A Bill to Require a Monthly Substance Abuse Tests for Teen Drivers

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. Teenagers who have a license should test for substance abuse once a month.

SECTION 2. Substance meaning a material with a specific, fixed composition. This includes pure elements (like iron) and pure compounds (like methane).

SECTION 3. The District of Motor Vehicles will oversee this bill.

SECTION 4. This bill will go into effect immediately upon passage.

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Ban Roblox in the United States

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. Roblox Corporation's online gaming platform, known as "Roblox," shall be prohibited from operating within the United States, and access to Roblox shall be blocked for users located in the United States.

SECTION 2 For the purposes of this legislation, **Roblox** is defined as the website, application, and all related services owned and/or operated by Roblox Corporation that allow users to create, share, and play user-generated games and experiences. **Operation** is defined as hosting, providing, distributing, or otherwise making Roblox accessible to users located within the United States. **Access provider** is defined as any internet service provider, app store, hosting service, or platform that distributes, hosts, or otherwise provides access to Roblox.

SECTION 3. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC), in coordination with the Department of Justice (DOJ) shall oversee and enforce this legislation .The FCC shall require internet service providers and app stores operating in the United States to remove, block, or otherwise prevent access to Roblox within 100 days of this bill's passage. Roblox Corporation shall cease all operations in the United States and block access for U.S.-based users within 100 days of this bill's passage. After the 100 days, any continued operation of Roblox within the United States shall be considered a violation of federal law. Any entity knowingly providing access to Roblox after the 100 days shall be fined up to \$50,000 per violation. Repeated violations may result in additional civil and criminal penalties as determined by the DOJ.

SECTION 4. This legislation shall take effect 100 days after its passage

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Make States to use 75% Nuclear Energy

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** All states must use at least seventy five percent nuclear energy.

4 **SECTION 2.** Nuclear energy will be defined as energy released as part
5 of either a controlled nuclear fission or nuclear fusion reaction within a
6 power plant, maintained and regulated by a US state.

7 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Energy in coordination with the Nuclear
8 Regulatory Commission shall develop guidelines for this law once it is
9 in place. The Department of Energy will be overseeing this law to make every
10 state use seventy five percent nuclear energy.

11 **SECTION 4.** States that meet these nuclear energy benchmarks will be eligible
12 for federal infrastructure grants.

13 **SECTION 5.** Congress will provide up to fifty billion dollars annually from
15 2027-2040 to support nuclear energy research, nuclear infrastructure,
16 and nuclear safety improvements.

17 **SECTION 6.** This bill will be put in effect on January 1st, 2027. All of the states
18 must use 75% nuclear power by 2040.

19 **SECTION 7.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared
20 null and void.

A Bill to Plant Two Trees Each Time One is Cut Down

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** Whenever a tree is cut down in the USA, two trees should be
3 be planted in its place.

4 **SECTION 2.** A tree is defined as a plant with a trunk that supports
5 photosynthetic leaves or branches at some distance above the
6 ground. Planting is defined as the act of putting plants into the
7 ground so that they will grow. Cutting a tree down is defined as the
8 process of severing a standing tree's trunk at its base with a sharp tool.

9 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Agriculture will enforce this
10 legislation with a fine of \$5,000 to \$1,000,000, and/or revoking of a tree
11 removal permit depending on the severity of the crime.

12 **SECTION 4.** This bill will take effect immediately upon passage.

13 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared
14 null and void

A Bill to Abolish Capital Punishment at the Federal Level

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE
ASSEMBLED:

2 SECTION 1. Capital punishment, also known as the
death penalty, is hereby
3 abolished as punishment for any crime at the federal
level.

4 SECTION 2. Any individuals currently awaiting execution
for federal crimes
5 shall have their sentences immediately commuted to life
in prison without
6 possibility of parole.

7 SECTION 3. This legislation shall be overseen by the
Department of Justice.

8 SECTION 4. This legislation shall take effect
immediately upon passage.

9 SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are
hereby declared
10 null and void.

A Bill to Redirect Surplus U.S. Food Waste to Combat Global Hunger

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. The United States shall implement a program to redirect surplus food waste from farms, manufacturers, and retailers to other nations who are experiencing severe food insecurity through a streamlined aid distribution system.

SECTION 2. Surplus food waste shall be defined as excess, safe-to-consume food which is discarded due to oversupply, cosmetic imperfections, or nearing expiration but still meeting USDA food safety standards.

SECTION 3. The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) shall oversee the processing, collection, and distribution of surplus food.

A. Incentives include a 30% federal tax credit based on the food's fair market value. In addition, food donors receive liability protections if the food causes harm.

B. A logistics framework shall be established in coordination with international aid organizations to facilitate efficient delivery to recipient nations.

SECTION 4. This legislation shall take effect July 1, 2027.

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to End Seed Patent Protections

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. The US federal government will end the practice of granting intellectual property rights protections, including patents, trademarks, and copyrights, for seeds, seed DNA strands, transgenic seed organisms, and seed biomes.

SECTION 2. The US Department of Agriculture, along with the Office of the US Trade Representative, will oversee the following provisions.

A. Existing patent protections will be allowed to expire at the end of the patent period 8 with the following exceptions:

1. Farmers will be allowed to germinate seeds for replanting from existing crops without paying patent holders fees for those seeds.
2. Natural cross-pollination of DNA in crops will no longer be considered patent violations.

B. Any seed patents issued between the passage of this legislation and its implementation date will be limited to 10 years.

C. The Office of the US Trade Representative will lobby the World Trade Organization to 16 remove seed patent protections from the TRIPS (Trade-Related Aspects of International Property Rights) Agreement.

SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2026. All laws in conflict with this legislation 19 are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Discourage Social Media Use Among Elected Officials

WHEREAS Politicians at all levels have become over reliant on social media to argue and communicate policy proposals online to niche audiences and platforms; and

WHEREAS Disruption in the social media space among Twitter, Facebook, TikTok, and other prominent social media platforms has made credibility and trust a matter of public concern; and

WHEREAS The lack of fact-checking and mediation among nearly all social media platforms have become inconsistent with the virtues of open communication with the public; and

WHEREAS Political figures of all types spend disproportionate time on social media platforms, either by themselves or their designees, time that could be better spent governing and communicating through other channels; and

WHEREAS Members of this Congress have proposed to ban TikTok from all government phones due to concerns over data privacy; therefore be it

RESOLVED by the Congress here assembled that all holders of political office (federal, state, county, municipal, and local) remove social media apps from their phones; and

FURTHER RESOLVED that Congressional and other political leaders will vow to discontinue their use of public social media accounts so that public deliberation, policy implementation, and enforcement no longer take place online but are a part of public debate on the floors of their respective legislative bodies only.
