

A BILL TO ESTABLISH A NATIONAL AUTOMATION TRANSITION FUND #1

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1 **SECTION 1.** A National Automation Transition Fund (NATF) shall be established to
2 provide financial help, retraining, and relocation aid for those who lost their jobs
3 due to automation. Large Businesses replacing 3% or more of their staff through
4 automation annually shall be subject to a tax of 0.5-2% of their income, based on
5 the level of displacement.

6 A. Automation is defined as the use of robotics, software, or AI that substantially
7 replaces human labor.

8 B. Large Businesses are defined as businesses that employ more than 500 people.

9 **SECTION 2.** Employers investing in certified retraining and support programs will
10 will receive up to 20% of the money contributed back.

11 A.) The Department of Labor will decide the legitimacy of a program.

12 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Labor will oversee all parts of this legislation and
13 publish annual reports of automation trends.

14 **SECTION 4.** This legislation will go into effect in the next fiscal year. All laws in
15 conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

**A BILL TO REQUIRE AMERICAN COMPANIES TO PRODUCE AT LEAST 60% OF THEIR PRODUCTS IN
THE U.S. #2**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. All American based companies that produce material in foreign manufacturing plants along with U.S. manufacturing plants must produce at least 60% of their sold material inside of the United States in order to increase domestic sales and production.

SECTION 2. A. Let “American based companies” be defined as commercial businesses that are incorporated in the United States and/or have their primary headquarters there.

B. Let “foreign manufacturing plants” be defined as production facilities a company establishes or contracts with in a country other than its home country to produce goods

SECTION 3. The Department of Commerce (DOC) will oversee the implementation of this bill

A. The Department of Commerce will monitor the amount of product/material American based companies that also produce overseas, manufacture.

B. If a company violates this legislation, they will be fined the amount of profit they made from the excess international sales as in accordance with their sales reports

SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2026

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

**A BILL TO BAN THE USE OF GENETICALLY MODIFIED ORGANISMS (GMOs) IN US
FOODS AND GOODS TO PROTECT THE HEALTH AND WELL-BEING OF AMERICAN
CITIZENS #3**

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 Article I: The usage and production of goods that contain GMOs, will be banned
3 and unavailable for sale. It shall be the responsibility of major biotech
4 companies to ensure the purity of their products before distribution to
5 farmers and industrial facilities.

6 Article II: A GMO is any genetically modified organism whose genetic material,
7 (DNA) has been altered using genetic engineering in ways that do not
8 occur naturally through mating or traditional cross-breeding. These
9 organisms are typically sold to farmers raising crops or livestock and
10 industries manufacturing, processing, or assembling products.

11 Article III: The implementation of this legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2030.

12 Article IV: The Food and Drug Administration (FDA), the U.S. Department of
13 Agriculture (USDA), and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in
14 a combined effort will enforce this legislation.

15 A. Punishments will include fines ranging from \$30,000 - \$300,000 per
16 incident of offense and depending on the magnitude of the offense

17 B. Contaminated crops and products will be confiscated and destroyed.

18 Article V: All other laws in conflict with this new policy shall hereby declared null
19 and void.

A Resolution Clarifying the Authorization for Use of Military Force of September 2001 #4

1-Whereas, the US Congress passed an Authorization for Use of Military Force (AUMF) in
2 September 2001, in the immediate aftermath of the September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks;
3 and

4-Whereas, said Resolution was designed to permit military action against those
5 responsible for the September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks; and

6-Whereas, this AUMF has been used by every President over the past 24+ years to justify
7 US action military and otherwise in over 100 countries, a scope far beyond the original
8 intent of the resolution; and

9-Whereas, the expansion of military activity has been of such extent that it has de facto
10 involved the United States in the activity of war, with troop deployments to hostile
11- zones and requisite financial commitments qualifying as war by any legitimate definition;
12- that indeed, even in commonly-used phrases such as “the War on Terror,” “The War on
13 Drugs,” or “the War in Afghanistan,” the US has come to accept this situation as war, both
14- in general and in policy discussions; all without any clear sense of purpose or notion of
15- what war goals should be accomplished, or what would constitute a “war end;” and

16-Whereas, the US Constitution, in Article I, Section 8, grants to the US Congress the sole
17- authority “To declare war” and furthermore “To make all laws which shall be necessary
18- and proper” for carrying out such authority, the desires, interests, intents or actions of the
19- Executive or other branches of government notwithstanding;

20-Therefore Be It Resolved By This Student Congress Here Assembled that the
21-Authorization for Use of Military Force of September 2001 be understood to apply only to
22- actors involved in the events directly related to the events of that time; and that any and
23- all current or future military actions that have been or are planned to be undertaken under
24- the claimed authority of said previous resolution be strictly subject to Constitutionally-
25- authorized powers such as but not limited to those involving US treaty obligations and/or
26- the declaration of war authority, and any and all legislation necessary and proper to the
27- enactment of such activities.

A Bill to Provide Need-Based College Tuition Assistance For Four-Year Degrees #5

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2. Article I: The United States Government shall provide need-based tuition
3. assistance to students pursuing a four-year undergraduate degree at an
4. accredited
5. college or university by covering a portion of educational costs.
6. Article II: A. The amount of tuition assistance provided shall be determined based on
7. the income of the student's parent(s) or legal guardian(s) in relation to the
8. federally established poverty line.
9. B. For dependant students, eligibility shall be calculated using parent or
10. guardian household income.
11. C. Any additional years, beyond the first four academic years of
12. undergraduate education, shall be the financial responsibility of the
13. student.
14. D. If a student's parent/guardian income is 30% above the federal poverty
15. line, the federal government shall cover 70% of tuition costs. For each
16. additional percentage point increase in income above the poverty line, the
17. percentage of tuition covered shall decrease proportionally.
18. E. If a student's parent/guardian income is equal to or below the federal
19. poverty line, the federal government shall cover 100% of tuition costs.
20. F. If a student's parent/guardian income is 100% or more above the
federal
21. poverty line, the federal government shall provide no tuition assistance,
22. and the full cost shall be the responsibility of the student.
23. G. In the cases where a student has no parent/guardian, the federal
24. government shall cover 100% of tuition costs for a four-year
25. undergraduate degree.
26. Article III: This program shall be funded with an initial allocation of \$100 million per
27. fiscal year.
28. A. The budget for this bill shall be reviewed and adjusted by Congress
29. each year to ensure adequate funding.
30. Article IV: This legislation shall be enforced by the Department of Education.
31. Article V: All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

An Act to Require Profit Contributions from True Crime Media to Victims and Advocacy Organizations

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1 **Article I:** All producers of true crime media generating annual profits exceeding \$100,000 shall be
2 required to donate a minimum of 10% of those profits. Donations shall be distributed to
3 victims, survivors, or victim advocacy groups directly connected to or relevant to the
4 crimes portrayed. If direct victims or survivors cannot be identified or contacted, funds
5 shall be donated to nationally recognized victim advocacy organizations.

6 **Article II:** *True crime media* shall be defined as any podcast, documentary, television series, film,
7 or digital content primarily focused on real criminal acts, investigations, or perpetrators.
8 *Profits* shall be defined as net revenue earned after production and distribution costs.
9 *Victims* shall be defined as individuals directly harmed by the crimes depicted, or their
10 immediate family members if the victim is deceased. *Victim advocacy groups* shall be
11 defined as registered nonprofit organizations that provide legal, financial, psychological,
12 or social support to crime victims and survivors.

13 **Article III:** The Department of Justice (DOJ) shall oversee enforcement of this act. Producers shall
14 submit annual profit disclosures and proof of donation to the DOJ. Failure to comply
15 shall result in fines equivalent to twice the required donation amount.

16 **Article IV:** Administrative costs shall be covered by fines collected under this act. No additional
17 federal funding shall be required.

18 **Article V:** This act shall take effect one year after passage. The DOJ shall publish compliance
19 guidelines within six months of enactment.
