**A BILL TO PROHIBIT THE USE OF ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE IN
TELEVISION COMMERCIAL ADVERTISING**

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 Article I: The use of artificial intelligence to substantially generate any television commercial
3 advertisement, including political, issue-based, or product advertising, shall be prohibited
4 within the United States.

5 Article II: A. Artificial intelligence shall be defined as any computational system capable of
6 autonomously generating video, audio, images, or scripts without human authorship.

7 B. Television commercial advertisement shall be defined as any paid promotional content
8 broadcast on television or television-based streaming platforms for the purpose of
9 influencing consumer or public behavior.

10 C. Substantially generate shall be defined as artificial intelligence creating a majority of
11 the visual, audio, or scripted content of an advertisement.

12 Article III: The provisions of this bill shall take effect one year after passage.

13 Article IV: A. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) shall be responsible for enforcing
14 the provisions of this bill.

15 B. The FCC may impose civil fines, revoke broadcast permissions, or take other
16 appropriate regulatory action against entities found in violation of this legislation.

17 Article V: All laws in conflict with this legislation shall hereby be declared null and void.

A BILL TO PROHIBIT DISCRIMINATION AGAINST NATURAL HAIR IN SCHOOLS

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 Article I: Students shall not be denied enrollment, participation in school activities, extracurricular
3 programs, or membership in student organizations based on their natural hairstyles.

4 Schools and school-sponsored programs shall ensure that dress codes and grooming
5 policies do not target or disproportionately affect students because of their hair.

6 Article II: A. As used herein, “natural hairstyles” include afros, braids, twists, locs, and cornrows.

7 B. As used herein, “discrimination” means any action by school administrators, teachers,
8 or staff that penalizes, harasses, or prevents a student from fully participating in school
9 activities, extracurricular programs, or student organizations because of their natural
10 hairstyle.

11 Article III: The provisions of this bill shall take effect one year after passage.

12 Article IV: The Department of Education’s Office for Civil Rights shall oversee enforcement of this
13 Act.

14 A. Schools shall designate an existing staff member or committee to review complaints
15 regarding hairstyle-based discrimination. Schools shall utilize existing reporting methods,
16 such as written forms or email submissions, to ensure timely responses and corrective
17 actions.

18 Article V: All laws in conflict with this legislation shall hereby be declared null and void.

A BILL TO ESTABLISH A PRICE CAP ON COLLEGE TUITION FEES

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 Article I: All universities in the United States are hereby prohibited from enforcing tuition prices of
3 over \$60,000 annually per student.

4 Article II: A. Universities, which can be public or private, are institutions of higher education that
5 provide teaching and research facilities and are authorized to grant academic degrees to
6 students.

7 B. Tuition Prices include all mandatory charges required for enrollment and instruction,
8 including tuition, instructional fees, academic fees, and program fees, but excluding
9 room, board, and optional services. This is applicable for students in state and out-of-
10 state.

11 Article III: The provisions of this bill shall take effect July 1st of 2026.

12 Article IV: A. The Department of Education shall oversee the enforcement of this bill.

13 B. The Office of Federal Student Aid (FSA), which is part of the Department of
14 Education, is responsible for enforcing this bill.

15 C. The Office of Federal Student Aid shall send an executive to each college every two
16 years to monitor the enforcement of this bill.

17 D. Any University found not complying with this bill shall be subject to a \$200,000 fine
18 for every year it is continued.

19 Article V: All laws in conflict with this legislation shall hereby be declared null and void.

A BILL TO A BILL TO IMPLEMENT FEDERAL PAID MATERNAL LEAVE

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 Article I: Employers in the United States shall provide a minimum of 20 weeks of paid, job-
3 protected maternal leave to all eligible employees. Compensation must be no lower than
4 two-thirds of the employee's usual income.

5 Article II: As used herein, "Eligible employees" shall be defined as individuals who have worked
6 for their employer for at least 12 months.

7 Article III: This legislation will take effect on December 1, 2026.

8 Article IV: The Department of Labor will be responsible for enforcing the provisions of this bill.

9 A. Businesses making less than 7 million dollars in annual receipts will receive full
10 government funding when providing paid leave.

11 B. Any company found to have violated these regulations will be fined \$5,000 per
12 violation. Full back pay will be owed to the employee and additional penalties for
13 repeated violations.

14 Article V: All laws in conflict with this legislation shall hereby be declared null and void.

A BILL TO STRENGTHEN SCHOOL SECURITY AND THREAT PREVENTION PROGRAMS

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 Article I: Public K–12 schools shall establish and maintain comprehensive security threat
3 prevention and response programs to protect students and staff from active threats,
4 intrusions, and other safety risks.

5 Article II: A. “Security threat” refers to any incident or credible risk that endangers the safety of
6 students and staff, including but not limited to active shooters, intruders, bomb threats, or
7 other violent acts.

8 B. “Threat prevention and response programs” refers to a structured plan including threat
9 assessment, prevention strategies, emergency drills, communication protocols, and
10 resolution efforts.

11 Article III: The provisions of this bill shall take effect on January 1st, 2027.

12 Article IV: A. The Department of Education, in partnership with the Department of Homeland
13 Security, shall issue national guidelines for school threat prevention programs and ensure
14 compliance.

15 B. \$2.5 billion shall be allocated over five fiscal years (FY2028–FY2032) from the
16 federal education budget to fund staff training, infrastructure upgrades, communication
17 systems, and counseling resources.

18 C. Schools that fail to implement these measures shall submit corrective action plans
19 before receiving further federal funding.

20 Article V: All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A BILL TO END ILLICIT OVERFISHING TO STABILIZE SENSITIVE ECOSYSTEMS

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 Article I: The import and domestic sale of seafood products that cannot be verified through a
3 digitized “vessel-to-retail” traceability system shall be banned.

4 Article II: Vessel-to-retail traceability shall be understood to function through an expansion of the
5 Seafood Import Monitoring Program, requiring electronic data reporting at the point of
6 entry.

7 Article III: The provisions of this bill shall take effect on January 1, 2027.

8 Article IV: The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, in coordination with U.S.
9 Customs and Border Protection, shall be charged with enforcing this bill as follows.

10 A. Non-compliant shipments shall be subject to immediate seizure, and repeat offending
11 companies will face a permanent ban from importing or domestic sale of seafood into the
12 United States.

13 Article V: All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

**A RESOLUTION TO ESTABLISH PREEMPTIVE ACCORDS TO
REGULATE ENHANCED HUMAN INDIVIDUALS**

1 Whereas: Rapid advancements in genetic engineering, cybernetics, and biological augmentation are
2 accelerating the emergence of Enhanced Human Individuals (EHIs) with capabilities
3 surpassing natural human baselines; and

4 Whereas: The absence of a unified international framework creates a potential “enhancement arms
5 race,” incentivizing nations to weaponize human biology for military supremacy; and

6 Whereas: Unregulated super-powered entities pose a unique threat to global stability, human rights,
7 and the potential for substantial harms in the creation of EHIs without regulation and
8 intentional avoidance of military applications and violent, internationally destructive
9 outcomes; and

10 Therefore, be it resolved that this FGCCFL Student Congress here assembled that: the United States
11 propose an International Accord on Enhanced Individuals through the United Nations,
12 establishing mutually amenable definitions of EHIs, restrictions on military usage, a
13 monitoring system for EHIs, human rights protection for EHIs, and enforcement
14 mechanisms through immediate economic sanction of member nations that fail to uphold
15 these agreements.

A BILL MANDATING COGNITIVE ASSESSMENTS FOR DRIVERS OVER THE AGE OF 75

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 Article I: Any individual over the age of 75 shall be subject to a cognitive decline test before
3 obtaining or renewing a license, if the individual has an active license, they shall be
4 subject to testing as well.

5 Article II: A. “Cognitive Decline Testing” refers to assessing the mental abilities of an individual.

6 B. “Drivers License” refers to the legal permit granted by the government, to an
7 individual allowing oneself to operate a motor vehicle

8 C. “Obtain” and “Renew” refer to the initial issuance of a driver's license and the process
9 of extending the validity of a driver's license.

10 Article III: The provisions of this bill shall take effect 90 days after passage

11 Article IV: A. The Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) shall be responsible for enforcing the
12 provisions of this bill.

13 B. Enforcement shall include testing an individual's cognitive capability and determining
14 if said individual is fit to operate a motor vehicle.

15 C. Notices, over the span of 3 weeks, shall be sent to individuals who do not come into
16 the DMV for cognitive decline testing. After 3 missed notices go unresponded, the
17 individual will incur a fine of \$1,000.

18 Article V: All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A BILL TO SUPPORT THE NATIONAL UNITY GOVERNMENT OF MYANMAR

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 Article I: The United States shall provide 2 billion dollars in military aid and a force not exceeding
3 20,000 US soldiers to support the National Unity Government of Myanmar.

4 Article II: A. Military aid shall include, but not be limited to, assistance in the form of weapons,
5 equipment, training, financial support, and infrastructure necessary to combating the
6 Tatmadaw.

7 B. The 20,000 soldiers provided shall include but not be limited to, personnel dedicated
8 to training, resource allotment, oversight, medical treatment, translation, and
9 construction.

10 Article III: The provisions of this bill shall take effect immediately upon passage.

11 Article IV: A. The Department of Defense in tandem with the State Department shall be responsible
12 for enforcing the provisions of this bill.

13 B. The 2 billion dollars provided shall be allocated from the budget of the Department of
14 Defense.

15 Article V: All laws in conflict with this legislation shall hereby be declared null and void.
