Bill #351

A Bill to Ban Political Action Committees (PACs)

Article I: The use of political action committees (otherwise known as PACs) during political campaigns for federal office in the United States will be prohibited.

Article II: A political action committee is defined by the Center for Responsive Politics as "a political committee organized for the purpose of raising and spending money to elect and defeat candidates. Most PACs represent business, labor or ideological interests."

Article III: This legislation shall take effect immediately following all United States election cycles occurring in 2018.

Article IV: The Federal Election Commission (FEC) will oversee the enforcement of this bill. Enforcement will include regular contribution inspections for political candidates at the federal level to ensure that all campaign funding comes directly from individuals and *not* from PACs, with the individual contribution limit remaining at \$2,700.

Article V: All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Increase Funding to the Federal Emergency Management Agency

Bill #700-750

A Bill to Ban Neonicotinoid Pesticides to Save the Bees

BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1: Pesticides designated by the U.S. Department of Agriculture as a

neonicotinoid are banned both in use and production.

SECTION 2: Neonicotinoid pesticide is defined as any pesticide containing a chemical

belonging to the neonicotinoid class designated by the U.S. Department of

Agriculture. Farmers continuing to use neonicotinoid pesticides will lose

farm subsidies for 1,000 days (the half-life of neonicotinoids)

SECTION 3: This legislation will be screened by the EPS and enforced by the U.S.

Department of Agriculture.

SECTION 4: This bill shall be implemented 1 year after passage.

SECTION 5: All laws and policies in conflict are hereby declared null and void.
