# A Bill to Counter North Korean Agression in the Pacific

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	ARTICLE I. A. The United States will deploy THAAD missile systems in
2	Okinawa, Japan and Hagåtña, Guam to counter the blatant threats posed to our allies by North Korea's continued missile testing.
3	
4	B. The United States military will continue to use both the Patriot and the 6 Aegis systems that are currently deployed in the Pacific
5	region and strategically position them to defend our allies.
6	ARTICLE II.
7	A. The Terminal High Altitude Area Defense (THAAD) is a
8	defensive, American anti-ballistic missile defense system designed to intercept short, medium, and intermediate range ballistic missiles.
9	B. The Patriot (MIM-104) is a long-range, all-altitude all-
10	weather air defense system designed to counter tactical ballistic missiles,
11	cruise missiles and advanced aircraft.
12	C. The Aegis Ballistic Missile Defense System (ABMD) is program implemented by the United States Department of Defense Missile
13	Defense Agency to provide missile defense against short to intermediate-
14	range ballistic missiles.
15	ARTICLE III. The United States Special Operations Command and the Department of
16	Defense will oversee implementation of this bill.
17	<b>ARTICLE IV.</b> This bill will take effect immediately after the passage of this legislation.

19	<b>ARTICLE V.</b> All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
