BattleChasers: NightWar is an award-winning JRPG that offers one of the most comprehensive mobile RPG experiences you'll ever play, and that's complete in the sense that there are no in-app purchases or paid DLC to worry about. Everything about this game is polished and complete, and it starts with a sturdy world that's full of hidden dungeons to explore, epic bosses to take down, and other surprises along the way. You can't pause to create strategies, but you'll get better as you go. Having good reflexes is also helpful. Again, like The Fire Emblem, there is a system of elemental and weapon weaknesses that you have to play to experiment. Each character is someone known from fairy tales, such as Alice, Snow White, Little Red Riding Hood, etc. Each of these characters has their own stories that you progress, with the aim of reviving the author of each character's story. Of course, this is a free game published by Square Enix, there are large amounts of microtransactions for the game currency to deviate. They're not as much on your face as other games on this list, but they've warned you. Oh, and there's a NieR Automata crossover event coming in and a ReplCant is coming later this year. SINOALICE is a free role-playing game with beautiful art, interesting and stimulating stories, amazing music and a fun combat system. The only drawback is microtransactions. We don't often see staggered releases between Android and iOS these days, but Sky: Children of the Light took almost a year to reach the first. Good thing, too, because it's a very fun game. It is worth installing if nothing more than enjoying the magnificent art style, beautiful world, and relaxing adventure. It's hard to describe Sky, but I'll try to be concise. After some time with the game, it is obvious that the focus is on exploration and socialization. Their goal is to find lost stars and guide them home to their constellations; in return, they teach you new things. There is no combat in Sky, so anyone can feel free to jump and enjoy without any stress. It is a very relaxing game with a lot to do for terminators and much to see for casual players. There are also microtransactions to buy candles, which are a key element in the game. There is also a coin in the game called Hearts, which is how to buy cosmetics for your character. I've already put a few hours and I haven't spent a penny, so they're not even necessary on your face. Sky is a magnificent adventure made by the developers of Journey. Despite some of the usual free pitfalls, it's a worthwhile experience. I had trouble choosing only a classic RPG for this list, as I have several to choose from. Ultimately, I went with Knights of the Old Republic, better known as KOTOR, for this list. On the one hand, Star Wars is a very popular franchise and I think this is a game worth playing if you enjoy that universe. Originally created by BioWare at its peak, KOTOR is a fantastic story. It's an excellent port and I haven't found any mistakes in the years I've been playing this. If you like Star Wars, do yourself a favor and check out KOTOR. A classic RPG that is considered one of the best of all time, KOTOR is a great game reinvented for mobile. It is worth the price to ask for a fantastic story and excellent gameplay. Titan Quest originally came out in 2006 and helped fill the long void left by Diablo II before III left. It is an isometric ARPG with tons of loot, monsters to kill and beautiful views to see. And while there's still a community around you on PC thanks to THQ Nordic's Titan Quest Anniversary Edition, Android users can experience this gem of gameplay courtesy of a port a few years ago. You are an un nameless hero, newly landed off the coast of Helos in Greece, a village currently besathed by beasts and fairytale monsters and folklore. Once you save the village, you go in search of the famous Leonidas and I'll leave the rest for you to find out. Spoiler: you're going to see a lot of the ancient world. This game lasts many hours, hours, and full of loot to find. Within a couple of hours of getting started, you'll have a hero powerful enough to kill anything in your path, all while looking completely awesome. Titan Quest features a dual-specialty building system, which means you can combine two of the disciplines to create your own demi-god. If loot is half the fun of Titan Quest, the loot is definitely finding the construction that suits your style of play. I'd say this Titan Quest port has two major disadvantages. For starters, it's not an Anniversary Edition port and therefore lacks all the new content (additional specialties and expansions) and quality-of-life improvements. Secondly, there is no controller support and touch controls can feel a little weird at the dots. Still, it's a mostly good port of one of my favorite games of all time and definitely deserves a place on this list. This classic ARPG was beaned to Android a few years ago and is worth every penny. If you like ancient mythology, hack-and-slash ARPG game, and tons of loot, this game is definitely one you should collect. Sometimes your opinion just doesn't align with everyone else's and that's fine sometimes. Such is the case here with V4, a game I really enjoy, but it has a ton of angry 1 star reviews on the Play Store at the time of writing. I have spent almost 10 hours on this game at this point and do not agree with a lot of the smear as most of it seems to be due to technical launch issues, such as server and character creation issues. Posted by Nexon, he was on guard and somewhat suspicious entering V4. I ended up pleasantly surprised. V4 is a dark fantasy MMO that has beautiful art, nice graphics, a decent character creator, 6 classes to choose from, and your choice between auto-play (a la idle clickers) or manual play, like a traditional MMO. However, voice acting and dialogue are both quite cringy and I don't enjoy most of the sound effects. My Gunman's pistols and double rifle should be booming, not sounding like they're slapping at enemies, for example. Otherwise, it is your typical mmo rate. You have a character level that determines your stats, additional stat levels that you can sacrifice to increase, and various daily quests and feats to complete. There are different mounts for you to show off and several pets offer additional bonuses, such as XP boosts. I wouldn't say that V4 is innovative as an MMO, but because it's mobile and free to play, I quite like it. With that just launched, some teething problems are to be expected. Players have reported (via 1-star reviews) login issues, full servers and issues to get the character creator to activate. In my playing time, I never had a single problem. Despite a name that would imply a sci-fi setting, V4 is actually a dark fantasy MMO. Although there have been launch issues, V4 has 6 classes to choose from, a beautiful world for and a lot of MMO grinding to do. Fans of the World of Darkness IP Vampire: The Masquerade have a lot to be excited for. While we patiently wait for Bloodlines 2, we have something that makes us dizzy. Called Night Road, this game is a 100% text-based RPG where your choices matter. It also helps that the writing is awesome and the game itself is huge in 650,000 words (give or take). CoD Mobile makes use of the many iconic multiplayer maps of the Call of Duty franchise and really does a great job translating fast-paced action that makes the game so fun to play on other platforms. Call of Duty Mobile features the team's main deathmatch modes for which Call of Duty is known along with Battle Royale mode that was introduced in the main franchise with CoD: Black Ops 4. They could have easily stayed with the team's death match and still had a great game in their hands, but the inclusion of a 100-player battle royale (along with fan-favorite zombie mode) only adds more value to the total pack. I've been playing CoD Mobile since the beta and it's been one of my games to go to every time I have a couple of minutes to kill. The essence of the game remains the same: build structures that are able to transport a vehicle from point A to point B. Sounds easy, but there really is a lot of strategy in it. Plus, you'll have to deal with things like portals, repulsion and propulsion gels, buckets and a variety of other Portal-themed things. GLaDOS is here! I'm telling you, if you loved Portal like many of us, and you like physics-based puzzles, you'll love this game. Play very well on tablets and there's also gamepad support. It's just a good game and it's worth every penny. A fantastic mishmash of the traditional gameplay of Bridge Builder and elements of the successful Portal, this game is a must for fans of either (or both) series. It's a premium title that's a lot of fun to play. Posted by good people at Noodlecake Games, Chameleon Run is a self-runner that tests your reaction time in ways that can damage your brain a little bit. The name of the game is the speed as it jumps and launches through colorful platforms. You have special jumping skills and the ability to change color, and you have to overcome each course, but you're only allowed to touch objects that match your color. Does it seem easy enough? Well, think again! As beautiful as the game looks when it's running at full frame rate, the real joy comes from the precise input into the two-touch controls. If you time a color switch just when you touch the platform, you will get a quick script boost. Jump controls are equally precise and allow you to nail complicated double jumps with ease. Each level is designed to be nonlinear, which means there are multiple paths to get to the end, however, there are also three special objectives to complete for each level that will keep you coming back for more. Overall, the game is quite short, but it's to be one of those games that is ideal for speedrunning, although there is already a tough competition out there. I feel like the game lacks a knockout feature, a course editor that allows players to raise their own levels. Or just more levels maybe with platforms even different colors to swap. Still, for \$2 it's a very fun game. Chameleon Run is a colorful endless runner that challenges you with precise jumps and quick reflexes to make sure you don't touch the wrong platform and explode. It's hard to find a fun puzzle game that doesn't try to sell you in power-ups or extra lives or something. That's just one of the reasons Holetdown is a featured game in 2018. Holetdown will strategically cross the core of celestial bodies, starting with asteroids and working to the Sun, using the classic block-bouncing game formula. Each brick has a number that represents the number of hits needed to destroy it, or you can destroy a support block by erasing everything above it. Bad North is a fantastic game and looks great, too, with its minimalist, cute art style. I think it's worth the \$5 to get in, because it's practically endless fun as things change every time you play. It's a great time and fun for the whole family. I love cards against humanity, but it's not exactly the most for children out there. Exploding Kittens is only \$2 purchase and is yours forever. You can also play online with strangers. Card thief card is all about stealth and making them steal. You play a thief who must sneak his way through a deck of collect the treasure all avoiding detection. You can also use team cards to help you in your ways of stealing. Don't get too arrogant or you'll run out of escape points and you'll get caught! You'll do things like put out torches, pickpocket guards and other antics as you approach. Each game lasts only a few minutes long, but there is a steep learning curve to really master it. Draw cards until someone pulls the explosive kitten card. Starting with a mini-game in the incredible masterpiece The Witcher 3: Wild Hunt, Gwent became a favorite pastime for many players. CD Projekt Red finally spun Gwent into his own thing, with some good visual reviews and online pairing. And now it's available on Android. Although it's a substantial download from the Play Store, Howdy Boy is worth it. Card games could technically be classified as their own thing, but you could also make an argument that most of them involve a lot of strategy. Gwent is one of those examples, which require you to pay attention to your cards, their skills, their placement on the game carpet and your score. That doesn't want to mention what your opponent is doing and what they've played. In total, Gwent has a lot to do and requires your utmost attention. That's how it works. You're going against another player using your chosen deck, from which you draw cards at the beginning of a round. You have the option to redraw up to three cards. Each match consists of three rounds and the player who wins two of them is the winner. Success is determined by having the highest score, which comes from the point values assigned to each card in play. Some cards also have unique abilities that can help or hinder your opponent. And sometimes victory requires you to throw a round to be ready for the next one. There's so much more to it than that, but the nuance is just too much for this list. This is one of those great free games that I highly recommend you try. There are microtransactions, of course, but CD Projekt Red built enough of a good reputation with the gaming community that I don't think many people care about. Overall, it is an excellent and very addictive game. The Android version also has cross-play with and PC players, greatly expanding the group of people you can play against. Gwent is a fun and addictive card game that has recently landed on Android. The best two out of three wins, but it takes a lot of strategy to get there. Oh, Hearthstone. It's a very popular card game, partly because it's free to get started and partly because it takes advantage of Blizzard's beloved Warcraft universe. Hearthstone pits you against another player in 1-on-1 combat, where your goal is to knock down their health reserve to 0 before they do the same to you. With all expansions, there's a lot of variety and diversity of deck construction to have. Casual online games, ranked matches, weekly locations and grueling Arena games attract different levels of player engagement as you build your deck and your best strategies. Hearthstone is definitely the king of free card games on Android, going head-to-head with Legends of Runeterra and Gwent. There's been enough time to have plenty of content for newer players to discover, although there are plenty of in-app purchases to unlock new card expansions. Still, it's a fun game for players of all skill levels and worth the time to play. Hearthstone is one of the biggest digital card games you can play on Android. Based on the Warcraft universe, it has a very high skill ceiling while accessible to new players. Legends of Runeterra is a League of Legends as Hearthstone is for Warcraft. It's another turn-based card game based on a very popular universe. Although I've never played League of Legends myself, I can understand and appreciate the excitement behind the release of this game. Like their Warcraft and Witcher counterparts, Legends of Runeterra centers around your deck. Defeating your opponent requires you to lower their main health group while defending yours. It's pretty simple and it's not a situation of the best two out of three like Gwent. Each player receives an attacking turn while the opposing player has the opportunity to defend themselves as best they can. Each card has its own attack and health statistics, and many have special abilities. There are also spell cards that have different speed levels (some are instantaneous, others take a turn or two). These can be healing spells, barrier spells, etc. The cards are divided into offensive, defense and support. The latter real grant barriers to nearby allies, health/attack increases, etc. You have a mana system that determines which cards you can play. It stacks with each turn and some cards take several mana units to play. Even if you don't style League of Legends, Legends of Runeterra is a good break from Hearthstone while still feeling familiar. The tutorial presents the game well, so give it about half an hour and you'll be ready to go. Immerse yourself in Riot Games' response to Hearthstone, set in the League of Legends universe. Beat your opponent to claim victory. Half sim, half strategy, Majesty is one of my favorite time-wasd games. You're in charge of a small kingdom and it's up to you to keep it safe, explore for resources, manage an economy, and deal with all the other rarities. Majesty is an eclectic game, no doubt, but it's also quite fun. Of course, you can't talk about Majesty and forget about The Northern Expansion. It's a bit extra, but it adds a new location and new problems to deal with, including dragons. You also have more heroes, more resources and a changing climate. For an extra \$3, it's a great expansion, especially if you like Majesty. They're not Starcraft, but Majesty and the Northern Expansion are great for killing time on the subway/Bus while you wait in the doctor's office, or what you have. Enjoy your fun game and watch the hours fly by. Take the mantle of the ruler of a small kingdom as you try to make the best decision for your people. Fight monsters, explore and build. Adding more Majesty to your life is worth the \$3, in my opinion, and The Northern Expansion certainly delivers. Add a new area, new enemies and new challenges. Tower defense games are a dime per dozen in the Play Store, but few offer the depth and strategy on display with Mindustry. It's a sandbox-style game that's intimidating when you start for the first time because it gives you all the tools you need for success, but it's entirely up to you to use them in the most efficient and strategic way. Not only do you need to worry about mining resources to build your defenses, but you also need to maintain and protect your supply lines, conveyor belts that deliver your extracted resources from the drill to your central base, and defense turrets. It took me all the tutorial to get control over the build controls and mechanics of the main game, and another time to play the game before I started unlocking new technologies in the Tech Tree. I wasn't long before I started developing some rudimentary strategies that worked for a while, but soon the enemies of AI thought about my tactics, managed to evade my defenses and absolutely destroyed my base. The mode only scratches the surface of everything Mindustry has to offer. You can set up a multiplayer game with custom servers or through the local area network, create your own map with the included map editor, or create a custom game with the player given full control over almost every aspect of the game.
