FACULTY CHANGES AT TECHNOLOGY

Promotions Made In Instructing Staff For Coming Year Announced.

At the last meeting of the Executive Committee of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology the following advances in grades were made to members of the instructing staff:

Associate Professor Henry G. Pearson is advanced to the grade of Professor of English and he will be placed in charge of the department on the retirement of Professor Arlo Bates at the end of the present academic year. The following assistant professors were advanced to the grade of associate professor in their respective departments: Dr. Robert F. Bigelow, zoology and parasitology; W. Felton Brown, freehand drawing; Harold A. Everett, naval architecture and H. R. Kurrelmeyer, German. Instructor Henry B. Phillips is advanced to assistant professor of Mathematics, and assistant instructors K. C. Robinson and John E. Bird are advanced to the grade of instructor in mechanical drawing. Miss Ruth M. Thomas, research assistant in organic chemistry, is advanced to research associate in the same department.

The title of Professor A. E. Kennelly has been changed from chairman to director of the Research Division of the department of Electrical Engineering.

NEW MINING APPARATUS

Complete Janney Oil Flotation Outfit Installed.

Through the courtesy of Col. Charles Hayden, '90, the Mining department has received a complete working unit of the Janney oil flotation apparatus with electrical control for regulating speed and observation windows for noting the interior operation.

The process of oil flotation is a comparatively new one in the development of ore dressing and is making great advancement. The process depends upon the affinity which oils have for sulphides. In submitting the ground ore to the oil, that latter coats the sulphide particles with a film of oil, while the enclosing rock consists in charging the mixture with air which attaches itself to the oily particles making for them a sort of life raft and floats them away from the useless rock.

The process has been experimented with by many mill men throughout the country and in many cases complete outfits have been installed.

STUDENT REGIMENT NEARS PERFECTION



States War Department. This will include regimental drill, company drill, and individual drill. 
