Legislation for Chamber 1

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Eliminate Citizen's United

RESOLVED,

By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the following article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within seven years from the date of its submission by the Congress:

ARTICLE --

SECTION 1a: Citizen's United has allowed very few people to control elections

on the state and national level.

SECTION 1b: Apon approval, this will go to the Supreme Court where further

debate over the constitutionality of Citizen's United will happen.

SECTION 2: The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by

appropriate legislation.

The Transportation and Economic Growth Act of 2015

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. The Federal Gasoline Tax will be raised to forty five cents per gallon. Forty percent of this revenue will continue to go to the federal highway system while sixty percent will go towards public transportation investment.

SECTION 2.

- A. Federal Gasoline tax shall be defined as a tax on every gallon of gasoline sold.
- B. Public Transportation shall be defined as buses, trains, subways, and other forms of transportation that charge set fares, run on fixed routes, and are available to the public.
- **SECTION 3.** The Internal Revenue Service will hereby oversee the enforcement and collection of the Federal Gas Tax and transferring funds to the Department of Transportation.
 - A. The Department of Transportation will be responsible for overseeing and distributing funds to states as necessary to improve their Public Transportation systems.
 - B. States will be required to submit an annual report, to the Department of Transportation, on progress coming from these funds to ensure proper use of them.
- **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect the first day of the first fiscal year after passage.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Amend the National Minimum Drinking Age Act

A Bill to Reduce Human Trafficking

- **SECTION 1**. The United States will take several actions in order to limit international and domestic human trafficking
 - A. The United States government will carry out raids and increase investigation efforts in order to deal with domestic human trafficking
 - i. Sentence length will be increased for offenders caught carrying out human trafficking
 - B. The United States will have diplomatic talks with involved nations through the UN in order to take a multilateral approach to combat human trafficking
 - C. The United States in conjunction with other nations will send relief efforts to human trafficking hotspots, which shall include: China and Southeast Asia, Eastern Europe (including Albania, Bulgaria, Serbia, etc.), and Brazil.

 - A. The Department of Justice will be in charge of overseeing Section 1A.
 - B. The Department of Homeland Security will assist all state forces with monetary methods and/or equipment in carrying out Section 1A
 - a. States that do not comply will be fined
- **SECTION 4.** This bill shall be implemented by Jan 1, 2017.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Require Vaccinations of Children Attending Public Schools to Minimize the Risk of Infectious Diseases

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- **SECTION 1**. Students shall be required to receive certain mandatory vaccinations recommended by the United States Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) before entering public school systems to minimize the risk of infectious disease.
- **SECTION 2.** "Public school systems" are free, tax-supported systems of primary and secondary education controlled by a local governmental authority. "Infectious disease" shall hereby be defined as the illness caused by the invasion of body tissue by pathogens.

 - A. Students will be required to receive the following vaccinations: tetanus, diphtheria, pertussis, human papillomavirus, meningococcal conjugate, influenza, hepatitis A, hepatitis B, inactivated polio, mumps, measles, rubella, and varicella.
- **SECTION 4.** This bill shall be implemented six months after passage.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void. *Introduced for Congressional Debate by Jake Tibbetts, Sacred Heart High School.*

 - C. The FAA will have jurisdiction over police drones and regulate their usage.
 - a. Under the Rules of Public Application, police drones are to only be used with probable cause and the issuance of a warrant.
- **SECTION 4.** This law will be implemented within one year of its passage.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
