# **A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Abolish the Electoral College**

**RESOLVED,** By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the following article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within seven years from the date of its submission by the Congress:

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

**SECTION 1.** The United States shall abolish the electoral college used to elect the president of the United States during presidential elections

**SECTION 2.** The results of the presidential election shall be decided by the popular vote of the people.

**SECTION 3.** **“The Electoral College”** shall be defined as the “electors” referred to in Article II, Section 1, Clause 2 of the Constitution of the United States  
**“Popular Vote”** shall be defined as the presidential candidate that culminated the majority of votes cast during the presidential election

**SECTION 4.** The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation

# A Resolution to Set a Maximum Age for Candidates for Federal Office

1 **RESOLVED,** By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the following article is  
2 proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which shall  
3 be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when ratified by the  
4 legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within seven years from the date  
5 of its submission by the Congress:

## 6 **ARTICLE 2, Section 1, Clause 5**

7 **SECTION 1:** Article 2, Section 1, Clause 5 is hereby amended so that the maximum age  
8 for any candidate running or appointed to federal office (a position in the USFG) is  
9 set to 65 years of age due to the decline in mental cognition at the age of 70. If a  
10 candidate wins the election at 65, they will be allowed to run for their term if they  
11 pass a cognitive test. All cognitive testing must be performed by the NIH, and the  
12 National Institute of Health will release the results alongside the president's  
13 quarterly physical. If the NIH does not release the results, the Secret Service,  
14 under the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), will release them.

15  
16 **SECTION 2:** The Federal Government will hereby be in charge of all federal elections to  
17 enforce this legislation.

# **A Bill to Abolish Immigration and Customs Enforcement and Restructure Federal Immigration Enforcement**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

**SECTION 1.** Immigration and Customs Enforcement is hereby abolished.

**SECTION 2.** "ICE" is the abbreviation of Immigration and Customs Enforcement.

**SECTION 3.** The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) shall have authority to enforce this Act to reform ICE as we know it.

A. All funds previously appropriated to ICE shall be relocated to immigration courts, legal representation for asylum seekers, and oversight mechanisms ensuring constitutional compliance.

B. No federal funds may be used to recreate ICE under a new name or similar structure.

**SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect beginning of Fiscal Year 2027. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# A Bill to Ban and Criminalize Explicit AI-Generated Deepfakes to Protect Non-Consenting Individuals

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1 **SECTION 1.** The creation and distribution of sexually explicit, AI-generated deepfakes  
2 with an individual's likeness is liable to rigorous criminal charges, and all platforms  
3 must rapidly remove any content found in violation, while preserving the  
4 evidence for non-consenting victims.

5 **SECTION 2.** "Sexually explicit" is defined as material with a pictorial depiction of nudity  
6 or sexual acts: both actual or simulated.

7 "Deepfake" is defined as an artificial image or video created with machine  
8 learning.

9 "Likeness" is defined as the use of a person's recognizable visual representation,  
10 including the unique and identifiable features that constitute one's own individual  
11 image.

12 "AI-generated" is defined as any content that includes elements created by or  
13 with the help of Artificial Intelligence or Artificial Generative Intelligence, and  
14 Artificial General Intelligence.

15 **SECTION 3.** Oversight and enforcement will be through the Federal Communications  
16 Commission and the Department of Justice.

17 **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect immediately when enacted.

18 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## **A Bill to grant the right to die to terminally ill persons.**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

**SECTION 1.** Any individual over the age of 18 with a terminal illness will have the ability to put in a request to be given life ending treatment.

**SECTION 2.** Terminal shall be defined as an ailment that is incurable and irreversible and has been medically confirmed and will, within reasonable medical judgment, produce death within six months.

**SECTION 3.** This legislation will be overseen by the department of health.

**SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2026.

**SECTION 5** All laws that conflict with this legislation will be hereby declared null and void.

## **A Bill to Implement Year-Round Schooling**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- SECTION 1.** A 45-15 single-track year-round school schedule shall be established among all public schools in the United States.
- SECTION 2.** “45-15 singletrack year-round school schedule” entails students attending public school for 45 days (nine school weeks), and then receiving 15 days (three school weeks) off.
- SECTION 3.** This bill shall be enforced by the Department of Education. Schools found to violate this law shall lose all federal funding for all years in which they remain in violation.
- SECTION 4.** This bill shall take effect prior to the 2027-2028 school year.

# **A Bill to make Public College and Community College bachelor's or associate degree free.**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

**SECTION 1.** Public colleges & community colleges shall admit United States Citizens with a minimum GPA of 2.5% free of charge with a diploma from an accredited US high school.

**SECTION 2.** To make college affordable for US families and to ensure a well educated population, the United States Government shall create a program for admittance to public colleges and community colleges free of charge to US citizens for a bachelor's or associate' degree.

**SECTION 3.** This legislation shall be overseen by the Department of Education. **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect immediately upon passage. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# A Bill to Phase out Incineration of Municipal Waste to create energy alternatives and improve environmental stability

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1 **SECTION 1.** The United States shall phase out the use of municipal solid waste incineration  
2 facilities and transition to recycling, composting, and non-combustion  
3 waste-to-energy alternatives.

4 **SECTION 2.** For the purpose of the Bill:

5 **Municipal Solid Waste Incineration (MSWI)** refers to the combustion of  
6 household and commercial waste for disposal or energy recovery

7 **Non-Combustion waste-to-energy technologies** include

8 anaerobic digestion, gasification without direct burning, and other EPA approved  
9 thermal or biological conversion methods.

10 **Composting** refers to anaerobic biological decomposition of organic waste.

11 **Recycling** refers to the mechanical or chemical reprocessing of materials into new  
12 products.

13 **SECTION 3.** A National Phase out shall occur according to this schedule.

14 (A) No New MSWI may be permitted after the date of January 1st, 2027

15 (B) Existing MSWI facilities must reduce incineration volume by 40% by 2030, 75%  
16 by 2033, and 100% by 2035

17 (C) Facilities failing to comply with benchmarks shall lose federal  
18 waste-management subsidies and become ineligible for federal energy credits

19 **SECTION 4.** To support the transition

20 (A) The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) shall administer 5 billion annual  
21 grant program to municipalities for

22 Reclining infrastructure expansion

23 Composting facilities

24 Anaerobic digestion and other non-combustion WTE systems

25 (B) Municipalities must submit transition plans demonstrating environmental and  
26 economic feasibility

27 (C) Priority shall be given to communities disproportionately affected by pollution  
28 from existing incinerators

29 **Section 5.** The EPA shall enforce compliance through:

30 Annual emission reporting

31 Facility inspections

Civil peneltaies for non-compliance

**Section 6.** Funding for the bill shall come from reallocating federal subsidies currently directed  
towards MSWI facilities and from the EPA's existing waste-management budget

**Section 7.** This Bill shall take effect immediately upon passing.

# **A Bill to Prohibit the Export of U.S. Surveillance Technology to Authoritarian Regimes**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- SECTION 1.** The United States shall ban the sale of surveillance technology to countries with authoritarian regimes in positions of political power.
- SECTION 2.** Positions of political power should be defined as any governing body within a country including legislative, executive, and judicial branches of government. Authoritarian regimes should be defined by the EIU Democracy Index.
- SECTION 3.** The Department of Homeland Security's Public Safety and Homeland Security Bureau shall be responsible for the implementation of this bill.
- A. The Department of State shall encourage other North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) countries to also ban the sale of their surveillance technologies.
- SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2026. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# **A Bill to Reduce School Book Censorship to Allow Children to have the Right to Discover and Learn Unbiased**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- SECTION 1.** Censorship of books in school needs to be reduced especially in cases where the book is only censored because of personal or political views. Students deserve the right to be able to discover history and educate themselves on topics without being obstructed by censorship that focuses on pushing conservative and restrictive views.
- SECTION 2.** Censorship in this case means action taken on books or material based on its content as a result of parental, community, administrative, or governmental challenges that leads to either the removal of availability to students or reduced availability.
- SECTION 3.** The bill will be overseen by the Department of Education and the Department of Justice
- SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect on June 1, 2026. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# A Bill To Reform Marijuana Regulations Under The Controlled Substances Act

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

**SECTION 1.** Marijuana and its derivatives, including cannabidiol (CBD), are widely used for medical and commercial purposes and have been shown to be less harmful and less addictive than many substances currently classified under Schedule I of the Controlled Substances Act. This legislation seeks to reform federal drug scheduling by distinguishing between high-THC marijuana products and lower-THC or CBD-based products.

**SECTION 2.** For the purposes of this legislation

A. **“Cannabidiol (CBD)”** shall refer to a non-intoxicating compound derived from cannabis plants that does not produce psychoactive effects and is commonly used for medical and therapeutic purposes.

B. **“Tetrahydrocannabinol (THC)”** shall refer to the psychoactive chemical compound in marijuana responsible for intoxicating effects.

C. **“Addictive”** shall refer to a substance that creates physical or psychological dependence.

D. **“Harmful”** shall refer to substances that pose significant and ongoing risks to consumer health.

**SECTION 3.** The Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), operating under the authority of the Controlled Substances Act (CSA), in coordination with the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), shall implement and enforce this legislation by:

A. Maintaining marijuana products with high THC concentrations under Schedule I of the Controlled Substances Act.

B. Reclassifying low THC concentrated products, including CBD-dominant products, under Schedule IV or Schedule V

C. Require Marijuana only to be sold in licensed shops.

D. Prohibiting the sale or display of marijuana products in locations primarily accessible to minors.

**SECTION 4.** This legislation shall take effect immediately after its passage.

**SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# A Bill to Replace Electrical Transmission Lines with Carbon Nanotubes

**BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:**

**SECTION 1.** The Department of Energy shall oversee the systematic decommissioning of all existing high-voltage copper and aluminum alloy transmission lines within the national power grid and replace them with carbon nanotube (CNT) conductive wiring.

**SECTION 2.**

**Carbon Nanotubes (CNTs)** shall be defined as cylindrical nanostructures composed of carbon atoms with a high aspect ratio, specifically engineered for electrical conductivity exceeding  $10^7$  S/m.

**SECTION 3.** The Office of Electricity (OE) within the Department of Energy shall oversee the enforcement of this transition.

- **A.** The OE shall establish a phased replacement schedule, prioritizing regions with the highest transmission line energy loss.
- **B.** Enforcement shall be maintained through the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC), which will withhold federal grid modernization grants from utility providers failing to meet the replacement timeline.

**SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2027.

**SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
