

A Bill to Ban HOA Enforcement of Fine Revenue

1. **BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT**
2. **SECTION 1:** Fine revenue enforced by a Homeowner's Association (HOA) be banned in
3. All HOA regulated communities.
4. **SECTION 2:** Homeowners Association shall be defined as an organization of
5. homeowners within a defined community that collectively manages shared
6. property, amenities and community rules.
7. HOA fines are defined as financial penalties issued by a homeowners association
8. when a resident fails to comply with community rules
9. **SECTION 3:** This legislation will be overseen by the Department of Housing and
10. Urban Development and the Federal Trade Commission.
11. **SECTION 4:** This legislation will go into effect at the beginning of the next fiscal
12. year.
13. **SECTION 5:** All legislation in conflict will be considered null and void.

A Resolution to Adopt the District of Columbia Voting Rights Constitutional Amendment

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2. RESOLVED, By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the following
3. article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States,
4. which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when
5. ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within seven
6. years from the date of its submission by the Congress:

ARTICLE 28

8. SECTION 1. For purposes of representation in the Congress, election of the
9. President and Vice President, and Article 5 of this Constitution, the District
10. constituting the seat of government of the United States shall be treated as
11. though it were a State.

12. SECTION 2. The exercise of the rights and powers conferred under this article
13. shall be by the people of the District constituting the seat of government, and
14. as shall be provided by the Congress.

15. SECTION 3. The twenty-third article of amendment to the Constitution
16. of the United States is hereby repealed.

A Bill to Prohibit Large-Scale Atmospheric Geoengineering to Protect Public Health

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1. **SECTION 1.** The United States shall prohibit any large-scale atmospheric
2. geoengineering projects conducted by corporations or individuals in order
3. to protect public health.
4. **SECTION 2.** A. “Large-Scale” shall mean of a significant quantity, or enough to
5. be felt or perceived in a specific area.
6. B. “Atmospheric Geoengineering” shall mean the intentional human
7. intervention into the Earth’s climate, including the atmosphere, with the
8. goal of producing a significant reduction of temperature, of at least 0.1
9. degrees celsius. This includes carbon dioxide removal (CDR), Solar Radiation
10. Modification (SRM), and other forms of weather modification.
11. **SECTION 3.** Any entity or corporation violating this Act shall be subject to a
12. civil penalty no less than \$1,000,000 per day of violation, or three times the cost of the
13. unauthorized project, whichever is greater.
14. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) will enforce this Act, as well
15. as enforce any civil penalties after passing.
16. B. The Department of Justice (DOJ) will oversee proper enforcement.
17. **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2027. All laws in
18. conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Prevent Public Figures From Using Prediction Markets

1. **BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:**
2. **SECTION 1.** Public figures will no longer be allowed to access prediction markets.
3. **SECTION 2. A.** “Public figures” shall be defined as any figure that has a heavy
4. presence in the public eye, including but not limited to celebrities, athletes, and
5. politicians.
6. **B.** “Prediction markets” shall be defined as a regulated market where people buy and sell
7. contracts tied to the outcome of future events, such as elections, economic data, or sports.
8. **SECTION 3. A.** This legislation will be enforced and overseen by the Commodity
9. Futures Trading Commission (CFTC).
10. **B.** Prediction markets will be required by this legislation to ID people, to ensure that no
11. public figures are accessing them.
12. **C.** For every violation of this piece of legislation — both in regard to public figures
13. getting access to prediction markets — as well as in regard to refusal to ID users of
14. prediction markets, the market shall be fined \$100,000 per infraction.
15. **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect by FY27.
16. **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are declared null and void.

A Resolution to Address the Crisis in Haiti

1 **WHEREAS**, Haiti is currently experiencing a severe humanitarian and
2 security crisis marked by political instability, gang violence, and the
3 collapse of public safety; and

4 **WHEREAS**, this crisis has spread nationwide, disrupting access to food,
5 healthcare, clean water, and preventing humanitarian organizations from
6 safely delivering aid to civilian populations; and

7 **WHEREAS**, Haiti's instability has resulted in widespread regional
8 insecurity, human suffering, and extended challenges to Haitian sovereignty
9 and self-governance, resulting in an overwhelming increase in Asylum
10 seekers, refugees, and migration to the United States on top of an additional
11 drain of over \$1 billion in aid over the past 5 years; now, therefore, be it

12 **Resolved**, that by this Congress that the United States should contribute
13 international efforts, including but not limited to coordination with the
14 United Nations and regional partners to provide humanitarian assistance and
15 security support necessary to stabilize conditions in Haiti; and, be it

16 **FURTHER RESOLVED**, that any United States involvement should focus
17 on the protection of civilians, respect for Haitian sovereignty, and the
18 long-term goal of Haitian-led stability; and, be it

19 **FURTHER RESOLVED**, that Congress shall require monthly reporting
20 and oversight of any United States assistance to provide compliance,
21 transparency, and efficiency.

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Require Periodic Reauthorization of the Use of Military Force

1 **RESOLVED**, By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the
2 following article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the
3 United States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the
4 Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several
5 states within seven years from the date of its submission by the Congress:

6 **ARTICLE --**

7 **SECTION 1:** No authorization for the use of the Armed Forces of the
8 United States in hostilities shall remain in force for more
9 than two years from the date of its enactment. No funds shall
10 be appropriated or expended to continue such hostilities after
11 that date.

12 **SECTION 2:** Congress may reauthorize any such authorization by a
13 recorded vote of each House, and each reauthorization shall
14 be subject to Section 1 of this article. No authorization shall
15 be construed to extend to a nation, organization, or successor
16 entity not named in its text.

17 **SECTION 3:** Nothing in this article shall limit the power of the President
18 to repel a sudden attack upon the United States, its territories,
19 or its Armed Forces, for a period not to exceed sixty days,
20 during which time the President shall report to Congress and
21 seek authorization.

22 **SECTION 4:** The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by
23 appropriate legislation.
