

A Bill to Hasten a Transition to Nuclear Energy Technologies

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1 **SECTION 1.** The United States shall hereby designate \$450 billion annually for the next
 2 30 years for the purpose of building a total of 6 petawatt hours of annual
 3 electrical generation capacity in nuclear fission reactors. In addition, a
 4 one-time fund of \$25 billion will be designated for the purpose of
 5 constructing a deep geological repository for transuranic waste capable of
 6 storing a minimum of 50 years of waste at the maximum waste production
 7 rate of the fission reactors.

8 **SECTION 2.** For the purposes of this act:

9 A. Nuclear fission reactor shall be defined as an electrical generation
 10 facility that utilizes the controlled fission of uranium molecules to
 11 produce electricity.

12 B. Deep geological repository shall be defined as a storage facility for
 13 the purpose of securely containing waste underground for a
 14 minimum period of 1,000 years.

15 **SECTION 3.** This legislation shall be overseen and enforced by the Department of
 16 Energy.

17 **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect in fiscal year 2027.

18 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

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A Resolution to Abolish the Practice of Trying Children as Adults in the Criminal Justice System

1 **WHEREAS,** The United States is one of the few countries in the world where children
2 can be tried as adults and sentenced to life in prison without the possibility
3 of parole; and

4 **WHEREAS,** Neuroscience and psychological research consistently show that adolescent
5 brains are still developing, particularly in areas related to impulse control,
6 decision-making, and understanding long-term consequences; and

7 **WHEREAS,** The U.S. Supreme Court has recognized that children are categorically less
8 culpable than adults due to their diminished capacity for judgment and
9 maturity in *Roper v. Simmons* (2005) and *Graham v. Florida* (2010); and

10 **WHEREAS,** Research indicates that children tried as adults face higher rates of abuse,
11 violence, and isolation in adult correctional facilities, which can lead to
12 greater recidivism and hinder rehabilitation; and

13 **WHEREAS,** The goal of the criminal justice system should be rehabilitation and
14 reintegration of offenders into society, which is more achievable through
15 the juvenile justice system than through adult court processes; now,
16 therefore, be it

17 **RESOLVED,** That the Congress here assembled should abolish the practice of trying
18 children as adults, and instead, ensure that minors who commit criminal
19 offenses are adjudicated in the juvenile justice system, where they can
20 receive age-appropriate treatment, rehabilitation, and support for their
21 reintegration into society.

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A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Limit the Terms of Members of Congress

1 **RESOLVED,** By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the following article is
2 proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which
3 shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when
4 ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within
5 seven years from the date of its submission by the Congress:

6 **ARTICLE --**

7 **SECTION 1:** The United States Federal government shall no longer
8 permit term lengths longer than three terms for individuals
9 in the House of Representatives. This means that the
10 maximum amount of time that a representative can occupy
11 one of that state's house seats shall not exceed six years.
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13 **SECTION 2:** The United States Federal government shall no longer
14 permit term lengths longer than one term for individuals in
15 the Senate. This means that the maximum amount of time
16 that a senator can occupy one of that state's senate seats
17 shall not exceed more than six years.

18 **SECTION 3:** The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by
19 appropriate legislation.
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
