#### A RESOLUTION TO PHASE OUT CIGARETTE SALES TO PROTECT PUBLIC HEALTH

1	Whereas:	Cigarette smoking is the leading cause of preventable death in the United States, taking
2		over 400,000 lives annually; and
3	Whereas:	cigarettes contain highly addictive nicotine and over 7,000 harmful chemicals that
4		contribute to cancer, heart disease, and respiratory illness; and
5	Whereas:	the cost of smoking related illness can exceed \$600 billion in the United States economy
6		each year; and
7	Whereas:	secondhand smoke exposes millions of non-smokers, including children, to dangerous
8		health risks despite their lack of personal choice; and
9	Whereas:	effective smoking cessation programs, counseling, and medical treatments are widely
10		available and have proven to be successful in helping individuals overcome nicotine
11		addiction; and
12	Whereas:	eliminating cigarette sales would significantly reduce long term healthcare costs and
13		prevent millions of future deaths; now,
14	Therefore,	be it resolved that this FGCCFL Student Congress here assembled the United States
15		should phase out the sale and distribution of traditional combustible cigarettes over the
16		next five years.

#### A BILL TO IMPLEMENT DIGITAL INFRASTRUCTURE TO VERIFY SOCIAL MEDIA USERS AGES

1	BE IT ENAC	TED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	Article I:	U.Sbased social media platforms must create a digital wall that requires at least one
3		form of government identification to verify the age of users.
4	Article II:	A. U.Sbased social media platforms shall be defined as any social networking or
5		communication platform whose headquarters lie in the United States or primarily
6		operates within the U.S. market, including platforms that collect data from or provide
7		service to more than 1 million users annually.
8		B. Digital wall shall be defined as a secure, encrypted verification system in social media
9		platforms that require government-issued identification for users to hold or create an
10		account. The wall must store minimal personal data necessary and comply with federal
11		data protection and privacy standards.
12		C. Government identification shall be defined as an official document issued by a federal,
13		state, or local government that verifies a person's identity, including but not limited to
14		state-issued ID, drivers license, military ID, or Permanent Resident Card.
15	Article III:	The provisions of this bill shall take effect on May 1, 2027.
16	Article IV:	A. The Department of Education in tandem with the Federal Trade Commission and
17		Department of Homeland Security's Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency
18		shall be responsible for enforcing the provisions of this bill.
19		B. Any U.Sbased social media platforms failing to comply shall be fined \$1,000 per
20		user each day until full compliance is achieved.
21	Article V:	All laws in conflict with this legislation shall hereby be declared null and void.

#### A BILL TO LEGALIZE MEDICAL AID IN DYING

1	BE IT ENACT	TED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	Article I:	Medical aid in dying shall be legalized and implemented in all states and territories of the
3		United States.
4	Article II:	Medical aid in dying shall be defined as the painless killing of those above the age of 18
5		with terminal illnesses who wish to die, given that it is prescribed by a physician and
6		administered in the presence of a physician.
7	Article III:	The provisions of this bill shall take effect on January 1st, 2027.
8	Article IV:	A. The National Institute of Health and all state Departments of Health shall provide
9		enforcement of the provisions of this bill.
10		B. Misuse of medical aid in dying, such as administering to a patient under the age of 18
11		or who did not consent, will be classified as first or second-degree murder and
12		provide life in prison without the possibility of parole and the possibility of the death
13		penalty.
14		C. Medical aid in dying shall be implemented in major hospitals and medical offices
15		throughout the United States.
16	Article V:	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A BILL TO REQUIRE ALL PUBLIC SCHOOLS HAVE METAL DETECTORS

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:		
2	Article I:	US Department of Education is to provide metal detectors and require all public schools	
3		to use them.	
4	Article II:	A. A metal detector is a walk-through device designed to detect weapons and prohibited	
5		metal items.	
6		B. Public schools shall be defined as any institution of learning that receives federal	
7		funding,	
8	Article III:	The provisions of this bill shall take effect on August 2nd, 2028.	
9	Article IV:	The US Department of Education (DOE) that will get guidance and funding from the	
10		Office of Safe and Healthy Students (OSHS).	
11		A. DOE and OSHS will enforce the provisions of this bill by performing unannounced	
12		inspections to ensure the metal detectors are in use.	
13		B. After a two-year grace period, schools found to be non-compliant with the legislation	
14		will face immediate suspension of operation until the matter is resolved.	
15		C. DOE and OSHS will audit compliance through deployment of qualified security	
16		professionals tasked who will perform security and maintenance audits at a frequency of	
17		no less than every two calendar years.	
18		D. Funding for the provisions of this legislation shall be provided by general tax	
19		revenues.	
20	Article V:	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

6	Article III:	This legislation shall take effect on May 1st, 2026.
7	Article IV:	A. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), acting through the
8		Administration for Children and Families and its Children's Bureau, shall oversee the
9		implementation and enforcement of this Act.
10		B. The U.S. The Department of Housing and Urban Development shall coordinate with
11		DHHS to administer and monitor the housing assistance provisions established under this
12		legislation.
13	Article V:	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A BILL TO INCREASE TRANSPARENCY AND ACCOUNTABILITY IN AI SYSTEMS

1	BE IT ENAC	TED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	Article I:	All technology companies, research institutions, and government agencies developing or
3		deploying artificial intelligence (AI) systems within the United States shall be required to
4		implement transparency and accountability measures.
5	Article II:	Artificial Intelligence systems shall be defined as any machine-based system that can
6		operate autonomously and adapt after deployment.
7	Article III:	The provisions of this bill shall take effect on July 1st, 2026.
8	Article IV:	A. The Department of Commerce shall be responsible for enforcing the provisions of this
9		bill.
10		B. Transparency Requirement: All covered entities must publish clear documentation
11		detailing the intended scope, purpose and limitations of each AI system, the data sources
12		used in model training and steps taken to mitigate bias, and explainable summaries of
13		decision-making processes accessible to people without technology backgrounds.
14		C. All entities subject to the provisions of this legislation shall undergo biannual audits by
15		the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST), assessing. transparency,
16		equity, and privacy standards.
17		D. Any entity found to be in noncompliance shall be subject to fines not exceeding
18		\$500,000. Revenues produced by fines shall be used to fund the provisions of this bill.
19		E. Companies may file for exemption under the premise of potential for the
20		jeopardization of national security through disclosed information.
21	Article V:	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A BILL TO DEVELOP DOMESTIC RARE EARTH ELEMENT REFINEMENT

1	BE IT ENACT	TED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	Article I:	The United States shall invest two billion dollars into the development of domestic rare
3		earth element (REE) refinement.
4	Article II:	Rare earth elements shall hereby be defined as a group of metallic elements, containing
5		Scandium, Yttrium, and 15 Lanthanides.
6	Article III:	The provisions of this bill shall take effect January 1, 2026.
7	Article IV:	The Department of Defense (DOD), Department of Energy (DOE), and Department of
8		Treasury (DOT) shall be responsible for enforcing the provisions of this bill.
9		A. Two billion dollars shall be taken from the DOD budget to fund the provisions of this
10		legislation.
11		B. The DOT shall oversee the distribution of 1.5 billion dollars to existing REE
12		refinement companies.
13		C. \$500 million shall be invested into developing environmentally friendly refinement
14		methods.
15	Article V:	All laws in conflict with this legislation shall hereby be declared null and void.

#### A BILL TO LEGALIZE MARIJUANA

1	BE IT ENAC	TED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	Article I:	The adult use of cannabis (marijuana) shall be legal, regulated, and taxed to reduce illegal
3		markets, protect public health, generate revenue, and ensure safe access for adults aged
4		21 and older from registered retailers.
5	Article II:	Cannabis shall be defined as all parts of the Cannabis sativa plant, its seeds, resin, and
6		derivatives, including marijuana.
7	Article III:	The provisions of this bill shall take effect one year after its passage.
8	Article IV:	The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) shall oversee licensing, regulation, and
9		enforcement:
10		A. Adults may possess up to 1 ounce (28 grams) of cannabis in public and up to 8 ounces
11		(227 grams) in private residences.
12		B. Licensed retailers in compliance with labeling, safety, and testing standards, including
13		THC disclosure and contaminant testing shall be exempted from Article IV, Section A.
14		C. Cannabis products sold for recreational use shall be subject to a \$5 tax per gram, with
15		revenue allocated as follows: \$2.00 per gram for public health programs, \$1.50 per gram
16		for law enforcement and criminal justice reform, and \$1.50 per gram for community
17		development.
18		D. The Federal Communications Commission shall promulgate regulatory guidance
19		prohibiting cannabis advertisement to minors.
20	Article V:	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## A BILL TO ESTABLISH DOMESTIC URANIUM ENRICHMENT FACILITIES TO PROMOTE ENERGY INDEPENDENCE

1	BE IT ENAC	TED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	Article I:	The U.S. shall incentivize the creation and maintenance of new uranium enrichment
3		facilities and the production of High-Assay Low-Enriched Uranium (HALEU).
		·
4	Article II:	A. Nuclear enrichments shall be defined as the process of increasing concentration of
5		natural uranium to make it suitable for use as nuclear fuel.
6		B. Standard work unit shall be defined as a measurement for work required to enrich
7		uranium to a specific concentration.
8	Article III:	This legislation shall take effect on December 1, 2026.
9	Article IV:	The Internal Revenue Service (IRS), Department of Energy (DOE), and Nuclear
10		Regulatory Commission (NRC) shall be responsible for enforcing the provisions of this
11		bill.
12		A. The IRS will establish a tax credit to all new and existing privately owned nuclear
13		enrichment facilities producing HALEU SWUs.
14		B. The DOE will establish grant programs for the construction of new commercial-scale
15		HALEU production facilities.
16		C. The NRC will receive an additional \$150 million to their current budget for increases
17		in personnel and training associated with implementation of this legislation.
18	Article V:	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A BILL TO PUNISH ADULTERY

1	BE IT ENAC	TED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	Article I:	Adultery shall be classified as a federal offense, punishable by a fine of no less than
3		\$10,000 and no more than \$100,000 per incident, which will be made available to the
4		adulterer's former spouse upon divorce.
5	Article II:	A. Adultery shall be defined as knowing and intentional engagement in sexual contact by
6		a married person with someone other than their lawful spouse or domestic partner.
7		B. Incidents of adultery shall be defined as individual calendar days in which such an
8		offense occurred.

#### A BILL TO PROTECT STATUTORY RAPE VICTIMS FROM PREGNANCY

1	BE IT ENACT	TED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	Article I:	All cases of documented pregnancy sustained below the age of consent as a result of
3		unlawful sexual contact with the victim shall be given the option of either medical
4		termination of the pregnancy at any stage in fetal development or adoption of the infant.
5	Article II:	A. Documented pregnancies include those discovered incidentally in medical testing,
6		reported by social work interactions, or revealed through prenatal healthcare.
7		B. Adoptions shall proceed under established law and may preserve whatever familial
8		rights are negotiated on a case-by-case basis, with established preferences for
9		intrafamilial adoptions.
10	Article III:	The provisions of this bill shall take effect January 1, 2027.
11	Article IV:	The Department of Health and Human Services shall be responsible for enforcing the
12		provisions of this bill.
13	Article V:	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A BILL TO TAX EXCESS COASTAL DEVELOPMENT

1	BE IT ENAC	TED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	Article I:	A 35% federal tax shall be levied on the construction of any new structure within three
3		miles from a marine coastline.
4	Article II:	A. New structures shall include any residential or commercial building valued at over \$10
5		million USD at an address not taxed as the same sort of property in the previous calendar
6		year.
7		B. The products of this tax shall be allocated to the construction of storm drains and other
8		fortifications against extreme weather appropriate for regional needs as evaluated by the
9		Environmental Protection Agency.
10	Article III:	The provisions of this bill shall take effect January 1 <sup>st</sup> , 2028.
11	Article IV:	The Internal Revenue Service and the Environmental Protection Agency shall be
12		responsible for enforcing the provisions of this bill.
13	Article V:	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
