**A RESOLUTION TO PROVIDE HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS WITH

1     **WHEREAS:** Many high school students are reluctant to talk with their guidance counselors  
2                     about their possible mental health concerns, and  
3     **WHEREAS:** Most high school counselors have a high caseload and limited time to meet with all  
4                     the students who would like to have personal discussions, and  
5     **WHEREAS:** Statistics show that even in 2026 the pandemic is still having a negative impact on  
6                     high school students as well as school districts,  
7     **Therefore, Be It Resolved by this PHSSL Student Congress here assembled that**  
8                     school districts hire Telehealth mental health professionals who will have regular  
9                     schedules seven days a week for students to book sessions; and  
10    **Be It Further Resolved, that:** This resource will be made known to students not only at their  
11                     respective school but also on the school district’s student website.

**A RESOLUTION TO AMEND THE CONSTITUTION TO ENACT TERM LIMITS FOR CONGRESS**

1     **RESOLVED,** By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the following article is proposed as an  
2                   amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which shall be valid to all intents and  
3                   purposes as part of the Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the  
4                   several states within seven years from the date of its submission by the Congress:

5                                   **ARTICLE- XXVIII**

6                   **SECTION 1:** No individual shall serve more than five (5) Terms in the United States  
7                                   House of Representatives.

8                                   Any terms served prior to the ratification of this amendment shall not be  
9                                   counted toward the five-term limit.

10                  **SECTION 2:** No individual shall serve more than three (3) terms in the United States  
11                                   Senate.

12                                  Any terms served prior to the ratification of this amendment shall not be  
13                                  counted toward the three-term limit.

14                  **SECTION 3:** This article shall apply to all individuals elected to Congress after the date  
15                                  of ratification of this amendment.

**A BILL TO REFORM CAMPAIGN FINANCE**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1       **SECTION 1.** To heighten the authenticity of presidential campaigns, this bill will reform the following:  
2                   any and all undisclosed funding, “Super PACs”, and “Straw donors”

3                   A. “Super PACs” shall be defined as organizations that can raise an unlimited amount of  
4                   money from individuals, corporations, or unions to advocate for or against federal  
5                   candidates.

6                   B. “Straw donors” shall be defined as an individual or entity who illegally makes a  
7                   political contribution on behalf of another individual, using said individual's money.

8       **SECTION 2.** Undisclosed funding shall be abolished as contributions towards a federal campaign shall  
9                   be a public record on the Department of Justice’s government website.

10                   “Super PACs” shall be regulated by preventing its management of being related or  
11                   affiliated with either candidate and restore contribution limits. This will be done by  
12                   removing said individual from said Super PAC.

13                   “Straw donors” shall face penalties through the Department of Justice by active  
14                   investigation of campaign finance laws, imposing a fine of \$250,000 to be directed to the  
15                   Department of Justice.

16                   The Department of Justice shall oversee the mandate of this bill by utilizing the corrective  
17                   measures stated above.

18       **SECTION 3.** Any funding that may be needed towards this bill will be allocated from other government  
19                   programs deemed by congress to be overfunded. This bill shall take effect directly after  
20                   passage.

21       **SECTION 4.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

**A BILL TO FUND HUMANITARIAN AID TO PROVIDE DIRECT RELIEF  
TO THE CITIZENS OF GAZA**

1     **WHEREAS,** the ongoing humanitarian crisis in Gaza has left civilians without adequate access to food,  
2                     clean water, shelter, and medical care; and  
3     **WHEREAS,** international organizations have consistently documented the urgent need for increased  
4                     humanitarian assistance to protect innocent lives; and  
5     **WHEREAS,** instability in the region threatens broader international peace and security if left  
6                     unaddressed; and  
7     **WHEREAS,** the United States has a moral obligation and a longstanding history of providing  
8                     humanitarian relief in times of crisis; now, therefore, be it  
9     **RESOLVED,** by the Congress here assembled, that the United States federal government should allocate  
10                    \$1.5 billion in humanitarian aid to be administered through reputable international  
11                    organizations and non-governmental agencies, including but not limited to Doctors  
12                    Without Borders, UNICEF, and UNRWA, to provide direct relief to civilians in Gaza; and,  
13                    be it further  
14     **RESOLVED,** that such aid shall be directed exclusively toward humanitarian purposes, including but not  
15                    limited to food, medical supplies, clean water, and shelter, and shall not be used to support  
16                    military or militant operations.

**A BILL TO PROTECT REPRODUCTIVE FREEDOM**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

1     **SECTION 1.** The United States Constitution shall be amended to recognize and protect an  
2                   individual’s right to reproductive freedom, including the right to make personal  
3                   decisions regarding reproductive healthcare.

4     **SECTION 2.** Reproductive freedom shall include, but not be limited to, access to contraception,  
5                   abortion, prenatal care, and childbirth, without interference from any State.

6     **SECTION 3.** No State shall prohibit or impose burdens access to abortion care prior to fetal  
7                   viability. After fetal viability, a State may regulate abortion only when such  
8                   regulations include exceptions that allow a licensed medical professional to provide  
9                   abortion care when, in such professional’s medical judgement, it is necessary to  
10                  protect the life or physical health of the pregnant individual.

11    **SECTION 4.** This amendment shall take effect upon ratification in accordance with the  
12                  Constitutional amendment procedures of the United States. All laws in conflict  
13                  with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

14    **SECTION 5.** Any individual whose rights are violated under this amendment shall have standing  
15                  to bring civil action in court. Courts shall have the authority to declare  
16                  unconstitutional any law or government action that violates this amendment and to  
17                  issue injunctive relief preventing its enforcement.

**SAME DAY VOTER REGISTRATION IN PA**

1     **WHEREAS:** Same Day Voter Registration does away with registration deadlines that  
2                   disenfranchise potential voters by placing deadlines 30 days before Election Day,  
3                   and

4     **WHEREAS:** Same Day Voter Registration also fixes inaccuracies in voter rolls by allowing  
5                   eligible voters to use Same Day Registration to correct outdated voter registration  
6                   records at polling places often due to a name change or change of address; and

7     **WHEREAS:** With Same Day Voter Registration there is far less need for provisional ballot use,  
8                   which will thereby speed the process of recounts and audits, saving taxpayers in the  
9                   long run, and assuring voters that their votes will be counted; and

9.   **WHEREAS:** Same Day Voter Registration will increase voter participation as not being  
10                  registered to vote is the biggest impediment to voting. Same Day Registration has  
11                  been proven to boost voter turnout in states that have it; e.g. NH, Colorado,  
12                  Montana, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Maine; and

13   **WHEREAS:** Same Day Voter Registration is the best stop-gap solution to solve errors in the  
14                  registration process, fix inaccuracies in voter rolls, reduce provisional ballots, and  
15                  increase voter participation.

16   **THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** by this PHSSL Student Congress here assembled:

17   That the Pennsylvania legislature should permit Same Day Voter Registration.

**A BILL TO MODERNIZE AND REPAIR CRITICAL BRIDGE INFRASTRUCTURE IN  
PENNSYLVANIA**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS ASSEMBLED THAT:

1     **SECTION 1. Purpose.** The purpose of this legislation is to reduce the number of structurally  
2                   deficient bridges in Pennsylvania, improve public safety, and support domestic  
3                   manufacturing and job growth.

4     **SECTION 2. Definitions.**

5                   A. “Structurally deficient bridge” refers to bridges classified as such by the Federal  
6                   Highway Administration (FHWA).

7                   B. “Modernization upgrades” include smart traffic systems and safety  
8                   improvements.

9     **SECTION 3. Provisions.**

10                  A. The federal government shall allocate \$5 billion over five fiscal years to  
11                  Pennsylvania for bridge repair or replacement.

12                  B. Funds shall prioritize: Major economic corridors and interstate highways.  
13                  Rural bridges critical to emergency and agricultural transport.

14                  C. At least 70% of steel and iron used in funded projects must be domestically  
15                  produced.

16                  D. The Department of Transportation shall oversee implementation and submit  
17                  annual progress reports to Congress.

18     **SECTION 4. Funding.** Funding shall be appropriated from the Federal Highway Trust Fund and  
19                  existing federal infrastructure allocations.

20     **SECTION 6. Effective Date.** This legislation shall take effect at the beginning of the next fiscal  
21                  year following passage.

**A BILL TO CEASE MILITARY ACTIVITY IN THE MIDDLE EAST**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1       **SECTION 1.** The United States of America will now cease all military action in the Middle East:

2                   A. Military Action is defined as any action taken by the U.S Department of War in the

3                   Middle East, including but not limited to, missile strikes, sending troops to the area, and

4                   offering military support in the area

5                   B. The Middle East is defined as the countries, Turkiye, Iran, Egypt, Israel, Jordan, Syria,

6                   Iraq, Palestine, Saudi Arabia, Yemen, Oman, UAE, Qatar, Bahrain, Kuwait, and

7                   Afghanistan

8       **SECTION 2.** All strictly humanitarian aid is permitted under this legislation:

9                   A. Humanitarian aid is defined as sending food, medical supplies, and non-militants to

10                  support a nation or group of people.

11       **SECTION 3.** This large-scale military pullout will be orchestrated by the DoW (Department of War) and

12                  will need to be accomplished 2 years after the passage of this bill

13       **SECTION 4.** All funding needed for this legislation will be provided by the DoW's yearly budget

14       **SECTION 5.** This Legislation will go into effect immediately upon passage. All laws in conflict with

15                  this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

**A BILL TO EXPAND RURAL TELEHEALTH ACCESS IN PENNSYLVANIA**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS ASSEMBLED THAT:

1     **SECTION 1. Purpose.** The purpose of this legislation is to improve healthcare access in rural  
2                   Pennsylvania by expanding telehealth services, stabilizing rural providers, and  
3                   strengthening broadband infrastructure.

4     **SECTION 2. Definitions.**

5                   A. “Rural area” shall be defined according to the U.S. Census Bureau  
6                   classification.

7                   B. “Telehealth” refers to the delivery of healthcare services through  
8                   telecommunications technology.

9     **SECTION 3. Provisions.**

10                  A. The federal government shall allocate \$2 billion over five fiscal years to expand  
11                  broadband infrastructure in underserved rural areas of Pennsylvania.

12                  B. Medicare and Medicaid reimbursement rates shall be expanded to permanently  
13                  cover telehealth services at parity with in-person visits for rural providers.

14                  C. Healthcare professionals who practice in rural Pennsylvania for at least three  
15                  years shall be eligible for federal student loan forgiveness of up to \$50,000.

16                  D. The Department of Health and Human Services shall oversee implementation  
17                  and submit annual progress reports to Congress.

18     **SECTION 4. Funding.** Funding shall be appropriated from existing federal healthcare and  
19                  infrastructure allocations.

20     **SECTION 5. EFFECTIVE DATE.** This legislation shall take effect at the beginning of the next  
21                  fiscal year following passage.

*House Session 1 - #1*

**AN ACT TO PROHIBIT SPAM AND ROBOCALLING PRACTICES**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS ASSEMBLED THAT:

1     **SECTION 1. Definitions.**

2             a) Spam calling shall be defined as any unsolicited telephone call, including  
3             robocalls, made for advertising, fundraising, or scam purposes without the prior  
4             express consent of the recipient.

5             b) Robocall shall be defined as a call made using an automatic dialing system or  
6             prerecorded voice message.

7             c) Express consent shall be defined as written or recorded permission knowingly  
8             given by the recipient.

9     **SECTION 2. Prohibition**

10            a) Spam calling is hereby banned nationwide.

11            b) No individual, corporation, or organization may place a spam call to any  
12            residential or mobile telephone number.

13            c) Exceptions shall be made for emergency alerts, government notifications, and  
14            calls from schools or healthcare providers directly related to public safety.

15    **SECTION 3. Enforcement**

16            a) The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) shall be responsible for  
17            enforcing this act.

18            b) Violators shall be subject to fines of up to \$10,000 per unlawful call.

19            c) Repeat offenders may face increased fines and criminal penalties, including  
20            imprisonment of up to two years.

21    **SECTION 4. Funding**

22            a) Enforcement shall be funded through fines collected from violators of this act.

23            b) Additional funding, if necessary, shall be allocated from the FCC's existing  
24            budget.

25    **SECTION 5. Implementation**

26            a) This act shall take effect six months after passage.

27            b) The FCC shall conduct a public awareness campaign to inform consumers and  
28            businesses of the new regulations.

**A RESOLUTION TO ENCOURAGE THE INTEGRATION OF MINORITY HISTORY INTO  
PENNSYLVANIA HIGH SCHOOL CURRICULA**

- 1     **WHEREAS:** History education in the United States currently prioritizes Eurocentric narratives  
2             that focus mainly on the contributions of white male figures; and
- 3     **WHEREAS:** This narrow perspective excludes or minimizes the significant contributions of  
4             women, African Americans, Latino individuals, LGBTQ+ persons, and other  
5             marginalized groups which have been fundamental to the development of the  
6             Nation; and
- 7     **WHEREAS:** The teaching of these perspectives provides students with an incomplete historical  
8             record, fosters social alienation among minorities, and reinforces outdated  
9             hierarchies; and
- 10    **WHEREAS:** A comprehensive understanding of history is essential for developing the cultural  
11            competency and critical thinking skills required for citizens to succeed in an  
12            increasingly diverse global economy,
- 13    **THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:** That the Congress here assembled shall recommend that  
14            the Pennsylvania Department of Education establish a state framework for  
15            inclusive history standards; and, be it
- 16    **FURTHER RESOLVED, THAT:** The state government shall incentivize the adoption of these  
17            standards by prioritizing grant funding for schools that demonstrate a commitment  
18            to a diverse and multi-perspective social studies curriculum.

7                   B. “Telehealth” refers to the delivery of healthcare services through

20     **SECTION 5. EFFECTIVE DATE.** This legislation shall take effect at the beginning of the next  
21                  fiscal year following passage.

**A BILL TO PROTECT THE SANCTITY OF THE HOME AND RESTORE JUDICIAL OVERSIGHT**

- 1     **WHEREAS,** The Fourth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States affirms the right of  
2                   the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects against unreasonable  
3                   searches and seizures, and conditions the exercise of governmental power upon judicial  
4                   oversight; and
- 5     **WHEREAS,** The home has long occupied a unique place in the common law as a sanctuary deserving  
6                   of heightened legal protection; and
- 7     **WHEREAS,** Administrative warrants and civil enforcement authorities were historically designed to  
8                   facilitate regulatory compliance, not to function as substitutes for judicially issued warrants  
9                   authorizing entry into private dwellings; and
- 10    **WHEREAS,** modern governance has expanded the scope and frequency of administrative enforcement  
11                  actions, increasing the risk that executive convenience may erode constitutional  
12                  boundaries; and
- 13    **WHEREAS,** Congress has a responsibility to clarify the limits of administrative authority while  
14                  preserving the government’s ability to respond to genuine public safety and regulatory  
15                  needs; now, therefore, in recognition of the moral and constitutional imperative of this  
16                  moment,
- 17    **BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:**
- 18    **SECTION 1.** An administrative warrant, order, or detainer shall not constitute authority to enter a  
19                  private dwelling, nor shall it be represented as such by any federal officer or agency.
- 20    **SECTION 2.** Evidence obtained through entry into a private dwelling in violation of this Act shall be  
21                  inadmissible in any federal civil or criminal proceeding.
- 22    **SECTION 3.** No officer, employee, or agent of the United States may enter a private dwelling without:  
23                  A. a judicial warrant issued by a court of competent jurisdiction;  
24                  B. the voluntary, informed, and contemporaneous consent of an occupant with authority  
25                  over the premises; or  
26                  C. exigent circumstances as recognized under the Fourth Amendment.
- 27    **SECTION 4.** For purposes of this Act:  
28                  A. “Administrative warrant” means any warrant, order, detainer, or authorization issued by  
29                  an executive agency or officer pursuant to statute or regulation, and not issued by a  
30                  court of competent jurisdiction.  
31                  B. “Dwelling” means a residence or home in which a person has a reasonable expectation  
32                  of privacy, including attached structures.  
33                  C. “Judicial warrant” means a warrant issued by a judge or magistrate upon review of a  
34                  sworn affidavit.
- 35    **SECTION 5.** Nothing in this Act shall be construed to:  
36                  A. limit inspections of commercial premises conducted pursuant to lawful regulatory  
37                  authority;  
38                  B. restrict the execution of judicial warrants;  
39                  C. alter existing exigent-circumstances doctrine; or  
40                  D. diminish lawful enforcement actions conducted outside a private dwelling.
- 41    **SECTION 6.** This legislation will take effect 90 days after enactment. All laws in conflict with this  
42                  legislation are hereby declared null and void.

*House Session 2 - #2*

**A BILL TO ENACT A TERM LIMIT TO US CONGRESS MEMBERS**

**BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:**

1     **SECTION 1.** United States Congress Members shall be set to a 5 term limit.

2     **SECTION 2.** A “term” shall be defined as a full term of office served by a member of the United  
3             States Congress.

4             This bill applies to members of both the United States House of Representatives \  
5             and The United States Senate.

6     **SECTION 3.** No individual shall serve more than five (5) Terms in the United States House of  
7             Representatives.

8             No individual shall serve more than five (5) terms in the United States Senate.

9             Any terms served prior to the ratification of this bill shall not be counted toward the  
10            five-term limit.

11    **SECTION 4.** The term limits that be established by this bill shall apply prospectively, beginning  
12            with the first congressional term following ratification.

13            Any terms served prior to this bill shall not be counted towards the five-term limit.

14    **SECTION 5.** The Federal Election Commission Shall be responsible for the provisions of this  
15            act. Any candidate who exceeds the term limit outlined in section 3 shall be  
16            deemed ineligible to appear on federal election ballots.

*House Session 2 - #3*

**A BILL TO CEASE MILITARY ACTIVITY IN THE MIDDLE EAST**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1       **SECTION 1.** The United States of America will now cease all military action in the Middle East:

2               A. Military Action is defined as any action taken by the U.S Department of War in the  
3               Middle East, including but not limited to, missile strikes, sending troops to the area, and  
4               offering military support in the area

5               B. The Middle East is defined as the countries, Turkiye, Iran, Egypt, Israel, Jordan, Syria,  
6               Iraq, Palestine, Saudi Arabia, Yemen, Oman, UAE, Qatar, Bahrain, Kuwait, and  
7               Afghanistan

8       **SECTION 2.** All strictly humanitarian aid is permitted under this legislation:

9               A. Humanitarian aid is defined as sending food, medical supplies, and non-militants to  
10              support a nation or group of people.

11       **SECTION 3.** This large-scale military pullout will be orchestrated by the DoW (Department of War) and  
12              will need to be accomplished 2 years after the passage of this bill

13       **SECTION 4.** All funding needed for this legislation will be provided by the DoW's yearly budget

14       **SECTION 5.** This Legislation will go into effect immediately upon passage. All laws in conflict with  
15              this legislation are hereby declared null and void.



*House Session 2 - #5*

**A BILL TO OUTLAW REPLACING THE ORIGINAL PRESIDENTIAL AND FOUNDING FATHERS' FACES FEATURED ON UNITED STATES DOLLAR BILLS WITH NEW PRESIDENTIAL OR OTHER FACES**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1       **SECTION 1.** In order to keep a tradition of the United States and to uphold the people featured on  
2                   the U.S. dollar bills, no person is permitted to change the faces of the people featured  
3                   on the original bills with newer presidential or other persons' faces.

4       **SECTION 2.** The current people featured on the U.S. dollar bills include George Washington (\$1);  
5                   Thomas Jefferson (\$2); Abraham Lincoln (\$5); Alexander Hamilton (\$10); Andrew  
6                   Jackson, which will be scheduled to be replaced by Harriet Tubman in 2030 (\$20);  
7                   Ulysses S. Grant (\$50); and Benjamin Franklin (\$100). "New" presidential or other  
8                   faces include anyone not previously listed.

9       **SECTION 3.** The U.S. Department of the Treasury will oversee enforcement of this legislation along  
10                  with the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, which will be responsible for the  
11                  production of these bills.

12                A. \$5 million will be used to manufacture these bills if needed.

13       **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2030. All laws in conflict with this  
14                  legislation are hereby declared null and void.

**A RESOLUTION TO EXPAND ACCESS TO INSURANCE COVERAGE FOR GLP-1  
MEDICATIONS**

1     **WHEREAS**, obesity affects over 40% of adults in the United States and is a major risk factor for  
2             chronic diseases including type 2 diabetes, heart disease, and stroke; and  
3     **WHEREAS**, GLP-1 receptor agonist medications have been clinically shown to support significant  
4             and sustain weight loss, improve metabolic health, and reduce obesity-related  
5             complications; and  
6     **WHEREAS**, many public and private insurance plans either exclude GLP-1 medications from  
7             coverage or impose restrictive prior authorization requirements, making access  
8             dependent on income rather than medical need; and  
9     **WHEREAS**, lack of insurance coverage for evidence-based obesity treatments exacerbates health  
10            disparities, particularly among low-income populations and communities of color; and  
11     **WHEREAS**, preventative and early intervention treatments for obesity can reduce long-term  
12            healthcare spending by decreasing the prevalence of costly chronic illnesses; now,  
13            therefore,  
14     **BE IT RESOLVED**, that the United States federal government should require all federally regulated  
15            public health insurance programs, including Medicare and Medicaid, to provide  
16            coverage for FDA-approved GLP-1 medications when prescribed for the treatment of  
17            obesity or obesity-related conditions; and,  
18     **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that private health insurance plans regulated under federal law  
19            should be required to include coverage for GLP-1 medications as part of their essential  
20            health benefits; and,  
21     **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Department of Health and Human Services should  
22            establish standardized, evidence-based prescribing guidelines to prevent misuse while  
23            ensuring patients with legitimate medical need maintain access; and  
24     **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that funding for expanded coverage should be offset through  
25            long-term healthcare savings generated by reduced rates of chronic disease and  
26            preventable hospitalizations.

**A RESOLUTION TO IMPROVE THE EFFICIENCY OF STATE-OWNED VEHICLES**

1     **WHEREAS**, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania is facing severe revenue shortfalls for the  
2                     foreseeable future; and  
3     **WHEREAS**, the Commonwealth owns or leases thousands of vehicles for a wide variety of official  
4                     business; and  
5     **WHEREAS**, the Commonwealth could realize significant cost savings from reducing its use of  
6                     gasoline to power its fleet of official vehicles; and  
7     **WHEREAS**, gas-electric hybrid, fully electric, and compressed natural gas technologies have made  
8                     great progress to power vehicles of all sizes more effectively; now, therefore, be it  
9     **RESOLVED**, That the Student Congress here assembled requires all official vehicles owned or  
10                    leased by the Commonwealth to be powered by hybrid, natural gas, or electric  
11                    technologies as is appropriate for the use of the vehicles by the end of the fiscal year  
12                    2027.
