Court decision may be fatal for stem cell research

Several MIT labs may be harmed as the ban will also affect stem cell lines from the Bush era

Stem cell research at MIT and throughout the country seems sure to be strongly impacted by a federal court ruling Monday prohibiting the use of federal funds to support human embryonic stem cell research.

While the precise meaning of Monday's preliminary injunction is not fully clear, it INSIDE

Young says why people study stem cells, p. 18 appears to prohibit federal dollars from funding research with any human embryonic stem cells. The ban would cover the limited number of human

embryonic stem cell lines available under President George W. Bush's policies that took effect on August 9, 2001, as well as the additional stem cell lines allowed under the

Obama administration as of 2009.

National Institutes of Health Director Francis S. Collins said on Tuesday that the NIH believes "grantees that already have awards from NIH are permitted to continue their research, and need not stop in place." Grant renewals and grants currently in the pipeline will be suspended, however, Collins said.


Institute Professor Robert S. Langer ScD '74 said "I think its disappointing - it sets prog-

Burst pipe floods parking lot

Waters gushing from below crack open asphalt, reach 1.5 ft

In a freak accident last night, the ground split open and the water started gushing out in the parking lot between Buildings 1, 3 and 5. The water flooded the lot as well as the only exit, trapping several cars and SUVs. Many labs and offices nearby were also flooded.

The flooding started around 6:15 last night, when an underground water running through the center of the parking lot burst and the escaping water ruptured the asphalt above. By 7 p.m. the lot was entirely underwater, even though it is equipped with four drains. Workers weren't able to shut off the line until several hours later, and the water did not drain out of the parking lot until 9:45 p.m.

Buildings 3, 10, and 11 were flooded, and several labs and offices needed to be vacuumed and cleaned. Buildings 5 and 7, which were west of the parking lot, were not as affected as buildings to the east. At Building 10 the elevator pit

was filled by several feet of water.

The flooding was worst at the underpass between Buildings 7 and 3, where the depth reached 17 inches. There the water lapped at the knees of several wading facilities worker.

That underpass is also only way out for the vehicles in the parking lot. Many people drove through the water to leave, but some de-

cided not to take the chance One woman asked a facilities worker move her SUV to the far side of the parking lot, where the water was only a few inches high. The MIT policeman at the scene advised her to take a taxi home rather than to drive out of the parking lot.

One man in his SUV sent water

NW30/W59 may get real railroad crossing

For students living in New Ashown and Sidney-Pacific a common (if risky) route to class takes them across the railroad tracks, popping out on Vassar Street parking lot near the West Garage and Steinbrenner Stadium. MIT has for years considered building a formal foot crossing there, and those plans may finally be solidifying.

We have been in discussion with the [Commonwealth of Massachusetts], primarily with the MBTA and their commuter rail operator the Massachusetts Bay Commuter Rail," said Jennifer E. Combs, a project manager from Facilities, in an e-mail.

The plan is to improve the alley between NW30 (the Warehouse)

and NW21 (Plasma Science and Fusion Center) and make a pedestrian path across the railroad tracks, which are known as the Grand Junction The footnath will continue through the parking lot to the east of W59. W59 currently houses ROTC, as well as offices of Housing, Campus Dining, and Residential Life.

"Pending final approval of the project by the [Commonwealth], the project could be completed by spring of next year or sooner," Combs said.

The Massachusetts Bay Commuter Rail "will oversee the construction of the railroad crossing. MIT will oversee the pedestrian improvements on MIT property,"

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Generals wary of Pentagon move to cut their ranks

WASHINGTON — Two weeks ago, Defense Secretary Robert M. Gates announced a sweeping effort to improve efficiency that, among other things, takes aim at the military's sacrosanct corps of generals and admirals. He ordered his staff to cut at least 50 positions and made clear that he would be happier if

Pentagon officials said the measures were aimed at more than a number. Gates said he wanted to flatten a bureaucracy that had experienced significant "brass creep," swelling to "cumbersome and top-heavy proportions."

Beyond that, Pentagon officials said, Gates wanted to push back against a culture of entitlement that had allowed some senior officers to pad their lifestyles as well as their commands.

According to the Pentagon, there are now 963 generals and admirals leading the armed forces, about 100 more than on Sept. 11, 2001. Meanwhile, the overall number of active duty personnel has declined to some 1.5 million from 2.2 million in 1985, even though the Army and Marine Corps have grown since the Sept. 11 attacks, to carry out the ground wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

The salary cap for generals is about \$180,000, up from \$130,000 a decade ago, according to Todd Harrison at the Center for Strategic and Budgetary Assessments, a private research group in Washington. Like all officers and enlisted personnel, generals have the benefit of the military pension system, which gives everybody who serves 40 years a pension equal to their full pay.

Lawyers for 9/11 workers are ordered to justify some fees

NEW YORK — The lawyers representing most of the ground zero workers who sued the city over health issues will be appearing in court in a new role: defending themselves.

The federal judge overseeing the cases has summoned the law partnership of two firms, Worby Groner Edelman and Napoli Bern Ripka, to a hearing Friday to justify \$6.1 million in legal expenses that they are charging their clients.

Next week, the lawyers are due back in federal court to respond to accusations of overcharging made by the other leading law firm representing workers. That firm, Sullivan Papain Block McGrath & Cannavo, alleges that its co-counsel is trying to inflate its fees by inappropriately charging clients more than \$400,000 for publicists, lobbyists and legal and medical experts

The Napoli firm, which represents about 9,400 of the more than 10,000 plaintiffs, already faced criticism from clients for a settlement that many plaintiffs said did not give them enough money and compensated less for some illnesses like cancer.

American Airlines flight makes rare satellite-based approach

Portable global positioning system devices that let travelers know precisely where they are and, more important, direct them to where they want to go, have been around for years. But airline pilots in the United States often must still rely on antiquated ground-based radio and radar equipment to land at airports.

So when American Airlines Flight 1916 followed a satellitebased approach to Bradley International Airport near Hartford, Conn., on Thursday afternoon, it was a momentous occasion, at least according to the pilot.

"This is really good stuff," Capt. Brian Will told a small group gathered at the terminal to celebrate the flight, which originated in Dallas.

Much of Pakistan's progress is lost in its floodwaters

SUKKUR, Pakistan - Men waded waist deep all week wedging stones with their bare hands into an embankment to hold back Pakistan's surging floodwaters. It was a rudimentary and ultimately vain effort to save their town. On Thursday, the waters breached the levy, a demoralizing show of how fragile Pakistan's infrastructure remains, and how overwhelming the task is

Even as Pakistani and international relief officials scrambled to save people and property, they despaired that the nation's worst natural calamity had ruined just about every physical strand that knit this country together — roads, bridges, schools, health clinics, electricity and communications.

The destruction could set Pakistan back many years, if not decades; further weaken its feeble civilian administration; and add to the burdens on its military. It seems certain to distract from U.S. requests for Pakistan to battle Taliban insurgents, who threatened foreign aid workers delivering flood relief Thursday. It is already disrupting vital supply lines to American forces in Afghanistan.

The flooding, which began with the arrival of the annual monsoons late last month, has by now affected about one-fifth of the country nearly 62,000 square miles — or an area larger than England, according to the United Nations.

The government estimates that more than 5,000 miles of roads and railways have been washed away, along with some 7,000 schools and more than 400 health

One estimate, in a joint study from Ball State University and the University of Tennessee, put the total cost of the flood damage at \$7.1 billion. That is nearly a fifth of Pakistan's budget, and it exceeds the total cost of last year's five-year aid package to Pakistan passed by

The damage to the electricity and power sector alone could run to \$125 million, according to a government report shown to The New

The mountainous Swat Valley, which was still struggling to rebuild from the army's campaign against Taliban insurgents, has lost every bridge and whole sections of its roads

Great chunks of the famed Karakoram Highway — a celebrated feat of high-altitude engineering built by the Chinese over two decades have disappeared as cliffs fell away in the torrent. The route, which winds hundreds of miles from the Chinese border in the Himalayas to the Pakistani capital, Islamabad, may now be impassable for years, officials said.

The United States has agreed to help the World Bank and the Asia Development Bank conduct a damage and needs assessment for the Pakistani government. The figure is bound to be big.

The recovery cost will have to be met by a mixture of domestic money, international donations and loans from development banks, the administrator of AID, Dr. Rajiv Shah, said after a tour of flooded regions on Wednesday.

Struggling cities shut down firehouses in budget crisis

SAN DIEGO — Fire departments around the nation are cutting jobs, closing firehouses and increasingly resorting to "rolling brownouts" in which they shut different fire companies on different days as the economic downturn forces many cities and towns to make deep cuts that are slowing their responses to fires and other emergencies.

Philadelphia began rolling brownouts this month, joining cities from Baltimore to Sacramento that now shut some units every day. San Jose, Calif., laid off 49 firefighters last month. And Lawrence, Mass., north of Boston, has laid off firefighters and shut down half of its six firehouses, forcing the city to rely on help from neighboring departments each time a fire goes to a second alarm.

Fire chiefs and union officials

alike say it is the first time they have seen such deep cuts in so many parts of the country. "I've never seen it so widespread," said Harold A. Schaitberger, the general president of the International Association of Fire Fighters.

The risks of cutting fire service were driven home here last month when Bentley Do, a 2-year-old boy who was visiting relatives, somehow got his hands on a gum ball, put it in his mouth, started laughing and then began choking.

"It blocked the air hole," said his uncle, Brian Do, who called 911 while other relatives frantically tried to dislodge the gum ball. "No air could flow in and out.'

It is only 600 steps from the front door of the neatly kept stucco home where the boy was staying to the nearest fire station, just down the block. But the station was empty that evening: Its engine was in another part of town, on a call in an area usually covered by an engine that had been taken out of service as part of a brownout

The police came to the home within five minutes and began performing cardiopulmonary resuscitation, officials said. But it took nine-and-a-half minutes almost twice the national goal of arriving within five minutes - for the fire engine, with a paramedic and more medical equipment, to get there. An ambulance came moments later and took Bentley to the hospital, where he was pronounced dead.

The San Diego Fire-Rescue chief, Javier Mainar, said it was impossible to say whether the delay contributed to Bentley's death on July 20. But he said there was no doubt that the city's brownouts, which take 13 percent of firefighters off the streets each day to save \$11.5 million annually, led to the delay.



As miners face long wait, Chile filters notes and food

SAN JOSE MINE, Chile — The government has consulted NASA about the extreme isolation of space. Chilean Navy officers have come to discuss the emotional stress of living in a submarine. Doctors stand at the ready with antidepressants. Even a tiny home theater is being funneled down in plastic tubes to occupy the 33 miners stuck in their subterranean home.

Chile is sparing no expense or attempted innovation in trying to rescue the miners trapped by a cave-in on Aug. 5, fully aware that the country — and the world — is closely watching the ordeal.

But like everything else being

done to maintain the psychological health of the miners over the weeks or months they may remain nearly half a mile underground, officials will carefully control what they are exposed to, down to the messages they receive from their families or the kind of movies that might be projected on the wall of the mine.

No fewer than seven government ministers roam the makeshift camp outside the mine here in Chile's Atacama Desert, not to mention the countless politicians, millionaire donors and observers who almost outnumber the family members camping in tents.

With his popularity already slipping, President Sebastian Pinera has staked his nascent presidency on rescuing the miners, analysts said.

Government officials said they held a teleconference on Wednesday afternoon with five NASA specialists, among them doctors who put astronauts through tests that simulate the grueling isolation of a voyage to Mars.

Dr. Jaime Manalich, the health minister, said he had urged NASA to send a team to "monitor what we are doing here" and announced Thursday that three or four NASA specialists would arrive in Chile next week to assist medical officials with the miners.

Before being discovered, the miners survived on tiny bites of emergency rations and have lost an average of about 20 pounds

Tensions in Iowa town at the heart of the eggs recall

CLARION, Iowa — The conversation at the weekly gathering of local ladies at a coffee shop here turned uncharacteristically tense.

One woman suggested that the company at the focus of the recall of hundreds of millions of eggs, with huge facilities here, had done more harm than good locally. A second resident jumped in to defend the operation and the DeCoster family that runs it, sternly announcing that any troubles ought not be discussed

aloud

Federal authorities announced Thursday that they had found samples of salmonella matching the strain of the recent outbreak in the feed and barns of Wright County Egg, the DeCosters' facilities.

The authorities said nearly 1,500 illnesses since May might be tied to tainted eggs, making this the largest outbreak associated with this type of bacteria, known as Salmonella enteritidis, since the federal government began closely tracking foodborne disease in 1973.

The intense scrutiny DeCoster and another producer, Hillandale Farms, have come under has reopened a fault line in central Iowa, those who detest enormous, industrial-size farms and say the risk of a widespread salmonella outbreak is one more reason to fear them; on the other, those who see such farming as the economic savior of these wide open spaces.

The DeCosters produce 2.3 million dozen eggs a week in Iowa. Over the years, many here have objected to the growing operations of Austin J. DeCoster.

Home foreclosures drop, but risk of delinquency deepens

The foreclosure crisis might have finally peaked in the first half of this year, but with the continued weakness in the economy and the recent deterioration of the housing market, the gains may prove fleeting.

For the first time since 2006, the number of loans in the process of foreclosure fell in the second quarter, the Mortgage Bankers Association said Thursday. Some other measures of delinquency also dropped.

The problem is no longer high-interest subprime loans, many of which have worked their way out of the system. The critical area now is prime loans, where defaults are driven by stubbornly high unemployment.

Mortgages that are in serious default, which means at least 90 days past due, fell to 9.11 percent of all loans from 9.54 percent in the first quarter, the banking association said.

Kepler telescope finds possible Earth-size planet

Scientists working with NASA's Kepler satellite reported Thursday that they might have spotted a planet just 1.5 times the diameter of Earth around a Sun-like star 2,000 light-years away.

"We're still in the process of confirming this candidate is a planet," said Matthew Holman, of the Harvard-Smithsonian Center for Astrophysics, at a NASA-sponsored news conference Thursday. Holman is the lead author of an article describing the discoveries that the journal Science published on its website.

This is the first announcement of a candidate Earth-size planet by the Kepler mission, which in March 2009 launched a one-ton spacecraft to search for planets like ours that just might harbor life.

Hip implants are recalled by Johnson & Johnson unit

More than two years after the Food and Drug Administration began receiving complaints about the failure of a hip replacement implant made by the DePuy Orthopaedics unit of Johnson & Johnson, the company said Thursday that it was recalling two kinds of hip implants.

DePuy said that it had made the decision to withdraw the products because many patients required a second hip replacement after the company's implants had failed.

The news compounded problems for Johnson & Johnson, which has recalled a succession of some of its best-selling and best-known products, including liquid children's Tylenol in the United States and, just this week, 1-Day Acuvue TruEye contact lenses in Japan and other countries in Asia and Europe.

Build the NYC mosque

The Cordoba Initiative is a powerful defense against Al Qaeda

On August 3, the New York City Landmarks Preservation Society voted unanimously not to extend landmark status to 45-47 Park Place, formerly a Burlington Coat Factory, now a partially-damaged warehouse. As far as municipal law goes, the decision was as mundane and routine as handing out a parking ticket or issuing a liquor license — the warehouse, with its commonplace architectural style, simply did not offer a compelling justification for landmark status. And yet to hear many conservatives talk about the matter, it seems as if the Landmarks Preservation Society has dealt a death blow to the American way of life. Former Speaker of the House Newt Gingrich claims that it will "encourage [radical Islamists] in their challenge to our civilization," and Arizona Senator Jon Kyl writes that it will "risk giving militant Islamists a victory to exploit."

I enjoy a classically crafted building as much as the next man, but it seems to me that Gingrich and Kyl are taking their architecture-philia to an unhealthy extreme.

Of course, I'm being a bit facetious. No doubt Gingrich, Kyl, and others are up in arms not due to a love of the Italian Palazzo style, but because the shuttered warehouse is situated two blocks north of the World Trade Center site, and the owner of the building, Sharif El-Gamal, intends to demolish it to make way for a \$100 million mosque and cultural center to be operated by the Cordoba Initiative. In the greater scheme of things however, the political assault on the proposed mosque would make more sense were it motivated by fashion or taste.

Initial opposition to the mosque was founded on the notion that the Cordoba Initiative was an extremist organization, funded by shadowy sources, intent on building the mosque as a statement of Islamic triumphalism.

It has become clear however, that the reality is nothing of the sort. To be sure, the Cordoba Initiative's leader, Imam Feisal Abdul Rauf, had given some mild criticism of American foreign policy over the past decade (I've yet to meet a soul who hasn't) but on the whole he is one of the most moderate Muslim leaders in America today. Rauf has been an imam in New York City for 27 years, he has publicly denounced Osama Bin Laden as an abomination, and he stands in every way opposed to the work of

Al Qaeda. He does not hate America — he celebrates it as the quintessential proponent of his faith

These truths have left the mosque's opponents undeterred. Religious conservatives, having manufactured the controversy, now claim that the controversy is self-justified — if Imam Rauf's intentions were pure, he would not continue to push for something that has engendered so much conflict, and if his intentions are not pure, we should not allow him to continue his plans. Such is the absurd catch-22 that the mosque now finds itself in.

Rauf has been an imam in New York City for 27 years... and he stands in every way opposed to the work of Al Qaeda. He does not hate America — he celebrates it...

In these depressing days, the American people have become pessimists. Amid economic recession and an uncertain geopolitical landscape, we question (as we have several times in our past) whether our ideals can withstand the challenges brought by other civilizations. We wonder if the mosque is symbolic of a weakness inherent in our system — if this is perhaps an example of our enemies exploiting our freedom and tolerance as a weapon against us.

It is hard to argue with a widow's grief or a father's anger. There is the understandable desire to build something on that hallowed site that is more directly defiant of those who attacked us — perhaps a predator drone factory with a mural of a smiling Uncle Sam placing his boot on the throat of Osama bin Laden.

But what the mosque's opponents should understand is that the Cordoba Initiative is a uniquely powerful — and uniquely American — weapon in the war on terror, and that their proposed center represents the fiercest threat to our adversaries as any nation can muster.

The members of the Cordoba Initiative are not confederates of Al Qaeda — they are its sworn enemies. Indeed, they are its greatest fear. They share a religion with the 9/11 hijackers only in the most nominal sense. These are the men and women who

are leading the assault on Al Qaeda's ideology. As our soldiers hunt down and destroy Al Qaeda's fighters and physical assets, Cordoba hunts down and destroys the ideas of Al Qaeda with equal prejudice. Our economic system gives us the men and materiel to keep radical Islam in check. Cordoba gives us the means to erase it completely, to banish it to the history books. Our military can threaten terrorists with biological death. Cordoba threatens them with the extinction of their very purpose in life. We will bury them. Cordoba will ensure that they are not mourned.

A free and tolerant society is not weak; it is resilient. Our liberty is not some white elephant; it is the font of our civilization's power. It is no coincidence that the Cordoba Initiative fights on our side. By protecting the rights of every individual, our society finds itself able to enlist not just from the efforts of a single race, or creed, or caste, or class, or gender, but of the entire spectrum of peoples willing to live together in freedom.

This is our strength, it is the reason why, unlike those other great nations now resigned to the ash heap of history, our country shall triumph, and why the ideology of freedom that sustains us shall ultimately prevail over any strain of fear, tyranny, or hate. Our enemies will only ever challenge us with a fraction of man's potential; we shall have its full measure at our disposal. We should have faith in this premise — that economic, political, and religious freedom is what allows us to recruit the energies of the broadest section of society — and draw from that faith an optimism in the eventual success of the cause of freedom.

To halt the Cordoba Initiative and their ambition to build a place of worship on properly zoned private property would mean sacrificing our most cherished ideals; it would twist our system of courts and due process away from its purpose as a safeguard of our natural rights and into just another tool in a war between civilizations. I can imagine nothing more self-destructive.

For 234 years, our republic has withstood its enemies, foreign and domestic, by tacking a course towards greater and greater freedom. We made sacrifices for our rights — staggeringly large sacrifices not as a matter of mere preference, but as an existential necessity. We cannot, in this time of peril, forsake the principals that have formed the basis of our strength. The mosque must be built.

Whether it's having a person to vent to after a frustrating day, getting sick and needing to postpone an exam, feeling lost in a class, or being confused about which major to choose, MIT has many, many resources that can help you to feel confident, healthy, and self-assured in your decisions.

These methods begin next week with the dorm you choose to call home and the GRTs and housemasters who adopt you. They continue with TAs and upperclassmen, and extend to S^3 (Student Support Services) and the wide variety of guidance counselors and professionals that can give you academic, medical, or personal advice.

These support structures are here to help *you*. Don't prolong or try to fix a difficult situation by yourself. I guarantee that you will find your MIT experience much more rewarding if you communicate your needs, ask others for ideas and advice, and be sure to take advantage of all your resources. Don't try to go it alone.

Finally, keep your ambitions in mind if you like, but don't hold too tightly to them right now. Your ideas and goals may very

well change during your first two semesters, and this is something that you should embrace. Regardless of which high school you have come from, what your interests are, or where you call home, freshman year is not a time to compare yourself with your classmates. Work hard and learn, but take care that you don't take yourself too seriously. MIT can feel daunting, but try to focus on adjusting to life here and don't be afraid to branch out, try new classes, and enjoy yourselves. Pass/No Record is a perfect time to experiment with new subjects, UROPs, sports, or activities — and to enjoy college life with the friends that you meet. Take full advantage of it!

Now that I've told you these few things, I know that you will come to find that MIT is an incredible place, filled with exciting courses, diverse classmates and professors, and outstanding research. It is an extremely unique place to learn, live, and work, and you will be exposed to countless choices and opportunities during your time here. Enjoy, explore, and take advantage of them, and your four years at MIT will undoubtedly be exciting, fulfilling, and enlightening.

A freshman's guide to thriving at MIT

Meet new friends, don't overwork yourself, and embrace your classes.

At this point, you've settled into your temporary room, semi-unpacked and probably eaten lots and lots of free food. If you're hungry or have paid for food, you're doing something wrong. Maybe you've gone to some "mandatory" Orientation events or you're doing an FPOP. You're meeting lots of people, staying up all night, and generally having a great time. And slowly, you might even be starting to believe that this is what MIT is like all of the time.

I hate to be the bearer of bad news, but it's not.

In a feeble attempt to prepare you for what is coming, I put together some tips on how to make the most of your freshman year. Some of this is based on personal experience, some on the advice of my classmates, and some on things that I witnessed during my first year.

Go to class. This might seem rather obvious to some people, but when you've gone to bed at 5 a.m. and woken up at 8 a.m., this concept might evade your logic. Borrowing class notes from classmates or trying to learn the material online is no substitute for actually attending lecture and recitation. Some classes, such as 3.091, record lectures and put them online later that day; in this case, there is really no difference as to whether you attend the class or watch it online, as long as you really do watch it if that's what you choose. However, I would advise against relying on MIT's Open Cour sWare (OCW) lectures from previous years, since some content may differ or the class may proceed at a different rate. OCW is a great resource, but it won't get you a de-

Study and organize your time. Many of you glided through high school without

opening a book. MIT is not high school; you will need to study, sometimes quite a lot. If you haven't studied in high school, I would recommend starting right away, even if the classes you're taking start off with easier material that you are familiar with. Organize your time by ensuring that you set blocks of time aside for each subject that has an exam or a problem set due. Tests and problem sets from previous years are some of your best studying tools, and they can be easily found on OCW.

Work in groups. This is another thing that some of you might scoff at, since many of you did not need help in high school. Yet this is another change that you will need to adjust to. The problem sets that are issued are not easy and I am not exaggerating when I say that virtually everyone at MIT works in groups, especially in GIR's that they are not majoring in. They are not high school homework assignments that you can either finish in class or do in 5 minutes before the bell rings the day it's due. But in this case, you need to do more than just set aside what you think is enough time to work on it; oftentimes, there will be problems that you just cannot do. But chances are, if you are in a group of 3-5 people, one of you will know how to do it. Your classmates at MIT are perhaps your greatest resource, so use them! However, one pitfall to avoid is to take down an answer that you don't understand. Make sure that if you're working with others, you understand everything your groupmates do.

That's some of my advice, but what do other ex-frosh have to say? Sophomore Shannon Taylor stressed the importance of taking chances and stepping outside your comfort zone. You hear that phrase a lot, but it's extremely applicable at MIT. You're going to find out that there are a plethora of groups and clubs to join,

and you should definitely use part of your freshman year to do this. Shannon pointed out that after freshman year, you only get busier, so your first year is your chance to try different things and find something you really enjoy.

But this doesn't just apply to extracurriculars! Shannon and many other upper-classmen recommend taking advantage of Pass/No Record and ABC/No Record. What this means is that during your freshman year, you literally cannot receive a D or an F, at least not that will be recorded in your record or affect your GPA. This is a huge opportunity that I think a lot of freshmen under-utilize. With No Record, you can try any class you want and explore the many different majors without too much risk. Even if you've come in with a strong idea of what you want to major in, it's still

a great idea to take some classes outside of your major. You won't be the first freshman to decide that your passion coming in is not your passion coming out. Even if you keep your major, you can use freshman year to get a taste for an entirely different field of study to broaden your horizons.

Another sophomore, Russell Cohen, had more to say about taking advantage of all MIT has to offer. "Meet other freshmen. And don't date seniors," he added. As I mentioned earlier, the student body is a major resource at MIT, and not just for homework. MIT is an extremely diverse


body of people from all over the world who may have entirely different viewpoints and experiences than you. You might never again get the chance to meet so many different people from so many different walks of life.

The different groups of friends I've gained at MIT has been fantastic. I've got one group of friends from my floor, one group I met during Orientation, a few different friends from different groups I've joined, and even friends from other schools in Boston who I've met. The more people you know and befriend, the richer your MIT experience will be.



Many people have made the mistake of taking on way too much first semester and, as a result, digging themselves into a hole they couldn't get out of until second semester.

If you take all of this advice, I can virtually guarantee that you will do more than just fine; you will excel. Everyone is capable of doing the work, it just takes time management, teamwork, and lots of studying. And when you've got that down, take advantage of the rich variety of opportunities available to you here. You have four years. Make the most of it.

Portraits of the modern American woman

How Richard Avedon transformed fashion photography, and fashion itself

Fashion photography tells a story. With each ad campaign, each extravagant photo shoot, haute couture designers and stylists are selling a story about a woman, about a lifestyle. The woman decked out in pearls with a cigarette perched between gloved fingers and leaning coyly into a handsome Clark Gable-look alike is perhaps a wealthy matron meeting her lover. The young girl applying eyeliner carefully, tongue stuck out in concentration allows the public an intimate glimpse into perhaps the last five minutes before a date with a beau.

Richard Avedon's exhibit at the MFA, "Avedon Fashion: 1944-2000" displays not only the transformation of American fashion but also Avedon's own impact on the specific genre of photography.

Fashion photography was not always about the lifestyle. The lifestyle is what Avedon sells. Glossy portraits capture women not simply wearing beautiful clothes in luxuriously exotic settings, but the essence of the modern American woman — Avedon's modern American woman, that is. She's regal but charming, witty and sophisticated, flaunts her individuality but does not throw away her femininity. Avedon's ability to create this modern woman set the standard for highfashion photography. It became no longer just about a particular dress or a particular pair of shoes, but rather the spirit of the woman wearing those things and the story behind the fashion.

Avedon launched several women and brands into success. The MFA exhibit follows Avedon through several decades. Models picked up along the way include Suzy Parker, Audrey Hepburn, Twiggy and China Machado. Suzy Parker was AveAvedon Fashion: 1944–2000

don's muse during the 50's — the model later went on to proclaim: "The only joy I ever got out of modeling was working with Dick Avedon." Vogue depicted her as one of the faces of the confident, post-war American woman. Hepburn herself would be forever immortalized by Avedon's prints, especially those highlighting her later trademark features — the defined brows, that wide-eyed gaze.

Through the pictures, one can sense if not the man, at least his relationships with the models. As the chief photographer for Harper's Bazaar in the 50's, Avedon broke away from the then-conventional mode of fashion photography - emotionless models posed in stiff positions with vacant eyes. Many of Avedon's subjects were bursting with emotion - twinkling gazes, unrestrained laughter. Avedon was able to bring both the models and fashion to life. His work will continue to awe and impress, be they the iconic images or the simpler snapshots. Avedon through the ages shows not only how he worked with the changing styles but how he molded the public's perception of high fashion and the modern American woman.

Meet Hitler

Do we dare peer into his mind?

I walk up two flights of stairs. The production is in a language learning center on the second floor. The decoration is sparse, the lighting fluorescent, industrial. There's a small reception room with coffee and some chairs. The receptionist leads me around the corner to a small office room with fifteen chairs, facing inward at a single chair, and a bit table with a picture of Klara Hitler, Adolf's mother. The windows are covered, one with a dark drape, another with a great red Nazi flag, with a manhole-sized Swastika in the middle. There are twelve of us. We are somewhat cramped. We wait.

We hear shouting outside. An epileptic Adolf storms in, dripping, screaming. The German army is failing. His hands shake-Parkinson's. He is grandiose yet shrunken. His coat is too big. He rants, and then collapses in the chair.

"Hitler Alone" is, if nothing else, brave. There have been few successful attempts to capture the man behind recent history most audacious social engineering--"die verrückte Zeit," as some called it. Popular depictions push fact over feelings. Feelings can be distorted over time. Numbers (6 million) are somewhat less malleable.

There is a resilient fear, after all this time, that to humanize is to sympathize, that to sympathize is to justify, that to justify is to forgive, that to forgive is to forget. I have trouble arguing with the fear. Violence between barbarous tribes doesn't

worry us--though we might feel a twinge of pity--but the Germans weren't barbarians. They were civilized. Some worry that if we humanize him too much, we the civilized, or perhaps our children, will be the engineers of the fourth Reich.

The logic is flawed, of course. To shield ourselves from Hitler's human side is the ostrich's refuge. Society has a tendency to corral all the evils of the world under the guise of Hitler (and, consequently

fascism)--with politicians and media outlets invariably slinging the "F" word at their opponents without regard to social or political nuance. The situation is so absurd that at one point, a prominent American neo-Nazi objected to the Republican and Democratic mudslinging on the grounds that it was misrepresenting actual Nazi. It seems that this knee-jerk vilification isn't discouraging any actual Nazis, and that it makes it easier to ignore our own iniquities (as in not-Nazi was the fast-track to being a "good person").

However, that doesn't make it any less painful to watch.

This is the second one-man play I've

seen at the Fringe, and its single engineer — the seasoned Paul Webster — is bold. The image is splitting, and Webster is careful to imitate the precise mannerisms of the old Fuhrer. We don't have the protection of the stage, and while I know it is an act, I am awed as Webster struts, a few feet from me, sputtering, shouting how he wishes he could take a million more Jews down with him as he dies. Purely as a display of theatrical virtuosity, Webster succeeds wonderfully. I doubt that many other men could share that level of sustain, could explore that extent of degradation for a full 75 minutes every night, and not be overwhelmed

The script takes many freedoms. In his final hours, Hitler remarks very freely about his entire history, the specifics of his successes and failures on the hattlefield. I wonder whether the real Hitler knew how Mussolini's body was hung up on a meathook after being shot, or how Rommel's suicide implement of choice was piano wire. And I doubt that the true Hitler was quite so cogent before death — addicted to amphetamines as he was (Albert Speer would attribute his unemotional late life behavior to this fact). But this is theatre, after all, and we suspend disbelief because we have to. After all, we want to see all of a bad mad in the course of 75 minutes. It's a tall order. We make do. We're watching, necessarily through 21st century eyes, and I think that Webster's decision to make his Hitler more cogent, more open, and more transparent was both a necessary and wise decision.

It helps that the script, realism aside, is pure poetry. The audience is rapt. The cadence is well done and we, as listeners, are taught something about the dangerous power of a good orator.

What do we gain from such a play? Depth. Some of the script is quote from letters and speeches, some devised. Webster peers equally into Hitler's military travails as his relationship with Eva Braun, his views on women, and his childhood. Webster juxtaposes a man capable of worrying about the fate of his secretaries with a man capable of executing millions of both his enemies and his allies. The lesson is not that we are similar to Hitler, and therefore, perhaps, he was right. The lesson is that we are similar to Hitler, and that we'd be foolish to pretend that the Hitlers of the world can be excised into history books and asylums, and that we can sit idly while we dream up our own feel-good fascism.

As a work gauged wholly on the strength of its acting, it is extraordinary. Works with this level of intimacy are rare. "Hitler Alone" is beautiful, although terrifying.

Eat, pray, love, whatever

Ryan Murphy's film adaptation lacks the emotional weight of the acclaimed memoir.

Eat Pray Love is a movie adaptation of the bestselling memoir by Elizabeth Gilbert of the same title. It's a story of overcoming a life crisis and finding personal balance again.

At age 32, Gilbert was successful as a writer. She had a nice home and a husband who loved her, but was unhappy with her marriage. After a painful divorce from her husband, she started a romantic affair. The affair ended shortly afterwards and Gilbert was alone again. During that time she was sent to Bali to write an article on yoga vacations. There she met a ninth-generation medicine man who told her in a self-fulfilling prophecy manner that she would spend the next year travelling the world and that they will spend some time studying together in Bali.

This is the opening scene of the movie adaption directed by Ryan Murphy. Julia Roberts stars in the film as Elizabeth Gilbert. After eventually finalizing her divorce, Gilbert spends a total of one year traveling Italy, India and Indonesia. She enjoys her life and good food in Italy ("Eat"), taps into her inner spirituality in India ("Pray") and ultimately finds her balance in Indonesia ("Love"). Overall, the movie adaptation tries to stay as close as possible to the original book to capture its very essence but it doesn't have quite the same impact.

In Italy, Liz takes private Italian classes. She makes many friends, learns how to cook and enjoy life. Watching Liz indulge in all the great Italian food raises your appetite for pasta. Lucky are those who already have a reservation in a nearby Italian restaurant. Italy, Rome and even Naples look very clean in the movie, which makes those cities hard to recognize.

After leaving Italy, Liz spends most of her time in India staying in her ex-boyfriend's most favorite ashram to find spirituality. There she meets another American from Texas (Richard) played by Richard Jenkins. **★★★☆☆**

Both of them try to overcome their own private sorrows through meditation. Richard is a rough but supporting fellow American who challenges Liz to face her past and overcome her burdens.

In Indonesia, during the final part of her journey, Liz finds both love and truth in Indonesia. She visits the medicine man again and falls in love with the Brazilian businessman Felipe (Javier Bardem). The film climaxes in the Indonesia portion as Liz is forced to confront and challenge her notions of balance and what it really means to 'discover' oneself.

Although the movie ends on a happy note, the overall ambience is mellow since there are many characters that have been hurt and are trying to overcome their own life crisis, healing their emotional scars. Julia Roberts is luminous as ever but the movie fails to capture the emotional weight of the original book. The movie provides many solid new scenes, such as when Felipe (Javier Bardem) displays his love for his son — crying and hugging him tightly after the end of a quick spring break. The cinematography is also well done with pleasing scenic views. Overall, Eat Pray Love is a piece of solidly crafted Hollywood entertainment. Ryan Murphy's film is romantic, but not a comedy. It is charming but not inspirational. It is entertaining but not artistic and touching but not moving.

Berenson's parole revoked in Peru

CARACAS, Venezuela - A Peruvian court said Wednesday that it had struck down a decision granting parole to Lori Berenson, the former MIT student imprisoned in the 1990s on charges of collaborating with a Marxist revolutionary group. The court ordered her to be returned to prison to complete the five years left in her 20-year sentence.

The decision was an abrupt turnabout for Berenson, 40, who turned herself in after the announcement, according to the U.S. Embassy in Lima, Peru's capital. Berenson withdrew from MIT as a sophomore in

After 14 1/2 years in Peruvian prisons, including time spent in isolation in high-altitude Andean facilities, Berenson was released on parole in May when a judge decided that she had exhibited good behavior during her incarceration.

Berenson had a son while in prison about a year ago, another factor thought to have weighed on the decision to grant her parole. She and her son, Salvador, who had lived with her in prison since his birth, had recently moved into a rented apartment in Miraflores, an upscale district of Lima where she was planning to live and work as a baker.

But the Peruvian court said it ided her parole because there were discrepancies in the addresses Berenson had provided for her planned residence.

Beyond the court's official reasoning, it was also clear that broad resentment over the release of Berenson - who is widely viewed in Peru as a symbol of the insurgents and the war against them that cost nearly 70,000 lives between 1980 and 2000 - influenced the decision.

"Berenson was sent to prison for 20 years, and she only served 14 years, five months and 25 days," said Luis Marill del Aguila, an official in Peru's Justice Ministry who announced the court's ruling.

"She hasn't even served threefourths of her sentence," said Marill del Aguila, adding that Berenson's immediate arrest had been ordered.

The Justice Ministry said in a statement that the court's decision reversing her parole could not be appealed.

But Guillermo Gonzalez, a spokesman for Peru's Supreme Court, said the case would return to Judge Jessica Leon, who granted pa-



role to Berenson, and that it would ultimately be up to her whether Berenson and her son would remain in

"The main reason for this is in the issue of her domicile," Gonzalez said. Berenson's parents, Rhoda and

Mark, said their daughter's parole had been "annulled on a technicality" that they hoped could be sorted out.

'We are still in an unsure position," they said in an e-mail.

Berenson learned of the decision while she was at the embassy in Lima, where she was at a previously scheduled consular meeting, an official at the embassy said.

"This was a Peruvian judicial process," James Fennell, a spokesman for the embassy, said in a statement "Berenson voluntarily turned herself in today to Peruvian authorities in order to comply with the court's order. With her consent, she was picked up at the embassy this afternoon by Peruvian authorities."

Berenson's lawyer, Anibal Apari, told local reporters that Berenson had made no effort to flee the country, despite disagreeing with the court's decision. Apari, a former rebel who is the father of Berenson's son, said she and Salvador would return to prison. In Peru, children are allowed to remain with their mother until age 3 if the mother is incarcer-

Apari also questioned the court's decision to base its ruling on doubts surrounding information about Berenson's address.

"Everyone knows where she lives," he said.

She was initially arrested in 1995 in Peru while enmeshed with members of the Tupac Amaru Revolutionary Movement.

Crossing at W59 to increase safety

Police concerned about people crossing tracks, climbing over railcars

muter Rail will continue to be essential after the new pedestrian crossing is built. "Once we have a fully signalized crossing, train cars parked on the spur will have to be separated in order to maintain the new pedestrian crossing," said Combs.

For students, this means no more having to climb over or under train cars to cross the railroad track.

"There have been people who have climbed on top of or under trains to cross," said Sergeant Cheryl Vossmer. So far, there have been no reported injuries resulting from climbing over or under parked trains blocking the way.

Campus Police Chief John Di-Fava said: "I'd be a big advocate for a crossing. There's a crossing at Fort Washington, and the next one is all the way down by Mass Ave." He added, "students are always in a hurry; time is of the essence here, so I can understand why students would want to make that shortcut. We're just concerned about safety."

Also in the area is CASPAR, Cambridge's only homeless shelter that takes in people while they are intoxicated. In response to safety concerns, an emergency tower with a blue light and telephone were installed last year near the W59 crossing. But neither Vossmer nor Campus Police Captain Jay A. Perault feel that more crime happens there than other locations on campus.

"We are more concerned about it being dark and someone falling, twisting their ankle, and hitting their head than getting attacked," Perault said

The crossing may be well needed if more trains start passing through campus. Massachusetts Lieutenant Governor Tim Murray has spoken publicly about a proposed plan to add more round trips between Worcester and Boston via commuter rail, and half of these additions could cross the Charles River and run through Cambridge up to North Station through MIT's campus.

"If the MBTA or their contract operator (MBCR) run passenger trains from Worcester or Framingham to North Station, then yes [there will be more trains crossing through campus]," said Kelley Brown, a senior project manager at Facilities. Brown said that Murray's plans will not affect the plans for the construction of legal pedestrian crossing.

In the meantime, the MIT police does not plan on locking the gate to prevent students from crossing the railroad tracks.

The safety concerns regarding the unofficial crossing were thrown into relief in the last week of July, when a CSX train operator called the MIT Police reporting close calls of people walking in front of approaching trains. The MIT police responded by locking the fence. Many students starting hopping the fence, and by Thursday, August 6, the gate's bottom hinge had been partially disassembled, letting all through. After The Tech brought the fence's condition to the police's attention, MIT Police unlocked the gate, and the gate has since remained unlocked.

Captain Jay Perault said that he does not endorse students crossing there because it is not safe, "but are we going to lock it so that people can't cross? No."

Currently, there are renovations to replace railroad ties on the tracks. Students will not be allowed to cross through the working area.

According to Melody Craven, communications assistant for MIT Facilities, the Massachusetts Bay Commuter Rail began work at the Charles River near the BU Bridge on Friday, August 13 and will finish at Main Street near the beginning of September. At night, the equipment is being stored by the tracks west of NW30.

Anna Tang update today

The next update in the saga of Anna L. Tang, the Wellesley student who stabbed MIT student Wolfe B. Styke '10 in October 2007, will come today at an administrative status conference before Justice Bruce R. Henry in Middlesex

Superior Court.

Tang's trial was halted on June 30 after the Commonwealth's expert psychiatrist Alison Fife, who had declared that Tang was not criminally responsible for her actions, suddenly changed her mind.

The judge today is expected to schedule a trial and rule on several motions filed in the past two months, including motions by the defense to change bail conditions

and exclude evidence, and motions by the Commonwealth for additional discovery.

Tang had previously waived her right to a jury, but because of the psychiatrist's change of opinion, it is likely that Tang will now choose to have a jury trial.

This status conference was rescheduled from last week, because the judge was not available.

Gym security cameras to deter crime?

As staff get cut, mounted eyes substitute for people on the ground at Z-Center

but two of these locations have been under surveillance since 2000. According to Daniel Martin, the assistant department head for facilities and operations, advancements in technology motivated the replacement of these cameras with newer models. The new cameras also happen to be more obvious.

Martin said that these cameras are intended to enhance both personal safety and security as the staff size shrinks. For example, when staff were withdrawn from near the duPont equipment room, some complained that the area could become a crime target because of its isolated location.

Footage from such locations can be viewed by staff back at the main entrance to the Z-Center. This differs from the typical viewing policy for security cameras at MIT. Elsewhere on campus, there is a firm policy that footage obtained by the cameras be

kept confidential and available for only a brief period of time.

Martin noted that thefts at the athletic centers have declined 2000, when the cameras were first installed and other security measures like alarms were implemented.

He also emphasized that there is

a need for protection in an urban environment and that several patrons have asked him to increase security. To that end, the Department of Athletics, Physical Education and Recreation (DAPER) may end up commissioning additional security cameras, including one for the weight room.

genome control."

Young said he was prepared to leave the problem in the hands of politicians and legislators — at least for now. If he were to engage in lobbying and trying to find funding, he said, he would not be doing his job as a biologist.

At MIT, affected scientists include Langer and Young, as well as professors Rudolph Jaenisch and Daniel G. Anderson, all of whom have NIH funding for stem cell work. While their current work may proceed, they operate under multiyear grants that are subject to yearly renewals, and those renewals cannot happen while the injunction remains in force.

"The whole thing is really unfortunate," Anderson said. "There are so many important problems in the world, why would you spend your time trying to stop research that's trying to help people? I understand there are religious motivations ... I think if people really understood what these cells were — it's not like any embryos are going to be destroyed on an ongoing basis." Anderson noted that human embryos are destroyed on a regular basis as part of in vitro fertilization.

"Is their mission to stop people from doing important research?" Anderson asked.

Monday's injunction was issued by Chief Judge Royce C. Lamberth of United States District Court for the District of Columbia, in Iames Sherley, et al, v. Kathleen Sebelius,

James L. Sherley, a former MIT professor, and Theresa Deisher, as well as several non-scientist plaintiffs sued the NIH and the Depart-

ment of Health and Human Services in August 2009, alleging that the use of federal funds to support research where embryos are destroyed was

The suit was originally dismissed by the judge in October, when he ruled that the plaintiffs lacked standing to sue, because they were not injured by the NIH policy.

Sherley and the other plaintiffs appealed and in June, the appeals court ruled that Sherley and Deisher did have standing to sue (though the other plaintiffs did not), and remanded the case back to the district court for further proceedings.

Sherley and his counsel did not respond to calls for comment. According to court documents, Sherley argues that he is harmed by being forced to compete with other scientists for limited federal funding dollars.

'The funding should go to the

best research," Anderson said. "Those decisions are hard. They ought to be made through peer re-

Sherley was an associate professor at MIT until he was denied tenure in spring 2007. He alleged that racism was a factor, and staged a hunger strike in protest. Sherley is now a senior scientist at the Boston Biomedical Research Institute.

At MIT, individual researchers working with stem cells uniformly condemned the situation, but there was been no similar response from MIT's senior administration.

Claude R. Canizares, vice president for research and associate provost, said in an e-mail Wednesday that MIT was waiting for details and would review them.

MIT's Office of Sponsored Programs is working with the MIT Washington DC office to understand MIT's response, but like everyone,

they are waiting for more details.

Michelle D. Christy, director of the Office of Sponsored Programs, said that the NIH was waiting to hear interpretations of the law from the Department of Justice.

Christy expressed worry about renewals of NIH grants that are now expected to be on hold. "My hope is that NIH will figure out some way to look at these things on a case-bycase basis," she said. "There may be stem cell work that's already done, where we're dealing with the results. I would hope they would continue that work."

The Washington office has been e-mailing a group of MIT NIH grant recipients throughout the week. The office summarized Monday's ruling and indicated they were waiting to

hear from the NIH as well as the Association of American Universities. Another e-mail was sent out after NIH Director Collins spoke to reporters, indicating existing grants could continue their research.

Christy said that the Association of American Universities and the Council on Governmental Relations were expected to issue a statement soon on the importance of federal funding of stem cell research

Scientists are still waiting to hear from the NIH. Collins indicated Tuesday that direction would be issued in the NIH Guide, probably late Tuesday, but as of Thursday night, that has still not yet happened. NIH spokeswoman Jenny Haliski had no further information.

On Tuesday, White House Deputy Press Secretary Bill Burton said "from what we can tell, this would also stop the research that President Bush had allowed to go forward early in his presidency. So we're exploring all possible avenues to make sure that we can continue to do this critical lifesaving research." Both legislative and judicial remedies appear to be on the table.

The Department of Justice plans to appeal the preliminary injunction and to move for a stay, and that will likely be filed today, according to DOJ spokeswoman Tracy Schmaler on Tuesday.

Lamberth could rule on a motion for a stay as early as hours or days after its filing, said Court spokeswoman Jenna Gatski.

Why are stem cells important?

The Tech asked Biology professor Richard A. Young to explain why stem cell research is important. In an e-mail, Young wrote:

"There is another important aspect of stem cell research that is not appreciated by the public, mostly because it is too technical. Much of human disease is due to embryonic regulatory processes gone wrong. That is, cancer and many other diseases involve inappropriate activation or repression of regulatory pathways that are engaged in embryonic cells during early development. So new understanding of embryonic pathways frequently gives new insights into human diseases.

"For example, using embryonic stem cells, we discovered (and reported in Cell this last April) how a master regulator of cellular proliferation — an oncogene called Myc — functions to control proliferation, and this has led to new efforts to develop a novel class of drugs against cancer here at MIT and at Harvard. As another example, Nature just published (advance online publication on Aug.18) an article from my lab reporting our discovery that gene control is connected to chromosome architecture, a fundamental discovery involving an apparatus that is mutated in a variety of developmental diseases.

"Embryonic stem cells are not only inherently valuable for revealing the secrets behind embryonic regulatory pathways, they are rapidly becoming the cellular workhorse behind much modern biological discovery. In most molecular biological studies, investigators need to grow populations of cells in order to obtain enough cellular material for the assays that we use. Because they grow like weeds, investigators have traditionally studied tumor cells because normal cells are quiescent, so they cannot be grown in adequate amounts for most molecular studies. Tumor cells are defective cells with badly damaged genomes, so they are a poor model system for understanding normal biology. Es cells are normal — they are fully functional cells with normal genomes that can give us insights into normal cell biology."

flying into the hallways as he drove through the underpass when the doors on both sides happened to be open.

He was driving like 20 miles per hour and the water shot like 200 yards into the building and flooded all the rooms," said Timothy J. Hennelly, a stock clerk for MIT Facilities.

The burst pipe was an old cast iron pipe which supplied potable water.

One facilities worker on the scene said, "This main is about as old as the building itself. It should have been replaced ages ago."

John L. Gibbs, a supervisor in Custodial Services who specializes in water, said that the water pipes "probably go back to 1912, 1920."

The shut off valve was near the Rotch Library. Gibbs estimated that at least Buildings 3 and 5 were without water as a result of the water shut-off.

Hennelly suspects that a crane which drove through the parking lot at 3:30 p.m. yesterday caused the rupture. He said that the weight of the crane and the vibrations of it passing through might have weakened the water pipe.

Getting to know the Red Sox

Want to be a proper Bostonian? Read this.

Editor's Note: Welcome to Boston! Since Beantown's professional sports teams are such an integral part of its culture, we're presenting an insider's view — history, current state, and future expectations — of each of them. The first installment in the series features... the Red Sox, of course.

To be a passionate fan of any team is, by definition, an emotional experience. You have to care about something over which you have no control and no inherent vested interest. You don't derive tangible benefits from the team's victories, but you suffer right along with it when it loses. To MIT students, this probably doesn't sound like a good use of time, energy, or money; indeed, there are plenty of places where a baseball game is just a place for executives to entertain clients and do business, with the occasional glance at the TV screen. Boston is not one of those places. From April to October, the city is captivated by what happens at Fenway Park, the home of the Boston Red Sox. From November to March, regardless of whether the Patriots are in the Super Bowl, the Celtics are shutting down the competition, or the Bruins appear headed for the Stanley Cup, the city is concerned about whether the Red Sox will be ready for the next season.

However you may perceive it, Boston's collective mood is inextricably linked to the successes and failures of the Red Sox. It's a guaranteed conversation-starter at any time of the year anywhere in Boston and, for that matter, New England. For the uninitiated, here's a short guide to what you need to know:

A storied history

In 1903, the Red Sox conquered the Pittsburgh Pirates in the first-ever World Series (to those new to professional baseball in North America, the World Series is contested by the champions of the National and American Leagues). Indeed, there was a time when the Pirates did not torture their fans with losing season after losing season. That championship was the first of many that the Sox would win over a prosperous fifteen year period. However, at the conclusion of the 1918 season, the Sox's owner sold the team's best player, Babe Ruth, to the New York Yankees. The outraged Babe claimed that the Red Sox would not win another title within his lifetime, a prediction that came to be called the Curse of the Bambino. The prediction would, in fact, stand the test of time (perhaps this type of curse is what Cleveland Cavaliers owner Dan Gilbert had in mind when he suggested that the LeBron-less Cavs would win a title before the Miami Heat). For the next 86 years, countless baseball legends (Johnny Pesky, Ted Williams, Jim Rice, Carl Yastrzemski, Dwight Evans) took their talents to Beantown, but none of them came away with a championship ring. Meanwhile, the hated Yankees, first with the Babe and then with stars like Dimaggio, Mantle, Maris, Jackson, and others, won title after title. Improbable errors and botched personnel decisions, rather than general futility and indifference, are generally acknowledged as the reasons for the championship drought. As a new Red Sox fan, count yourself lucky to have been initiated during this new era of excellence (at least, we hope).

Recent past

The end of the championship draught was set in motion with the purchase of the Red Sox by a new ownership group at the conclusion of 2002. John Henry, a successful hedge fund investor, had previously been a part owner of the New York Yankees and, subsequently, a majority owner of the Florida Marlins. The sale of the team to Henry from the heirs of the long-time owner, Tom Yawkey, was full of implications. No less than the future of the Sox' historic ballpark (opened in 1912) was at stake; while Henry promised to renovate the park, others sought a more modern stadium in the Back Bay. To the dismay of some around Boston, Henry's bid won, and the rebirth of the franchise began. New marketing efforts led to the start of a sellout streak (every ticket in the stadium has been bought for a given game) that has set records and endures to this day; increased revenue and committed ownership put the Sox on (more) even footing with the Yankees. In 2004, the Red Sox finally vanquished the curse, turning the tables on the Yankees and proceeding to win the World Series. In 2007, they accomplished the same feat with a largely different cast of characters.

State of the Team: Red Sox fans expect to make the playoffs every year, plain and simple. However, the Red Sox haven't endured this much bad luck since Mookie Wilson's groundball rolled under Bill Buckner's glove, effectively losing the 1986 World Series for the Red Sox. The Red Sox play in the toughest division in the superior league, and because of the critical mass of injuries the Sox have suffered, they currently find themselves out of a playoff spot. They will need a very strong September against top competition to grapple a playoff spot from the Yankees or Rays. Everyone loves the character of this team and few are upset with players or management (I'll save the subject of center fielder Jacoby Ellsbury and his "rib injuries" for another day), but we may be left wondering "what if" the Sox had been healthy for the entire

Names to know

Dustin Pedroia: Pedroia is notorious for his stature, self-confidence, and the skills to match. He is very endearing to fans, but this endearment is not easily explained to those on the outside. He speaks proudly of the numerous home runs he hit in Little League and promotes his batting practice sessions as "Laser Shows". He'll also do seemingly anything to help his team win and has overcome perceived

physical limitations to become one of the best second basemen in the league.

Kevin Youkilis: Youkilis is the fiery first baseman who bears the load on offense. Lauded since his college days for his ability to "get on base" by swinging only at select pitches, he has developed into a player with bona fide power and incredible defensive skills. Every move he makes on the field is greeted with a "Yooooouuuuuuk" from the fans. It sounds like he is being booed, but in fact, fans are showing their appreciation for Youk.

Jon Lester: The Red Sox ace of the past few years, he came back from cancer in 2007 to win the clinching game in the 2007 World Series. Along with Clay Buchholz, Lester is a prime example of the Red Sox's successful investments in young prospects and superb player development process.

Where to find your team

Despite the ongoing sellout streak, tickets have become more accessible over the years. For most games, you can walk up and purchase tickets at the gate. For standing room tickets, expect to pay about \$20. Avoid the right field grandstand, where \$30 will give you an old seat that faces straight into left field. The upper bleachers (\$12) are the cheapest seats in the park but are not advisable if you want to follow the game. I would recommend paying the extra few bucks for the lower bleachers (\$28). Catching a game from atop the Green Monster, the fabled leftfield wall, is a great experience for a diehard Sox fan but costs upwards of \$100. Gates open two hours before the game, and players will take batting practice up until forty-five minutes before the scheduled start. If you are aggressive (or lucky) you might catch a ball or get an autograph from a player during this time. You can find them on television at the New England Sports Network (NESN).

Three thoughts for the diehards

- 1) Why can't Daniel Bard throw 162 innings each year? The Red Sox could use a bunch more relievers just like him; maybe Doubront will be the answer next year.
- 2) Three moments that gave me chills this season:
 - a) Darnell McDonald's debut (game-tying HR, walk-off single) b) Daniel Nava, the 27 year-old outfielder who never gave up, crushing a grand slam in his first Major League at-bat
 - c) Lowell's homer in his first atbat after the trade/injury saga
- 3) Imagine what the fourth-place Blue Jays would do if they were in the National League.

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
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
