Federal Corporate Tax rate of 21%. The Churches will be phased into this new tax rate, they will pay 10% for the first two years before being moved to the Federal Corporate Tax rate (FCT).

A. 50% of all money gained from the new megachurch tax will be earmarked for local school budgets and the remainder will be split evenly between existing federal food, housing, and healthcare programs

A. Megachurches who spend over 1 Million dollars in charity initiatives per year will be able to have their tax rate reduced by two thirds, down to 7%

SECTION 4.

This bill would go into effect at the start of the 2026 fiscal year.

SECTION 5.

All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A Bill to Stop Military Price Gouging by Defense Contractors

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	All defense contractors shall be subject to a 12% profit cap on contracts
3		exceeding \$1 million to prevent excessive war profiteering while maintaining
4		production efficiency.
5	SECTION 2.	The Department of Defense shall establish a Contract Renegotiation Board to
6		review defense contracts, recapture excessive profits, and ensure fair pricing
7		Companies may petition for exemptions based on extraordinary R&D costs of
8		emergency procurement needs. Defense contractors shall be prohibited from
9		selling weapons or military technology to hostile regimes including but not
10		limited to Russia, China, Iran, and North Korea.
11	SECTION 3.	Defense contractors shall maintain transparent accounting systems subject
12		to audit. Contractors earning excessive profits shall return surplus amounts
13		to the Treasury. Willful accounting manipulation shall result in temporary
14		contract suspension. The Government Accountability Office shall conduct
15		annual reviews and report to Congress.
16	SECTION 4.	This legislation takes effect January 31, 2026.
17	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# A Bill to Set a Price Cap for Life-Saving Drugs to Increase Medication Affordability

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	Pharmaceutical companies may not raise medication costs for life-saving
3		drugs above the designated maximum cap. The cap will be regulated
4		based on foreign price matching comparable first-world countries'
5		medicines, such as the United Kingdom, France, Canada, Australia, etc.
6	SECTION 2.	"Life-Saving Drugs" refers to insulin, chemotherapy and injectable
7		epinephrine, along with any drug deemed life-saving by the Food and
8		Drug Administration (FDA).
9	SECTION 3.	The Food and Drug Administration (FDA), United States Department of
10		Health and Human Services (HHS), and the Department of Justice (DOJ)
11		will oversee the implementation and enforcement of this legislation.
12		A. Businesses will be required to justify price increases of these
13		medications with public disclosures.
14		B. A compulsory license with no remuneration may be issued to any
15		applicable manufacturer for any medication that does not comply
16		with this legislation.
17	SECTION 4.	This bill will take effect January 15, 2026.
18	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A Bill to Regulate the Sale of Digital Personal Data to Protect Online Privacy

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	To safeguard digital privacy, the Federal Government shall regulate the
3		sale of personal data collected online. All users must be granted the right
4		to opt out of data sales while still maintaining full access to the websites
5		and services.
6	SECTION 2.	Digital Personal Data: Any information collected online that can be used
7		to identify an individual, including but not limited to names, email
8		addresses, IP addresses, device identifiers, browsing history, location
9		data and behavioral profiles.
10	SECTION 3.	This bill will be overseen by the Federal Trade Commission (FTC).
11		A. Any Company found in violation of this regulation shall be subject to a
12		\$500,000 fine.
13	SECTION 4.	This bill will be take effect January 1, 2027.
14	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# A Bill to Reform Prison Systems to Promote Rehabilitation of Inmates

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States should reform the prison system to allow for
3		rehabilitation, and help to support the criminals after they are released
4		from their sentence. This will by default lower the percent of criminals
5		that re-offend.
6	SECTION 2.	Re-offend is to be understood as when a previously convicted criminal is
7		released from their sentence and subsequently commits another crime
8		post release.
9	SECTION 3.	The Federal Bureau of Prisons will oversee this legislation.
10		A. The FBOP will implement group homes and set up jobs to assist
11		former convicts as they re-enter society.
12		B. This would allow for citizens with criminal history to have a support
13		system.
14	SECTION 4.	This bill will take effect January 1, 2027.
15	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void

#### A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Allow a Third Presidential Term

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	RESOLVED,	By two-thirds of the UIL Congress here assembled, that the following
3		article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United
4		States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the
5		Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the
6		several states within seven years from the date of its submission by
7		the Congress:
8		ARTICLE
9	SECTION 1:	The Twenty-Second Amendment to the Constitution which asserts
10		that "No person shall be elected to the office of President more than
11		twice".
12	SECTION 2:	An amendment to the Constitution shall be added that asserts "No
13		person shall be elected to the office of President more than three
14		times, and no person who has held the office of President, acted as
15		President, for more than two years of a term to which some other
16		person was elected President shall be elected to the office of President
17		more than twice."
18	SECTION 3:	This article shall not apply to any person holding office of President at
19		the time of its ratification.
20	SECTION 4:	The UIL Congress shall have power to enforce this article by
21		appropriate legislation.

#### A Bill to Close Guantánamo Bay

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	Guantánamo Bay Detention Camp and Naval Base shall be permanently
3		closed. The territory will be returned to the Republic of Cuba as
4		recognized in Article III of the 1934 Treaty of Relations.
5	SECTION 2.	"Guantanamo Bay Naval Base" refers to the United States military base
6		on approximately 45 square miles in southeastern end of Cuba.
7		"Close" is defined as the formal process of discontinuing operations and
8		removal of personnel, equipment, detainees, and prisoners.
9	SECTION 3.	The U.S. Department of Defense, Department of Homeland Security, and
10		Department of State shall oversee this bill.
11		A. Detainees may be transferred to the US and subject to military trials
12		in accordance with existing law or deported as determined by
13		government officials.
14		B. Transfers will be carefully conducted to ensure national security
15		protocols are met.
16	SECTION 4.	The base shall be fully closed within 18 months of the passage of this
17		legislation.
18	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

### A Resolution to Abolish the One Person-One Vote System in an Effort to Establish a Rank Choice Voting System

1	WHEREAS,	Under the current system, election turnouts continuously
2		misrepresent the multifaceted American people, and their collective
3		diversity; and
4	WHEREAS,	Mainstream politics have far too long misrepresented the American
5		electorate; in fact 33% of votes are lost when a third party drops out
6		of the race; and
7	WHEREAS,	Our one person-one vote system deprives voters of making
8		meaningful choices, creates increasingly toxic campaign cycles,
9		advances candidates who lack broad support, and leaves voters
10		feeling like their voices are silent; and
11	WHEREAS,	In a nation which is founded upon the idea of representative
12		democracy, it is heinous that this nation continuously allows this
13		grotesque misrepresentation of the American voice; now, therefore,
14		be it
15	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled make the following
16		recommendation for a solution to abolish the one person-one vote
17		system and establish a rank choice voting system.

### A Bill to Fund Grant Programs for Nursing Students

4		D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
1		The U.S. is facing a healthcare crisis, with a shortage of over 190,000 nurses.
2	SECTION 1.	
3		Thus, the federal government should create a grant program that lessens the
4		burden of costs associated with enrolling in nursing programs.
5	SECTION 2.	Anyone seeking to enroll in a nursing program shall be able to apply for the
6		grant, which can grant up to \$50,000 per year for up to 6 years, aimed at
7		covering costs associated with schooling for any nursing field.
8		A. To qualify for these grants, individuals must:
9		I. Attend a public or private university located in the United States.
10		II. Be currently enrolled in at least 12 credit hours per semester.
11		B. Individuals who have already earned their nursing degree and are still members
12		of the healthcare workforce can apply for compensation of costs up to \$200,000.
13	SECTION 3.	The Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) and the
14		Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) will work together to
15		oversee implementation and enforcement.
16		A. There will be an additional \$500 million per year allocated for 8 years to
17		fund this bill.
18		B. Once the 8-year period elapses, the HRSA and the DHHS will conduct a
19		reevaluation and adjust funding based on need.
20	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall take effect on July 1, 2026.
21	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A Bill to Reduce the Military and Economic Aid to Foreign Countries and Reduce Overseas Military Bases to Strengthen Domestic Growth

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States shall reduce all military and economic aid to foreign
3		countries to the minimum level required to maintain diplomatic alliances,
4		not to exceed \$5 million annually per country except in times of declared
5		war or during post-war reconstruction or humanitarian efforts, as
6		authorized by Congress. Additionally, the United States shall reduce non-
7		strategic overseas military bases by 50%.
8	SECTION 2.	"Military and Economic Aid" shall be defined as direct financial
9		assistance, grants, or weapons packages provided by the U.S.
10	1	government. "Non-strategic Overseas Military Base" shall be defined as
11		any foreign military installation that is not essential to immediate U.S.
12		defense. "Minimum Level" shall be defined as the least amount of annual
13		assistance that maintains foreign alliance status with said country.
14	SECTION 3.	The Department of Defense will oversee the closure of overseas bases
15		deemed non-strategic. The Department of State will oversee the
16		reduction of foreign aid, ensuring no nation receives more than \$5 million
17		annually.
18	SECTION 4.	This bill will be implemented at the start of the next fiscal year following
19		passage, with base reductions phased in over a five-year period.
20	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

### A Bill to Increase Funding for America's Nuclear Triad Modernization Program to Increase Global Stability

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	Congress shall establish a 35-cent tax on gas for 20 years. All funds
3		gathered this way will be used to fund America's Nuclear Triad
4		Modernization Program.
5	SECTION 2.	America's Nuclear Triad Modernization Program consists of
6		upgrading the current Minuteman III ICBMs to the new Sentinel ICBM,
7		increasing production of the Columbia-class submarine to replace the
8		Ohio-class, and increasing production and research of the B-21 Raider
9		stealth bomber and acquiring new Long Range Standoff Missiles
10		(LRSOs)
11	SECTION 3.	The Department of Defense (DoD) shall be in charge of the
12		modernization program.
13	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall go into effect in fiscal year 2027.
14	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and
15		void.
